

TEXAS-LUISIANA LUMBERMEN OPEN 19TH CONVENTION

Five Hundred Delegates Here for First Session Held in City Hall—Morning Devoted to Address of Welcome

ATTEND RECEPTION TONIGHT

Compliments to Fort Worth Theme of First Day's Speeches. Business Sessions Occupying Afternoon

WEDNESDAY'S PROGRAM 9 a. m. to 12:30 p. m.—Business session, city hall. 2:30 p. m.—Cars leave for Hoo Hoo barbecue at Handley; matinee, Greenwall's opera house. 9:09 p. m.—Hoo Hoo parade preceding concatenation at Eagle hall.

The twentieth annual convention of the Texas-Louisiana lumbermen's Association came to order at 11 o'clock this morning in the auditorium of the city hall, with a large attendance of members. It is estimated 500 delegates will be present before night.

"It would be more like lumbermen if you would get a little closer together; looks as if you had been doing something wrong; you may be guilty of trust methods," said Paul Waples in calling the convention to order and announcing that he had the pleasure a year ago at Orange to invite this convention to meet here today.

Mr. Waples said Fort Worth had been an entertaining gathering during the past year, the last welcome being extended to President Roosevelt, and that while this was the case, he was certain that the reception to the lumbermen would be none the less hospitable. He then introduced Mayor T. J. Powell, who said he was able only to perform the mere function of extending the city's welcome to the lumbermen's association.

"We have no 'camel' for the members to ride, but we have a hearty greeting to every member present and will give you the usual hospitable greeting," said the mayor. Mayor Powell said that he wanted Fort Worth to further increase trade relations with the lumbermen of Texas. "Some city on the Gulf coast is going to be the port of exit for all this great commonwealth and the sections west of the Mississippi. That place will be Galveston. This is shown when Mr. Huntington made Galveston the terminal point for his great railway system. When the isthmian canal is completed it will greatly increase trade relations between Texas and the Orient. There is going to be a great inland city in Texas and I believe Fort Worth will be that city."

The mayor then referred to the fact that Fort Worth has the finest railroad terminals to be found in the south, ample to handle all shipments to an extent which cannot be claimed by any other city in the state.

"I am a patriotic advocate of the city which has honored me as its chief executive, and so long as I have breath I shall be loyal to its citizenship," said the mayor. Mayor Powell concluded his welcome by saying that when the lumbermen leave, he wanted them to go with the understanding that the latch strings hang on the outside and that there is a warm welcome on the inside. J. M. Rockwell of Houston, president of the association, then spoke on behalf of the association. "The cordial reception extended us is well known, and we heartily reciprocate," said the president. "Fort Worth has grown wonderfully; she is the best passenger station in the state, palatial houses and fine paved streets. Fort Worth is the Chicago and Kansas City from a packing standpoint, and aided in her commercial lead this city is bound to become a great city. Despite the fact that you have shivered your hearty welcomes upon the president, there is plenty left for the lumberman."

A response was then made by W. B. Brazzleton, who said that twenty-nine years ago he rode a bucking broncho into this place, and was greeted with the salutation: "My friend, all is yours that is not nailed down."

"The example of those true men who were pioneers of Fort Worth, has been referred to the great growth of Fort Worth. He said there was nothing small about Fort Worth and Texas, and he was confident that the lumbermen will enjoy a 'time' while here. W. E. Barnes of St. Louis amused the convention by relating several stories. He referred to the work of the Texas commission to the World's Fair and said it did great honor in representing this state.

The ladies of Texas, particularly are entitled to much of the honor of the success of Texas at the World's Fair, he said. W. G. Whittell of Corsicana said that Fort Worth is so geographically situated as to become one of the greatest cities in the state. He said he attended the lumbermen's convention held here ten years ago, and the two features he enjoyed most were the banquet and the brewery. That on that occasion he had the privilege for the first time in his life to see a man put to bed with both his boots and hat on.

B. A. Johnson of the Chicago American Lumberman, said he has been coming to Fort Worth for many years. He said that while the weather was cool he felt certain that by the time this convention ends things will be considerably warmed up. Mr. Johnson said he had brought with him a representative from Chicago who would do his speaking in the future. He then introduced James Boyd, editor of the Lumber Trade Journal of New Orleans, who said he was interested in Texas—through owning a "dry hole" on Spindletop. He was glad to be in Fort Worth as he had heard that the people of Fort Worth knew how to entertain, and was certain there had been no

Continuing he said he did not agree with Mayor Powell that it would be in 1958 when Texas would pass New York as the empire state of the union. He thought this event would be realized much earlier. "Fort Worth's interest in you is not wholly selfish, but philanthropic to a degree. Your interests and ours are identical and your success means our success; your prosperity is our prosperity. When diversity comes we are affected by it the same as you, and in those times our sympathy is with you. We have southwest of us an area of timber land much larger than the state of Maine. The value of this product cannot be computed. We realize that your business is important and essential to our prosperity. The committee for your entertainment has left nothing undone; whatever you see laying around loose, take it. "It is Fort Worth's pleasure always to make her guests at home." We take a pride in sustaining the reputation we have made in entertaining our visitors. We are pleased to have you here and hope that your stay will be pleasant, and that when you adjourn you will do so to meet here next year."

