AMERICAN SHIPS TO ENFORCE NEUTRALITY

Cruiser Raleigh and Two Torpedoboat De-stroyers Dispatched to Island of Palawan

MANILA. April 10 .- The American vice consul at Singapore reports the Russian fleet, consisting of six battleships, six cruisers, six converted cruisers, eight torpedo boat destroyers, one hospital ship, one repair ship and sixteen colliers, passed Singapore, headed this way. The American cruiser Raleigh, torpedo boat lestroyers Barry and Chauncy and the supply ship General Alvado have been dispatched to patrol the west coast of Palawan island to enforce neutrality. Three other destroyers are preparing to sail.
