

## Plains Memorial Hospital, Inc. To Open Here In Near Future

### Memberships Being Sold In Plains Memorial Hosp. Public Meeting Mon. Night

Upon receipt of the charter for the Plains Memorial Hospital Inc. the members of the Board of Directors of that institution formally purchased memberships in the organization and authorized the sale of memberships to the public. Although no intensive membership selling campaign has been launched approximately 100 families have purchased memberships in the association. A meeting of the Board of Directors will be held the latter part of this week for the purpose of mapping a promotional campaign with public meeting dates to be set for each of the various communities in the county. The first meeting of this type will be held in the Dimmitt High School auditorium Monday night Nov. 26 at 8:00 o'clock at which time the various phases of the Cooperative Hospital plan will be discussed and selling of memberships on a large scale will begin. Everyone interested in the Cooperative Hospital Movement is urged to be present at this meeting and to become acquainted with the details of the only type of hospital that brings a complete health service to the smaller towns and rural areas of our state.

#### PLAINS MEMORIAL HOSPITAL, INC. OPERATING PLAN

Plans for the operation of the Plains Memorial Hospital Inc. are briefly:

Lifetime membership for family unit \$50.00 (a family unit is composed of father, mother, and all unmarried children.)

Annual dues: Each family pays annual dues which entitles every member of the family to receive doctors and surgeons service for the entire year free of charge. Annual dues are based on the number of members in a family: 1 member, \$12.00; 2 members, \$18.00; 3 members \$22.00; 4 members, \$25.00; and \$2.00 per member for all over 4 in the family. Dependents in the home may be included in the free service plan for \$6.00.

When surgery is required member pays cost on supplies used, \$20 is charged to cover cost of anesthetic and operating room supplies in major operations. In minor operations the charge is \$10; charge for hospitalization is \$5.00 per day. No dividend can be paid on stock in the hospital, therefore, any money earned by the hospital will become assets of the hospital and can only be used to purchase additional equipment and to increase the service to members of the organization.

Non members receiving treatment in the health center will pay the prevailing rates charged by other hospitals in the area.

The Plains Memorial Hospital will operate in the location of the former Dimmitt hospital until a suitable location can be secured and a building erected.

#### History of Organization of Plains Memorial Hospital, Incorporated

Citizens interested in the organizing of a Cooperative Hospital for Castro County made preliminary investigations early last spring and learned before any definite action was taken, that Dr. Cogswell was in accord with the movement and would sell his equipment to and work for a hospital of that type. In order to get some definite movement underway the president of the Dimmitt Lions Club was requested to appoint a committee who were in turn to select a temporary board of directors for the purpose of organizing and launching the Cooperative Hospital Movement. The board of Directors selected is composed of W.R. Simon, pres.; E.L. Carpenter, vice pres.; T.E. Harrison, sec.; Tom Bice, Sam Hunter, Ed Drerup, O. D. Dinwiddie and B. M. Nelson.

The first meeting of the Board of Directors was held May 8th, at which time the above named officers were elected and the title of "Plains Memorial Hospital, Inc." selected as the name of the institution.

In subsequent meetings by-laws and constitution for the organization were adopted, with the general plan being the same as those in use by the South Plains Cooperative Hospital at Amherst, Texas, and the Elk City Community Hospital at Elk City, Oklahoma.

On June 26th the Board of Directors of the proposed Plains Memorial Hospital, Inc., entered into a gentlemen's agreement with Dr. R. E. Cogswell to purchase the Dimmitt Hospital equipment for the sum of \$18,000.00 with the understanding that the Association would pay for any additional equipment received by the hospital after that date. Signing of contracts were deferred pending arrival of the charter for the hospital association. Due to the fact that the special Act passed by the last session of the State Legislature authorizing the Secretary of State to charter cooperative hospitals in towns of 2500 population or less failed to receive a two-thirds majority in both houses, the law did not become effective until 90 days after adjournment of the Legislature. Consequently the application of the Plains Memorial Hospital, Inc., for a charter did not bear fruit until September 4, when the charter was granted. A meeting of the Board of Directors was held immediately following the receipt of the charter, and at which time it developed that a number of problems had arisen for which solutions had to be found before final signing of contracts, in keeping with the previous agreement with Dr. Cogswell, could be completed. All details in connection with the purchasing of the Dimmitt Hospital equipment and the employing of Dr. Cogswell have been cared for and contracts were signed by both parties Wednesday.

#### DIMMITT HOSPT. EQP. PURCHASED

#### DR. COGSWELL IS CHIEF OF STAFF

Contracts were signed Wednesday for the purchase of the Dimmitt Hospital equipment and for the employment of Dr. R.E. Cogswell as Chief of Staff, after negotiations had been underway by Dr. Cogswell and the board of directors of the Plains Memorial Hospital, Inc., for the past several months although no definite date for the opening has been set, the contract for Dr. Cogswell's services begins on or before January 1, 1946. It is hoped by officials of the Hospital Association that the free service plan can be placed in operation on December 1 or 15; opening date however, depends on the return of Dr. Cogswell to Dimmitt who has been at the Charity Hospital, New Orleans for the past several weeks for specialized training in that institution.

With the opening of the Plains Memorial Hospital Inc. Dimmitt will become the second town in the entire state of Texas to have a cooperative hospital, the first hospital of this type in Texas was established in Amherst in 1941 with a very modest beginning and at the present has approximately \$200,000.00 worth of equipment and building assets, and employs three surgeons. It is believed that with the proper support of the people of this area that the Plains Memorial Hospital Inc. will be one of the largest health centers in the Panhandle within the near future.

#### LOCAL MEN ATTEND DAIRY SCHOOL

Ten Castro County Dairymen and the County Agent attended an all day dairy school at Tulia, Thursday, November 15. A very interesting discussion was given throughout the day with approximately 10 dairymen from 7 counties present.

L.T. Simon, sec. of Texas Dairy Cattle Club discussed Herd improvement through breeding. Mr. Simon pointed out the method used in classifying dairy animals and also how to star bulls. The importance of using proven star bulls was stressed.

G.G. Gibson, Extension Dairyman discussed Feeding the dairy herd. Mr. Gibson pointed out that to get good milk production you must have cows with the breeding to produce, then you must have the feed and labor to tend to them correctly.

The importance of a balanced ration consisting of protein, carbohydrates and fats, Vitamins and Minerals was stressed.

Dr. I.W. Rupel, Head of the dairy Department of Texas A and M College discussed Herd management and stressed four important facts in herd management. These were:

1. Feed Production Program
2. Breeding Program
3. Calf raising and heifer development program
4. Health program

Dr. E.A. Grist, Extension Veterinarian discussed Mastitis. Dr. Grist pointed out there were two kinds of Mastitis. These were Traumatic caused by an injury and this was not infectious and Bacterial caused by Bacteria which was infectious.

After the school was over Dr. Rupel and Mr. Simons classified some dairy cows.