GIRL HAS MARVELOUS ESCAPE FROM DEATH

Tossed in Air by Pilot of Engine Only to Fall Again on Track

LARAMIE, Wyo., April 11.—A little girl named O'Connor had a remarkable escape from death beneath the wheels of a locomotive. The child, with two others, was crossing the Union Pacific tracks on her way to school. Her companions passed in front of an approaching freight train and called to her to follow. She hesitated, and then, when the train was barely ten feet slipped and she fell on tracks with the pilot of the locomotive struck her and threw her into the air, where she turned a complete somersault, and again fell on the track. The engineer meanwhile had reversed, and the locomotive stopped with the pilot on the child's body. Had the engine gone another foot she would have been crushed to death. She was found to be severely bruised.

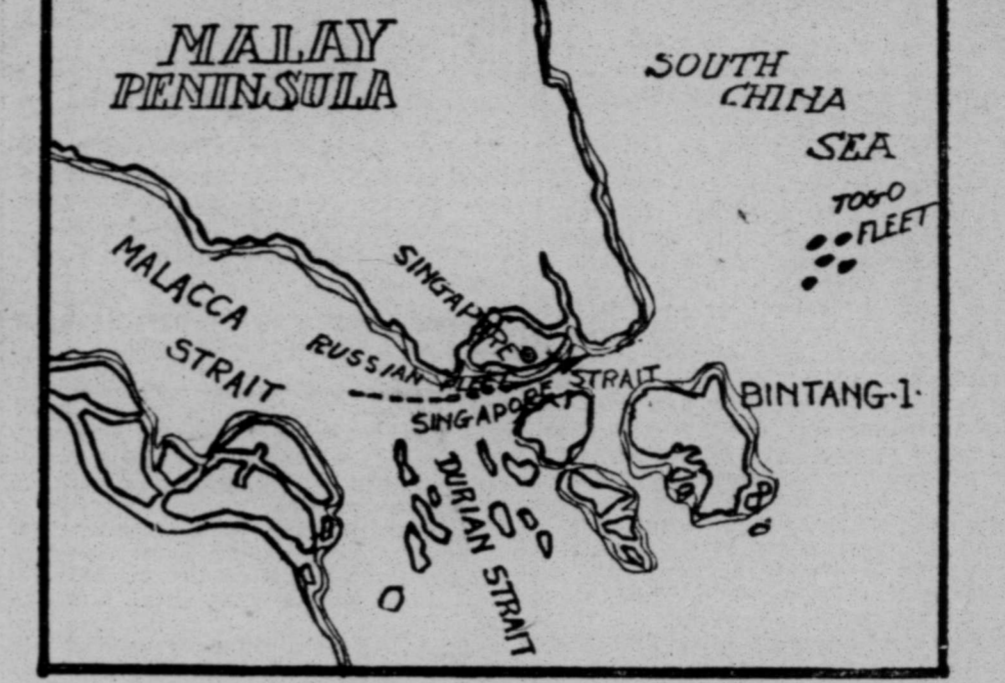

THEY ARE DEEPLY PAINED

of this great nation—an honest man who has the manhood to stand up for that he believes to be the right regardless of those partisans in his own party who have sought in every possible way to block his undertaking. He is as much greater than his party as the people of Texas are greater than the little one-eyed and one-ideaed Washington correspondents who can see no further than the end of the national pie counter.

The Telegram is not an apologist for Theodore Roosevelt. The fairness and greatness of the man demands no apologies. But we respectfully submit that in his treatment of the south the president has been uniformly fair and courteous. It is true some incidents have occurred that were not conducive to the promotion of sectional goodwill, such as the closing of the Indianola postoffice and the appointment of the negro Crum as collector of the port of Charleston, but we should be charitable in considering these matters when we consider the provocation. We should also bear in mind that the president has in a number of instances gone outside his own party and appointed prominent democrats to official positions in the south in order to utilize the best man party.

There was no emotional slipping over the president upon the occasion of his Texas visit. In the hospitality offered him and the homage rendered him the people of this sovereign state knew just exactly what they were doing, and have no apologies or explanations to offer. The people of Texas will not look to sap-headed Washington correspondents of the daily press to teach them the ethics of hospitality or how to stand pat for democratic politics. The people of Texas are a broad and liberal people. They are also a very patriotic people. The great majority of us are democrats of the most pronounced type, but we are also Americans and do not propose to be restricted in the exercise of that Americanism by an outside influence that has neither the ability or the right to pass judgment upon our actions.

A realization of these facts may add additional pain to the little men in Washington who are slipping over with hate and sectionalism, but down here in Texas we are built on broader lines. It grieves us to pain our little friends who are so eagerly studying national conditions as they affect the pie counter, but Texas is interested in greater things. Texas is entirely capable of managing her own affairs in these matters.

