Promotion of Country Club Is Underway

An association has been formed to promote a country club in Dimmitt.

First work on the plan began several weeks ago and at present the only positive thing done has been selection of a site and the obtaining of a 60-day option.

The Dimmitt Country Club would, as presently planned, consist of a golf course, a large swimming pool, a club house and a fish pond which would be kept well stocked for members' use.

The Dimmitt sponsors are taking their cue from other nearby towns, such as Olton and Muleshoe, who formed Country Clubs of this nature to provide recreational facilities for the people of their towns.

While membership fees have not been set and final cost of the operation is unknown at this time, every indication is that fees will run in excess of \$300 per family.

Supporters of the country club idea are confident enough members can be obtained to construct the envisioned facilities. Nearby towns have had less trouble than anticipated in raising enough funds.

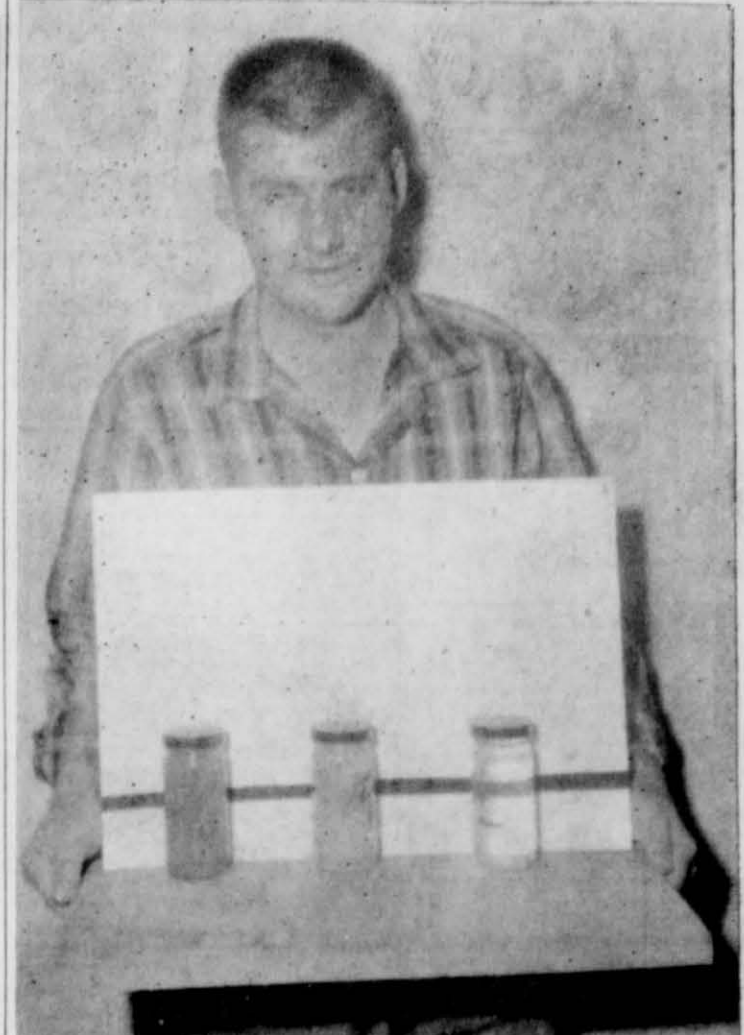
Basin for the country club would be the golf course. Probably some 50 golfers from Dimmitt patronize golf courses in nearby towns at least one time each month. There are a dozen or so who play several times a week. Promoters of the Country Club here believe that there are plenty of golfers to make the plan go over. Additional in-

centives of the swimming pool, club house, and fishing pond are expected to help in the drive for members.

The location picked by the association is about eighty acres on the Joe Butler farm about 1/2 mile southwest of town. Agreed on price for the acreage is \$200 per acre and the tract is only a short distance from pavement.

Members of the planning committee for the project are Ben Hill, Bill Harman, Ray Bearden, Joe Butler, Charley Hays, B. M. Nelson, Bob McLean, Joe Cowen, G. L. Willis, M. E. Cleavinger, Earl Brock, Don Vaughn, H. W. Golden, Russell Moran and John McCleskey.

Since the committee is inquiring about and studying almost every phase of the country club idea there is little definite information at present. However, it would appear that Dimmitt residents will have the opportunity of investing in a country club in the near future. Materialization actually depends upon whether or not enough memberships are sold to finance the project. Most committeemen think it can be done.

