TEN INNING GAME GOES TO PANTHERS

Stirring Finish Wins Close Game With Waco by Score of 2 to 1

Waco's Panthers seem to have formed a habit of heart-rending finishes. Yesterday afternoon they wound up the first argument with Waco in a manner that would make persons suffering with heart disease keel over and forget the affairs of this mundane sphere. They won out 2 to 1.

The game went ten innings and during eight of these neither outfit could manage a tally. The ninth developed one for mid-tempered Mike O'Connor's crowd and in the latter half of the same inning the Willis bunch landed one. The tie sent the discussion into an extra inning. In the front end of it the Waco boosters failed to do any business, but when the Panthers came in for a turn they started something that they were able to finish.

Butler, first up, poked the ball out to left and was standing on first base when Wilson came up and attempted the martyr stunt. Wilson popped a slow one over in Mr. McDermott's direction. The boy with the plentitude of blonde hair let the thing slip through his into left field. Butler had already started around the circuit and when McDermott finally pounced upon the ball, was between second and third. He hesitated for a moment and then, seeing that third was uncovered, tore toward the belted bag. In an instant there was a rush of the catcher, first baseman, pitcher and shortstop toward third. McDermott, who had the ball, threw it at the crowd. Nobody stopped it and it bounded over the turf. It was an easy thing for Butler to continue his tour toward home with the marker that meant victory. And the crowd went dippy.

Such a finish was enough to drive the most phlegmatic fan insane. To sit up for nine innings and see a clean, clever game of baseball with only one run showed over, was exciting enough in itself and the fans as a body were in a cold sweat by the time the Panthers tied the score. But a Hamburg finish, such as they made, was the real wheels and caused the Maud boys

in clothes to shy their Panamas into space. The moment was so exciting the gum-chewing brigade suspended operation and the soft drink vendors ceased their siren shouts.

This was the third time during the present week that the Panthers had shown that they are good finishers. In two of the Dallas games they came in at the close in a hurry-up finish, winning one and stopping just short of victory in the other.

At every stage of Friday's set-to they were there with the goods. Every man playing star ball. They moved along like the several parts of a well-oiled machine and not a bobble occurred during the day. All the way they had the chops from Waco town outclassed in everything except base running and that crowd certainly does know how to canter. The Panthers gathered in eight singles for their share during the controversy and O'Connor's aspirants only secured five for their portion. The locals did not make a miscue during the entire rack and the other fellows had three in addition to a number of scratches that made them spot up. All of this was costly, but it didn't spell anything to the locals until the ninth. Then they made progress.

Mauch, in the ninth, decided to hit and pushed the globe into right for one coupon. He swiped another by running down to second unmolested and was forwarded to third by Blasingim's fielder's choice. Young Mr. McDermott booted one from Sullivan and Mauch galloped home.

The glad story of the second tally has already been related.

That solitary digit accredited to O'Connor's salary grabbers came thusly: Bigbie, second up, jolted one to left and advanced to second when Whitman slid one so slowly toward Huddleston that the long person was compelled to lay on the turf to stop it. While Hud was picking himself out of the dust heap Bigbie anchored at second. He scored when Ragdale soaked one hard to center.

The most conspicuous playing of the day was that of Wilson, the new Panther in the right jungle. This person seems to be a valuable addition to the Panther family. During the performance he had five chances and accepted every one in faultless style. But the mere acceptance of the chances does not suffice. His work must have been the model from which high field work was patented. Young, strong, a nicely put up, he has a pair of two-minute propellers that carry him over the grassy meadow right under the winded run-seekers. Every one of his chances were difficult yesterday. And he can hit, too.

Huddleston and Pruitt pitched great ball, but the razor-edged work of the individuals behind them kept the hit record down to the low water mark.

TRADE ITEMS Clarendon reports 5,000 head of cattle on the open market. By grading the flock of sheep for sale into bunches according to size, kind and quality, they will appear to a better advantage and will sell at better prices.

Reports from Knox and King counties in the upper Panhandle are to the effect that the range is fine, grass being knee high. For poor lands and short pasture sheep are better adapted than cattle and should be kept in preference. It is impossible to raise big mutton sheep on short pasture and without grain or roots.

Professor Mumford of the Illinois feeding station has thoroughly demonstrated that young cattle are more profitable to feed than mature ones. They make faster gains and their carcasses command better prices. Combined receipts of cattle at the five big packing points last week amounted to 146,800 head, or 19,000 more than the week previous, and 15,000 more than for the corresponding week in June last year.