PRESIDENT'S SPEAKING OVER

Will Make No More Addresses During Present Tour of the West

President Roosevelt will not make any more speeches during the remainder of his present trip, according to a statement made this morning by William Loeb Jr., secretary to the president.

Speaking of this matter Secretary Loeb said: "The president ended his speech-making at Fort Worth. He will enjoy the remainder of his trip sight-seeing and hunting."

The citizens' committee at Trinidad, Colo., has been notified that the president will not be able to make an address at that place, but in spite of this the Trinidad people are going ahead with preparations for his reception.

When the president's train is taken from Fort Worth next Thursday and turned over to him at Vernon, it will be in charge of a man after Mr. Roosevelt's own heart—Frank Harrington, the Colorado and Southern conductor who will go from Vernon to Textline, and possibly to Trinidad.

Frontier railroad man as he is, Harrington has seen phases of life on the border that would read like dime novel fiction. The stormy days the president weathered up in the Bad Lands of the Dakotas were as Sabbath afternoons in comparison with the days of his life.

SECRETARY LOEB'S DAY

Secretary Loeb is besieged with friends all during the day and to attempt anything like privacy in the conduct of his affairs is almost next to impossibility.

Every train from the east brings great piles of correspondence from Washington, all of which is stopped here, and only that which is for the president personally, is forwarded to Camp Kingsley, O. T., where the president is quartered when not on a wolf chase.

In discussing his determination not to become a candidate for the office Mr. MacKenzie said that his private business demands would make it utterly impossible for him to give the necessary time and attention that would be required for the proper fulfillment of the duties and responsibilities of the office and that under no circumstances would he consent to be a candidate.

Mr. MacKenzie, through whose influence largely the association was formed, during the meeting at Trinidad, Tex., had urged the formation of a union of Texas cattlemen to form a part of the Hagenbarth coalition of industries, is enthusiastic over the outlook for the organization and believes that it will be a success in every particular.