The center bottle was taken several hours after application and shows signs of clearing up and the bottle on the right was taken 24 hours after application. Wyatt said he could stand his head in the lake and see toes of his boots the day after application. This means that recharge wells can take lake water indefinitely now without being shut down to pump out collected mud silt which in turn should add many years to the life of the High Plains underground water reservoir. Water engineers consider this a tremendous step forward in conservation and also believe the chemical may turn out to be a good soil conditioner. Mr. Aaron T. Isaacs was named Wednesday night, June 17, as new manager of Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc.

Isaacs, for two years comptroller of the mill and a half dollar firm, will succeed Blanton Armstrong, who recently left the post after a four-year tenure.

A former Shamrock resident, Isaacs operated a private accounting firm there before moving to Dimmitt. He attended college at Panhandle A&M at Goodwell, Oklahoma, majoring in business and minoring in physical education. He is a native of Shamrock.

Isaacs and his wife, Gloria, have three sons, Felton, 6, John, 4, and Lesly, 2.

The new manager said this week that general business policies of the co-operative will remain the same as in the past and that every effort would be made to render courteous, prompt service to the farmers of this area.

Bowling Alley Opening Here In 3 Months

Dimmitt will have a brand-new bowling alley beginning about September 15th.

To be located at the corner of East Second and Lee Streets, the new alley will be owned and operated by Glenn Batson, E. M. Lowe, and A. C. Bridwell, all of Littlefield.

The three men will build their own building and construction starts next week.

The alley will be modern, with eight lanes serviced by AMF automatic pinsetters.

There will also be a snack bar in connection with the bowling alley.

"Cottonbowl Lanes" will be the name of the new recreational facility. It will be the first experience any of the men have had in building and operating a bowling alley.

The building will be of concrete block construction and completely modern, measuring 50x140 feet. There will be a 100x150-foot parking area alongside the building. It will be refrigerated air conditioned with a solid front.

Completion date for the new building is expected at August 15th with about a month required for installing the lanes, pinsetters, and other equipment.

This will be the first regulation bowling alley ever operated in Dimmitt.

Batson also operates the Batson Motor Company, Littlefield DeSota and Plymouth agency. He has farming interests in Castro County. Lowe operates Lowe & Co., wholesale distributor of cigarettes

and other confections in Littlefield. Bridwell owns Littlefield Butane, Crescent Park Motel and Crescent Park Swimming Pool in Littlefield and Sudan Butane in Sudan. The three partners also own Citadel Finance Company in Littlefield.

The three partners plan to open an office of Citadel Finance Company in Dimmitt in the near future.

Mr. Batson said this week that charges for bowling will be in line with charges in other area lanes. Shoe rentals and bowling ball sales will be available.

Frank Thornton of Littlefield will operate the bowling alley. He will move to Dimmitt about September 1 with his family. He is a member of the First Baptist Church and is presently employed by Hall Motor Company in Littlefield. Mr. Thornton will attend a special school for bowling alley operators.

"Actually, this will be the most modern and complete bowling alleys in West Texas," Mr. Batson said this week. "The equipment we are using has just been placed on the market and Cottonbowl Lanes will be better than anything in this area."

Special team night will be set up if enough interest is shown, Mr. Batson said.

Bowling is a game played upon a smooth board floor or alley, 42 inches wide and 60 feet from the foul line, which the player must not cross, to the center of

Constitutional Amendment Set Stage for Liquor Elections

There is considerable discussion going on over town about a June 4 Texas Supreme Court ruling that precincts or smaller governmental units could vote themselves wet.

Since Castro County is alcoholically as dry as desert dust, it stands to be affected tremendously by the probable ruling the Supreme Court will make when it reviews the case soon. General opinion is that the Justices will not reverse their June 4 decision and that in a matter of weeks it will be possible to call a liquor election here on a precinct or city level.

This is not an editorial, so this writer will go only into the physical aspects of the situation as they exist now.

Judge Robert Estes said this week that one person had made a positive effort to obtain a liquor license but was turned down until the law is changed. The Judge also said that a number of other people had inquired about the possibility.

The inquiries came based on a liquor election held in Castro

County in November, 1936. At that time the drys won 622 to 349 (based on a report in the Castro County News, dated November 5, 1936). Despite this almost two-to-one majority, nine voting precinct boxes out of the seventeen voted wet. Inquiries about liquor permits were based on the possibility that the voters of one precinct voted wet in that election and therefore, according to the Texas Supreme Court Decision, were eligible to sanction the sale of liquors and beer.

