WITH THE CATTLEMEN

SOUTH DAKOTA MEETING

RAPID CITY, S. D., April 13.—Not since 1902 have the cattlemen of Western South Dakota held themselves to Rapid City to engage in annual confab under such auspicious and encouraging circumstances as they will this week.

A convention of the strenuous order is expected. It will, to some extent, reflect last year's unsatisfactory conditions in range cattle circles.

With a rising market and light winter losses, the Western South Dakota cattleman is in high fettle. He scouts an opportunity to cash-in some cattle that did not look like good property last fall.

"Hugh Chittick, live stock agent of Smithville, drove in this morning. "Hugh" has been in the Missouri river country lately and gives a rosy view of things from the cattleman's standpoint.

"Grass is three weeks ahead of its usual time," he said. "It is growing nicely, not only in South Dakota, but also in the North Dakota, and I do not believe there is any precedent for present conditions."

Ranchmen had plenty of hay last fall to carry their she-stuff and young stock and plenty of it is still left in the stack. And what is more, there is an abundance of old grass still on the ground.

"A year ago at this time," continued Mr. Chittick, "range cattle were scandalously poor. Now they are in elegant shape and average 100 pounds or more in weight than at any time in the last ten years at this particular moment."

Jeff Carr returned last Saturday from his southern trip and reports having purchased about five thousand head of 2 and 3-year-old steers for spring delivery. These cattle were purchased from a ranch which joins the Rio Grande river and they are of the same grade as well-bred Texas cattle.—Pierre Stock News.

### NAN PATTERSON'S SISTER IN JAIL

Actress Weeps Bitterly When They Meet After Long Separation

NEW YORK, April 12.—J. Morgan Smith and his wife, who were brought here from Cincinnati to answer a charge of conspiracy with Nan Patterson to obtain money from Caesar Young, will not plead to the indictment until next Friday. They were arraigned in the court of general sessions yesterday, but upon request of their attorney the case was continued. They will remain in custody in the meantime, not being able to furnish bail in any amount, according to the statement of their counsel in court.

There was an affecting scene when Nan Patterson and her sister met in the Tombs prison. When last they saw each other they occupied an apartment together in an uptown hotel. Today both were prisoners. Miss Patterson had gained the consent of the warden to see Mrs. Smith as soon as she was brought to the prison. They were left alone, standing with their arms around each other's shoulders, weeping bitterly. As the attorneys and several prison officials stood outside the room J. Randolph Patterson, the aged father of the prisoners, joined the group. He pleaded with the warden not to separate the girls.

## SAN FRANCISCO'S MAYOR WANTS EXCLUSION ACT TO BAR JAPS

Eugene E. Schmitz, Labor Champion, Regards Them as a Far Greater Menace Than the Chinese

 SAN FRANCISCO, April 12.—"I would sooner see the bars of civilization let down on this western borderland to the heathen Chinese, and meet all of the grave dangers incidental to their coming, than to witness an unrestricted Japanese immigration, fraught with the many greater evils that would at once beset our industrial welfare if the brown toilers of the mikado's realm were permitted to swarm through our gates unhindered."

San Francisco's labor mayor, the Hon. Eugene E. Schmitz, thus promptly stated his views upon one of the nation's vital problems, at the opening of an interview in his office at the city hall.

"The Japanese are far more dangerous to us than the Chinese," he continued, as he settled his ample shoulders back in his chair. "It is my firm belief that an exclusion act, even more stringent than the present one, should be passed in the matter of the Japanese immigrants. To one who has given the matter constant and careful attention, it is at once apparent that Japs are to be feared more than the Chinese, primarily because of the cheapness of their labor. We may say that the Japanese is enlightened, and, this being true, his education prompts him to adopt American ways, and thus, with his cheap labor, dig at the foundation upon which rests the welfare of our people. Where a Chinese will work upon a farm at starvation wages, a Japanese has the ability to acquire the property itself. The Chinese are dangerous enough, but the Japanese would drive all competition out of business. It is the stern duty of the American citizen, and particu-

larly of those of us upon this western coast, to scrutinize this evil and then suppress it with appropriate legislation."

"What are your views, mayor, upon the question of public ownership?" was asked.

"I believe the people should own and control those things which are necessary to life," he replied with great earnestness; "but I do not believe that property should be confiscated, or injustice committed in the further idea that things which may be termed luxuries should also revert to public ownership."

"It is a mooted question and one where the dividing line must be distinctly drawn. Understand me, I believe that such utilities as water and light, essential as they are to human existence, should not be in the hands of corporations, to be handled for personal gain. These things are unquestionably the inherent property of the people. But when we come to consider other subjects, such as transportation, another phase is given the matter. Here we have what may be termed a luxury. I could never be in sympathy with a movement that had for its aim the confiscation of properties belonging to transportation companies for purposes of public ownership. Any well regulated municipality can regulate such matters and prevent a transportation company from infringing on the rights of the people. Of course, the entire matter depends upon the means taken to acquire such public utilities. You have my idea in a nutshell, when you understand that I believe the people should control only those utilities that are necessary to their state of being."