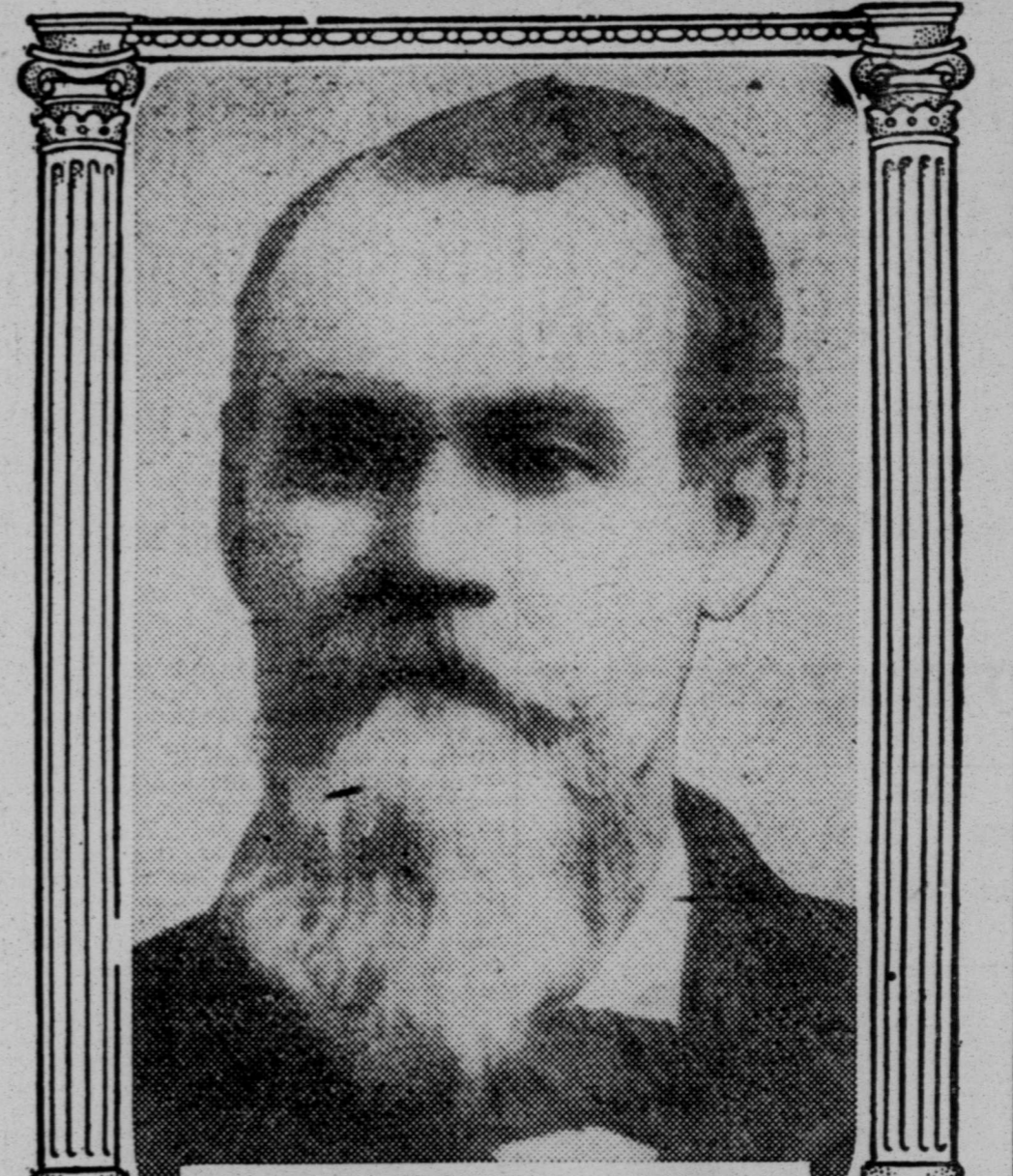

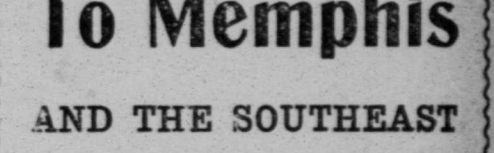

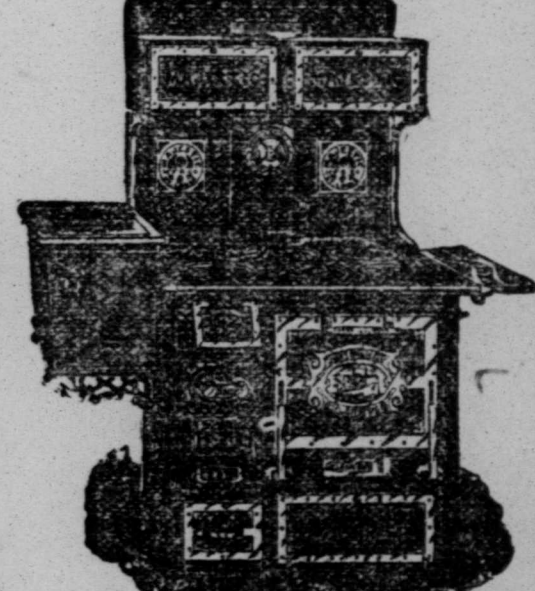

## URGED GOVERNOR TO SIGN BILLS

Friends of Various Measures Now Pending Seek to Have Them Made Laws

AUSTIN, Texas, April 11.—In the closing days of the present session of the legislature the governor's office is the Mecca to which the members of both branches of that body make frequent pilgrimages. All, or nearly all, have bills that have been finally passed and only await executive sanction to become laws. It is for the purpose of presenting the reasons, and the imperative necessity for these acts to become laws that the members are visiting the governor and press him to affix thereto his official signature. The most important and numerous of these visitors are the friends of the Southern Pacific merger. From almost every town and community in Southwest Texas delegations have come to argue the importance, or inexpediency of this consolidation and much of his excellency's time is consumed in hearing arguments for and against its approval. It appears to be a vital question among the people of that part of the state directly affected, and no bill passed by the legislature has excited so much interest. It is generally thought the governor will either sign the bill or allow March 31 to come a law without his approval by limitation.

**SOME BILLS SIGNED**  
The governor signed the following bills yesterday:  
House bill No. 571, an act creating the new county of the christened in honor of Judge A. W. Terrell of Austin.  
House bill No. 333, an act relative to acquiring the site where Dawson's men and the Mier prisoners are entombed near La Grange.  
House bill No. 611, an act amending the charter of the city of El Paso.  
House bill No. 529, an act creating more efficient road laws for the counties of Camp and Upshur.

**PULLMAN COMPANY REPORTS**  
The Pullman Company reports to the comptroller \$47,377.26 as its gross receipts in Texas from the beginning March 31, 1905, and has paid \$1,449.43, which is 2 1/2 per cent on the amount the occupation tax imposed by law.

**FITZHUGH CONGRATULATED**  
In regard to the passage of the separate coach street car bill passed by the house yesterday, Mr. Fitzhugh addressed the following note to Mr. Fitzhugh of Tarrant county:

