





DENVER. Col., March 29.-In a little two-by-four glass case in the war museum at the state capitol, a small silver tray is exhibited, containing a slip of paper surrounded by Confederate bank notes. It is insignificant in size, but discloses som

It is a Confederate treasury \$100,00 transfer draft, issued by the late Genlast of the Confederate cabinet.

General Reagan, at the time the draft was issued, was postmaster general of the Southern Confederacy. The draft is an order to the government general to pay to the postal department at Shreveport the sum of \$100,000. It was issued at Richmond, Dec. 11, 1863.





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