"Since we have touched the question of transportation," remarked the interviewer, "let me ask your opinion of the street railway problem—do you

favor reduced fares—say, a 3-cent fare?"

"No, sir. I see no reason for such a sweeping innovation. I view the matter from both sides. In San Francisco we now enjoy a half-fare rate for school children during school hours, and we hope to get a similar concession for the working man, but I do not see why any railroad company, making but a fair profit on its investment, should be asked to reduce the 5-cent fare and establish another rate. I believe 5 cents, under ordinary circumstances, is a reasonable and righteous toll for street railway transportation, and I do not imagine that any right-minded citizen would advance a theory to the contrary; nevertheless, the half fare for school children is an equitable and beneficial reduction, and a blessing to the poor."

"The matter of the public health is almost a hobby with Mayor Schmitz. 'No law can be framed that will be too stringent in this regard,' he said, when asked to express his views, 'because the public health must be safeguarded above all things, and the hand of the

law must be left free and powerful in this regard.

"Here in San Francisco the board of health has, in the last two years, made notable advances, particularly in the matter of impure foodstuffs and milk supplies. By unrelenting care and an inspection of such sources of supply, the mortality has been reduced in this city. As I said before, no law can be too stringent in this regard, and no enactment can be too strenuous, for, with the public health at stake, a great work is to be done. Milk is the great, important subject. By eternal vigilance, constant tests and fearless exposure of those who pollute their products, the health of any great city can be improved."

"What is your opinion, mayor, of the social evil?" You know it is an unsolved problem—

"Yes, I know that. I may say that the question is most forcibly presented in a city such as this—a deep-water port, where craft from every land bring their hosts. It is, as you suggest, still an unsolved problem, but to my mind it can be carefully worked out by those in authority, without publicity, and with adequate protection afforded the young and the innocent."

"Of course, everyone must admit that the social evil is a stern condition that cannot be disposed of by pretty theory. The social evil always ex-

ists now and always will exist.

"You can say for me that, after deep study, I do not think any municipal recognition is advisable or should be given the evil. It can be closely watched and not allowed at any time to spread, or to flaunt itself in view of the young, or of the community itself. It can be successfully coped with by a firm city government, and minimized by eternal vigilance. But no city government—no people—can wisely give the social evil the slightest recognition. That is my opinion.

"Together with the right-thinking citizens of this particular community, I greatly deplore the unwarranted publicity that has been given to this subject by a portion of the press in San Francisco. Such publicity can never accomplish good, and simply calls attention to the existence and location of the evil. And it should never be made an issue in political struggles."