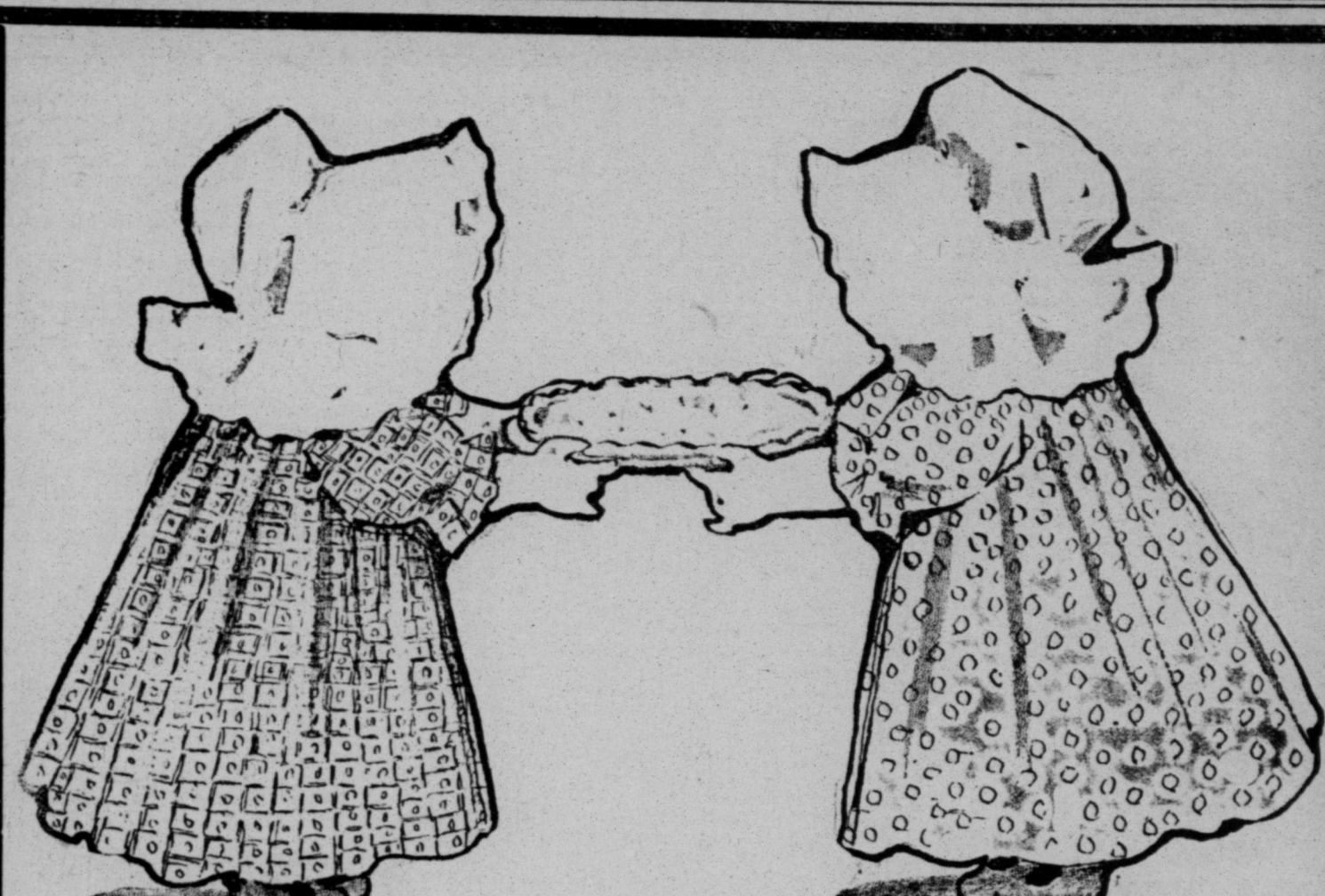
He was called on for a speech, and was introduced by the speaker in the following words:

and it was evident the house was with him, but a two-thirds vote was necessary to suspend the rule.

Look at this, won't you? Here are over three hundred applications from as many good men and there are but thirty-five positions on the whole force to hand out, and what am I going to do? Somebody is going to be disappointed."

Since the announcement in The Telegram that the new chief would consider every man's application for a place on the force he has been besieged by Fort Worth citizens. Applications have come to him in every mail; he has been handed them on the streets, and they have been brought to his office until the list has grown to fearful proportions.  
Chief Maddox has furnished all with blanks to make application in the proper manner. Every one of the men applying are good men, says Chief Maddox. He declares that he would rather run for office a dozen different times than go through such an ordeal as he is now experiencing again.  
"Somebody is going to feel mighty bad after I have made my selections, but what am I to do? I want men who will make the best officers and I must be careful whom I select and there is the trouble

for all of the men who have applied are good men and will make good officers. I guess I'll have to go and look myself in a room and just get down to some real hard thinking. So far, the only man selected is Len Day, for assistant chief of police. I have not made up my mind on any of the rest of them, but when I do, I hope to have selected the best men for the places.  
"I wish it were all over."

## MEMORIAL TO PRESIDENT

Colored Citizens of Fort Worth Present Morocco Bound Volume of Welcome and Appreciation

Presentation of a memorial to President Roosevelt by the colored citizens of Fort Worth took place during the progress of the procession around the city hall, the concurrence of the event with the presentation of flowers by Nellie Curry, a colored girl, causing it to be unnoticed at the time by those viewing the procession. The resolutions, printed in gilt letters and bound in red morocco, were presented by Professor L. N. Terrell, after considerable difficulty in reaching the carriage of the president, as follows:  
To the Honorable Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States of America:  
We, the colored citizens of Fort Worth, Tarrant county, Texas, together with all the citizens of this county and state, most

heartily welcome you to our state and city.  
We delight to honor you for the straightforward course you have pursued in all your public actions; for the patriotic spirit you have shown in your efforts to inspire all the people with a common love for a common cause.  
We admire you because of the manly, courageous, righteous deeds that you have already placed on record for the aid and enlightenment of all Americans.

