
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



He will review the federal troops at Government Hill, review the Confederate and Grand Army veterans in Travis Park, and afterward at Alamo plaza he will be formally welcomed to the city. Then he will speak to what is expected to be the largest crowd ever assembled in San Antonio. Immediately after the address, the president's reunion with the members of his rough rider regiment will begin. It will last until 5:30 o'clock. At that hour the president will go to the Menger hotel to be the guest of honor at a banquet. He is scheduled to leave San Antonio at 9:30 o'clock and come from there directly to Fort Worth, arriving here Saturday morning at 9:45 o'clock.

About this time a little one in its mother's arms began to cry and the president stopped his address, and attracted the attention of the child, moved his hand and the baby laughed in glee. The president laughed.



DIPPING CATTLE

Katy Expects Large Business During

Present Month The Missouri. Kansas and Texas expects o handle 50,000 head of cattle at the dipping vats located at Hominy, Wynona and Nelagnoy, Osage nation, during the reriod of April 1 and May 15, according o a statement made today by General Live Stock Agent Galbreath.

On March 31 1,130 head were dipped at Wynona in two hours and fifteen minutes, and the daily reports being received here show that the cattle dipped are doing well and show no ill effects.

"The opinion seems to prevail." said Mr. Galbreath, "that cattle dipped are not deing well, but this is a mistake." Mr. Galbreath said it was true that the cattle dipped and placed immediately in cars for transportation to the Territory pastures did not give the desired results from he fact that the stock were not given time to recover from the dipping before being loaded for shipments. These conditions, he says, are avoided at the dipping roints above.

On Wednesday 480 head were lipped successfully at Wynona in one hour without injury to any of the cattle.