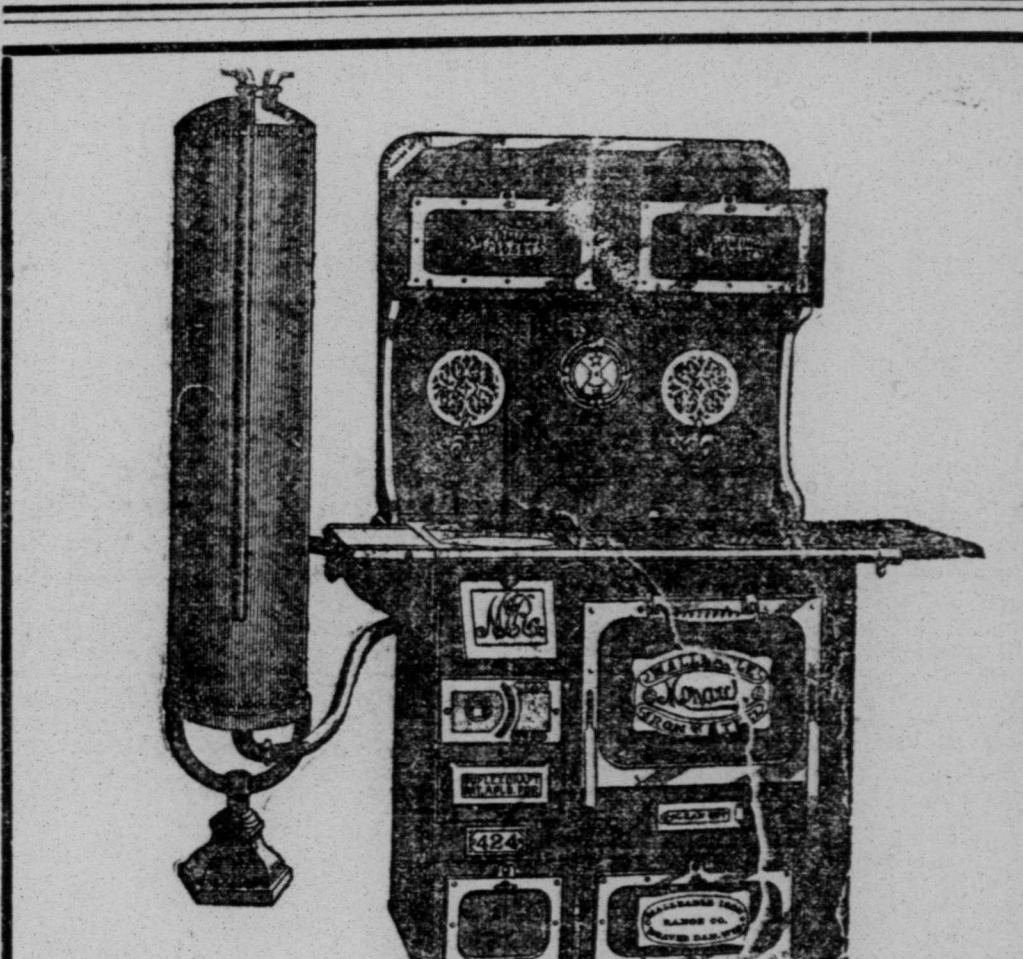

### RAILROADS FORM INDUSTRY LEAGUE NEW ERA IS OPENED

Organization Effected at Dallas to Secure Upbuilding of State at Large

Desirable Immigration, Factories and National Conventions to Be Sought

United action of Texas railroads to secure new enterprises, industries and gatherings in Texas was decided upon and arranged at a meeting in Dallas Wednesday, at which the Industrial Association of Texas Railroads was formed.

Under the plans as formed the organization will act for the good of Texas as a whole, first endeavoring to locate industries within the state, the point of location to be considered later.

In line with this policy the farmers' institute work carried on by the Agricultural and Mechanical College and the United States department of agriculture, were endorsed and determination made to co-operate with these as well as the Texas Horticultural Society in its efforts to secure the convention of American Nurserymen in 1906. The association will also work in harmony with the General Managers' Association, recently organized.

Discussion of the best means of securing the influx of cotton mill operatives to the state occupied a portion of the meeting.

Quarterly meetings of the association will be held, the first being called for July 12 at Corpus Christi.

Officers were chosen as follows: Stanley H. Watson, industrial agent of the Houston and Texas Central at Houston, permanent chairman.

F. B. McKay, general freight and passenger agent of the Texas Midland at Terrell, secretary and treasurer.

Executive committee, Mr. Watson, Mr. McKay and T. L. Peeler, industrial agent of the Katy at Dallas.

Railroad men in attendance at the meeting, thought to mark the opening of a new era in Texas industry were: Stanley H. Watson, industrial agent of the Houston and Texas Central, Houston; T. L. Peeler, industrial agent of the Katy system, Dallas; Captain J. H. White, industrial agent of the Frisco system; William Doherty, general passenger agent St. Louis, Brownsville and Mexico, Corpus Christi; J. B. Brooks, general agent San Antonio and Aransas Pass, San Antonio; F. B. McKay, general freight and passenger agent Fort Worth and Denver City railway, Fort Worth; L. C. Hill, industrial agent Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe, and M. L. Morris, traveling freight and passenger agent International and Great Northern.

**NEW OIL LINE**  
Houston Business League Approves Proposed Construction

The plans of Edward Kennedy of Beaumont to construct a railroad from Watson and Sour Lake via Humble to Houston, to be an extension of the Sour Lake and Beaumont line, which is now in operation, have been approved by the Business League of Houston.

Mr. Kennedy's plans are to organize a construction company in Houston with a capitalization of \$100,000, which he claims will place him in position to easily finance the entire proposition.

It is said that the territory to be traversed offers one of the best short line propositions in the south. The organization of the construction company is already under way, but thus far details of the plans have not been made public.

**TELEPHONE WIRES GO UNDERGROUND**

Steps toward the placing of all telephone wires underground in the business section of the city by the Southwestern Telephone Company, as forecast several months ago in The Telegram, were begun Wednesday afternoon, when representatives of the company visited property owners asking necessary permission to attach small cables to the ends of buildings carrying wires into the buildings.

In explaining the plans this morning District Manager Henderson said that all owners of property touching the alleys between Main and Rusk streets and between Houston and Throckmorton streets, in the district between the union station and the court house, would be visited. Wires will then be placed underground in those alleys, not even a distributing pole as now maintained in many underground systems being used. The plans Mr. Henderson said are the latest in telephone engineering and by obviating all chance of crossed wires reduces the fire risk to a zero point.

When the system is installed, Manager Henderson says, it will be impossible from without to see any signs of telephone connection, the plans in addition to safeguarding the buildings and clearing the streets of wires and poles, improving the service by doing away with all interruptions of service through storm broken wires.

The system, known as the block wire system, has been established in several of the larger cities. Work will be commenced as soon as the necessary permission is secured.