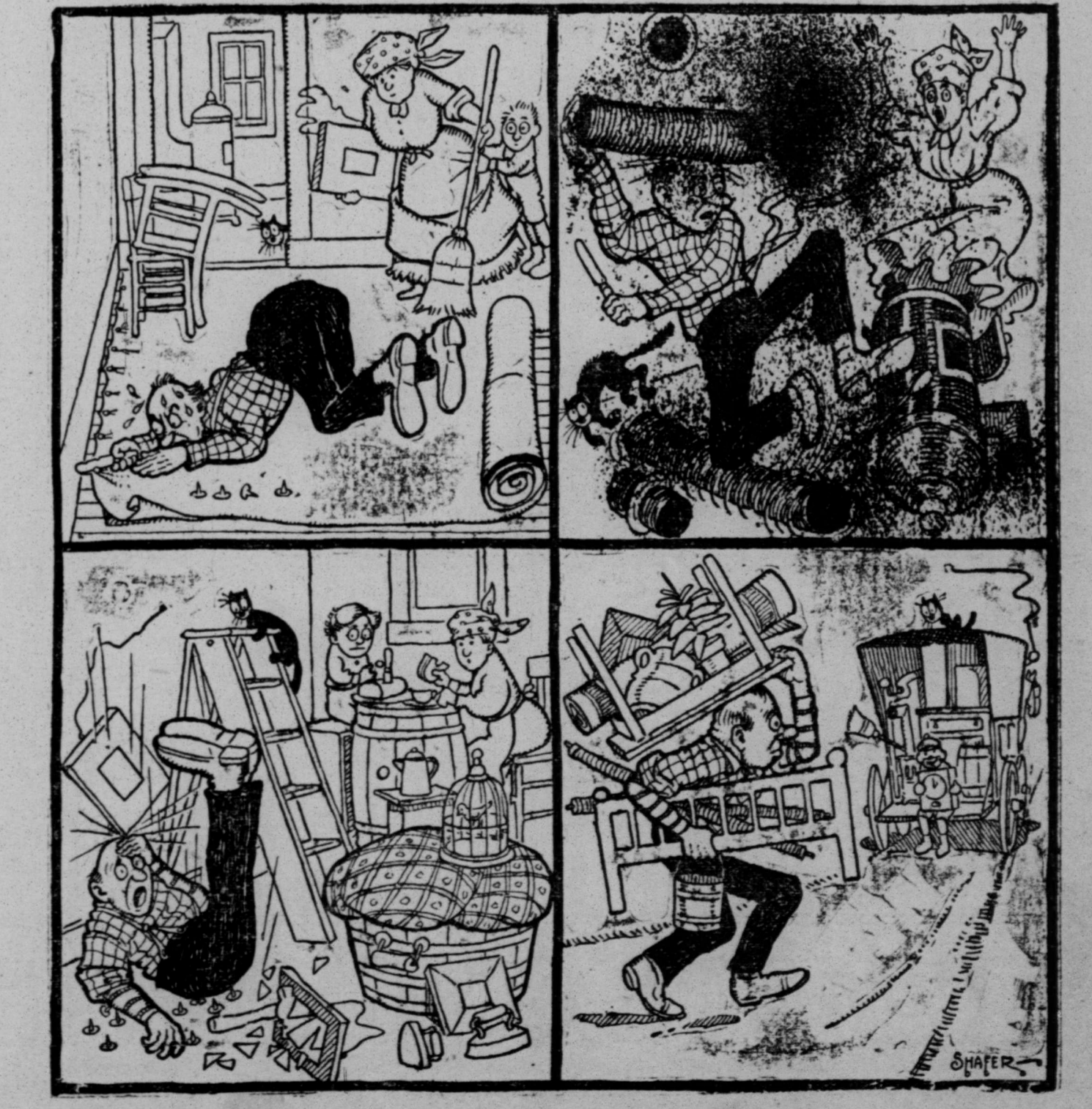
## \$2,500 DAMAGES FOR LOSS OF 2 TEETH

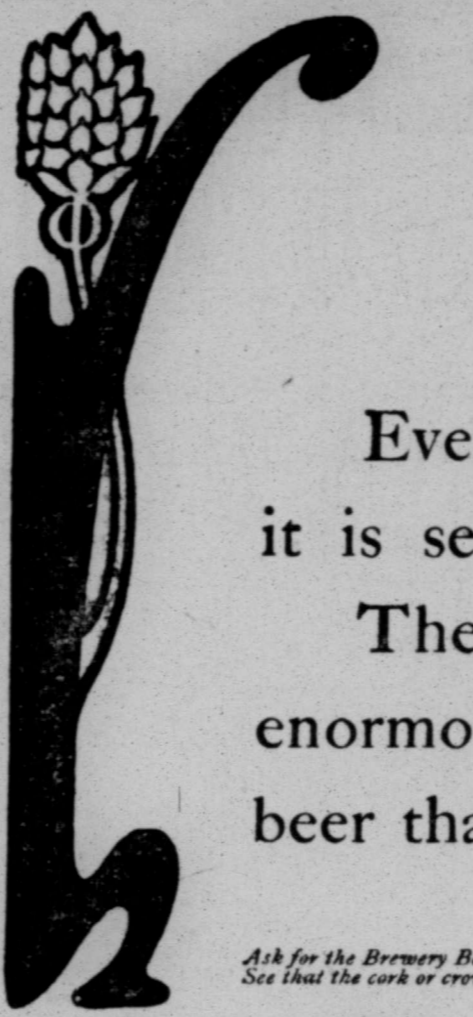


J. G. PHELPS STOKES.

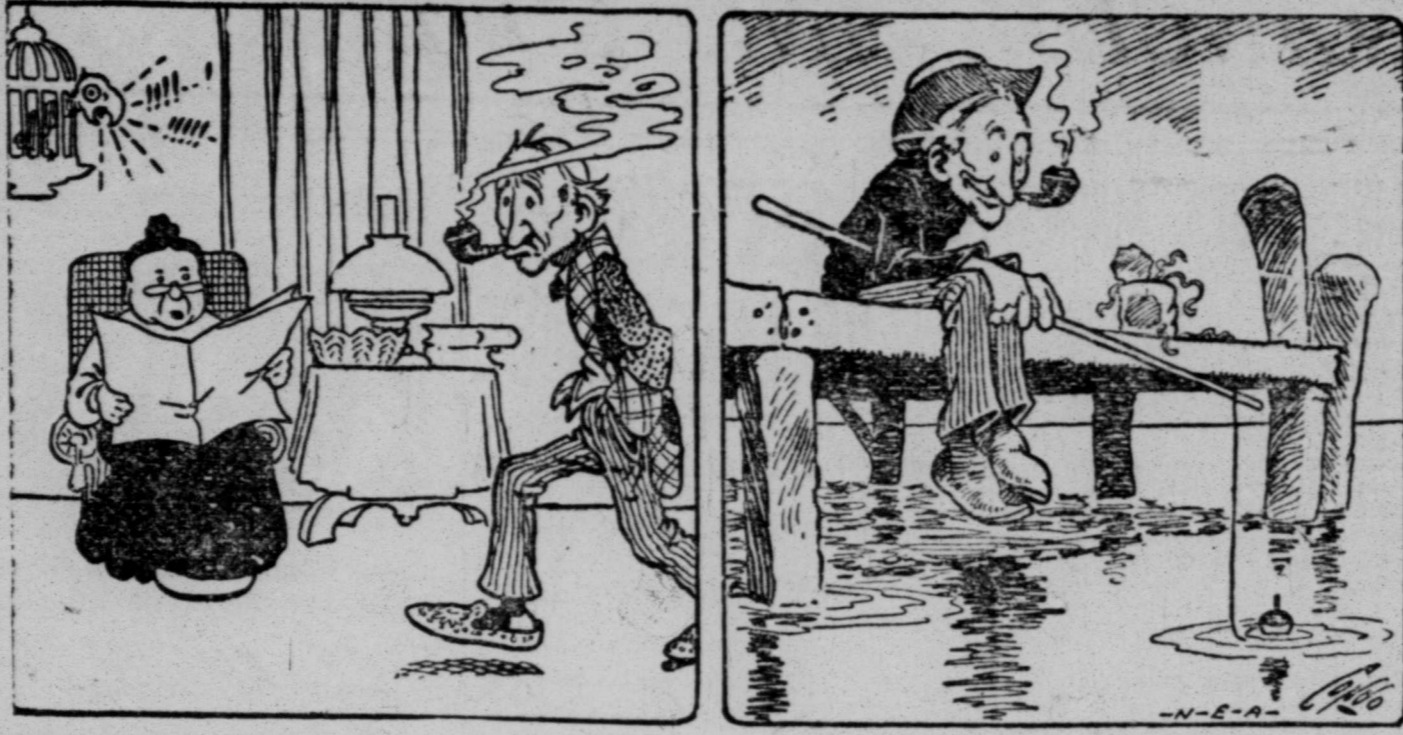

WHAT WOMEN SHOULD KNOW BEFORE THEY TALK

By Ella Wheeler Wilcox

Two intelligent, gifted and well-educated women recently asked me, with more or less aggressiveness in voice and manner, how I could approve of the labor union organizations in America. "Look at England," they said, "and see what disastrous conditions the labor unions have brought about in that country. For the benefit of these women and the class they represent, I will give the following facts, which are authentic: In the early part of the last century the factories and mills throughout England employed child labor. Boys and girls at six years of age were lowered 600 feet below the earth, into the coal mines, and set to work, alone and in the darkness, for twelve hours a day. During the first few weeks a candle was given the terrified young children; but after their eyes became accustomed to the darkness, this unnecessary expense was avoided. There were no sanitary conditions provided for the food, or the air vitiated, and early in the year of our Lord 1800, a dreadful epidemic of fever among the laborers alarmed the mine owners and roused them to some measures of reform. The public was awakened to the existing conditions, and for the first time in history, asked parliament to pass protective laws for women and children. Now, listen to the laws which resulted, and imagine what the situation preceding this meeting of parliament must have been—Labor for children was restricted to twelve hours a day. No children under 9 years of age could be employed. Yet this was declared to be "an elysian state, compared to that prior to the interference of the law." Remember, it was the force of law alone which brought about even this small improvement. Capital felt no interest, and made not the least effort to better the surroundings of labor until its interests were threatened. And history states that prominent Christian people denounced the action of the government for interfering with the liberty of the employer. Speaking of the condition of England at that time, Walter Besant has said: "There