This is not so, according to interpretations of Texas law in the Southwestern Reporter. It boils down to "A commissioner's precinct cannot vote itself wet in an election that is county wide, even though a majority of the votes cast therein are wet." Before a precinct can permit the sale of alcoholic beverages within its borders, there must be a special precinct election called and the measure must be approved.

All four precincts in Castro County corner at the center of the Court House in Dimmitt. Consequently, if any precinct in the

county votes wet, then a large portion of Dimmitt would automatically become wet. However, if it wanted to, the city could then call an election and vote itself entirely dry, but bars and package stores would be legal one foot outside the city limits.

The Supreme Court hearing will probably be by July 4th. If this is so, and the court does not reverse itself, then it is possible for an election to be called immediately thereafter.

To call the election a precinct must present a petition signed by 20 voters to the Commissioners Court.

Right or wrong, good or bad, in 1935 the Texas Constitution was amended (Sec. 20, Art. 16) to read in part:

"(b) The Legislature shall enact a law or laws whereby the qualified voters of any county, justice's (or commissioner's) precinct or incorporated town or city, may, by a majority vote of those voting, determine from time to time whether the sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes shall be

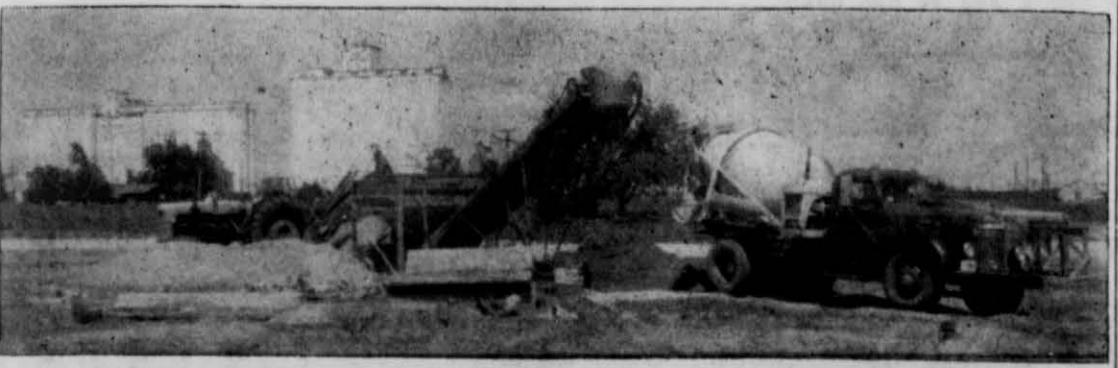

July 1 Last Day To Apply for New Grower Wheat

For the farmer who has no wheat allotment and intends to seed winter wheat for harvest in 1960, the deadline to apply for a new farm wheat allotment is not far off. It's Wednesday, July first and the application should be filed in writing at the Castro County ASC office.

Once the farmer applies, says ASC officials, his application will be studied on the basis of the tillable acreage, type of soil and topography of the farm. His own farming system will be reviewed, and the reasons why wheat was not planted on the farm in past years will be considered. If it all adds up to a convincing case in favor of wheat production on the farm in 1960, he will be assigned an allotment to the extent that acreage is available.

None of this affects the farmer who already has a wheat allotment or has an established record of wheat production on his farm. He gets notice of his wheat allotment without application. In fact, it should be showing up in his mailbox some day soon—well in advance of the nationwide wheat referendum now scheduled for the 23rd of July.

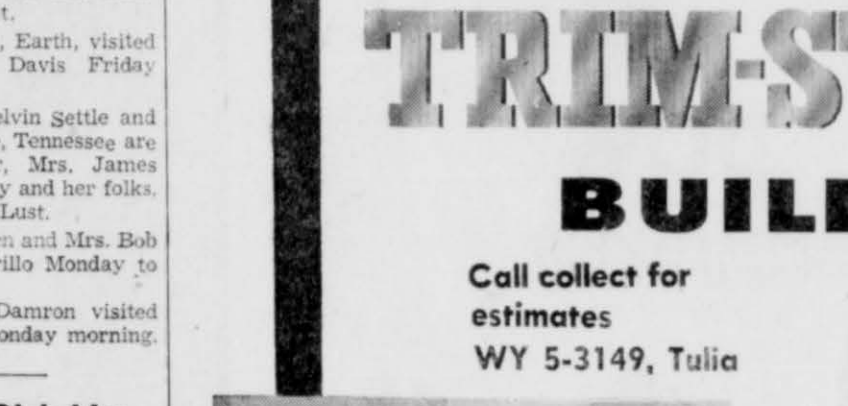