is nothing in the whole history of mankind which shows more clearly the enormities which become possible when men, stirred by the desire for gain, are left uncontrolled by laws or the weight of public opinion," and placed in a position of absolute mastery over their fellow men. The record of the English mine and mill is blacker than the record of any other slavery the world has known. For "the women and the children are inarticulate, and in the dark places with the hand of the master is armed with the scourge of the scorpion, where no light of publicity penetrates." The evidence before the Royal Commission showed that the children who worked twelve hours in the mines were, when drawn up, "heavy and stupefied, and cared little for their food." Think of this, Madam, as you tuck your six and eight year old children into bed, fearing lest they have overplayed during the day! And then, Madam, ask, if you can, what good the labor organizations have done in the world! And endure, if you dare, in the face of such facts as these, the American newspapers which, as you love to express it, "create dissatisfaction between capital and labor."

But try and exercise the undeveloped gray matter in your brain, to understand that it is because of the organization of labor and because of the freedom of the press that such con-

Mercury Tumbles 22 Degrees Over Night and Promises to Go Still Lower

From 10 o'clock Monday night until 7 o'clock this morning the temperature in the city of Fort Worth took a slump from 71 degrees to 49 degrees, a decrease of 22 degrees in nine hours. The cold snap struck the city with a wind from the northwest. Temperatures were gradually lowered throughout the night and the early hours of the morning, reaching the minimum of 49 degrees. WORKMAN UNEARTHS PIRATE'S BONES Daring Deeds of Doughty Captain Hicks Recalled by Discovery on Island Near New York NEW YORK, April 11.—The bones of Captain Hicks, a notorious pirate, are believed to have been unearthed on Bedloe's Island. While digging for a foundation for several new buildings a laborer threw up in a shovel of earth a brittle object that resembled a human thigh bone. An almost perfect skeleton finally was collected. From the position of the skeleton it could be seen that the arms and legs were pinned close together at the time of burial, which led to the suggestion that the skeleton of the pirate captain had been unearthed. When one of the laborers turned up a semi-petrified section of a wooden gibbet it became almost certain that the bones were those of the pirate. Captain Hicks, with his fleet, cruised about the Carolina coast, venturing sometimes as far north as the end of Long Island, preying on New York shippers. He was finally captured, brought to New York, convicted and sentenced to be hanged on Bedloe's Island. The execution was public, and the island was crowded at the time. Work was begun on Tenth street, between Throckmorton and Houston, this morning for the laying of paving brick. The Northern Texas Traction Company and property owners are having the work done. A large force of men with teams are lowering the level of the street.

WORKMAN UNEARTHS PIRATE'S BONES Daring Deeds of Doughty Captain Hicks Recalled by Discovery on Island Near New York NEW YORK, April 11.—The bones of Captain Hicks, a notorious pirate, are believed to have been unearthed on Bedloe's Island. While digging for a foundation for several new buildings a laborer threw up in a shovel of earth a brittle object that resembled a human thigh bone. An almost perfect skeleton finally was collected. From the position of the skeleton it could be seen that the arms and legs were pinned close together at the time of burial, which led to the suggestion that the skeleton of the pirate captain had been unearthed. When one of the laborers turned up a semi-petrified section of a wooden gibbet it became almost certain that the bones were those of the pirate. Captain Hicks, with his fleet, cruised about the Carolina coast, venturing sometimes as far north as the end of Long Island, preying on New York shippers. He was finally captured, brought to New York, convicted and sentenced to be hanged on Bedloe's Island. The execution was public, and the island was crowded at the time. Work was begun on Tenth street, between Throckmorton and Houston, this morning for the laying of paving brick. The Northern Texas Traction Company and property owners are having the work done. A large force of men with teams are lowering the level of the street.
