In subsequent meetings by-laws and constitution for the organization were adopted, with the general plan being the same as those in use by the South Plains Cooperative Hospital at Amhert, Texas, and the Elk City Community Hospital at Elk City, Oklahoma.

On June 26th the Board of Directors of the proposed Plains Memorial Hospital, Inc., entered into a gentlemen's agreement with Dr. R E. Cogswell to purchase the Dimmitt Hospital equipment for the sum of \$18,000.00 with the understanding that the Association would pay for any additional equipment received by the hospital after that date. Signing of contracts were deferred pending arrival of the charter for the hospital associcousins Carolyn and Sue Bagwell ter cooperative hospitals in towns lencheon at ulation or less failed to receive a two-thirds majority in both houses, the law did not become effective until 90 days after adjournment of the Legislature. Consesuently the application of the Plains Memorial Hospital, Inc., for guests of Mr. and Mrs. Emmitt a charter did not bear fruit until September 4, when the charter was granted. A meeting of the Board of Directors was held immediately ollowing the receipt of the charter, and at which time it developed that a number of problems had arisen for which solutions had to be found before final signing of contracts, in keeping with the previous agreement with Dr. Cogswell, could be completed. All details in connection with the purchasing of the Dimmitt Hospital equipment and the employing of Dr. Cogswell have been cared for and contracts were signed by both parties Wednesday.

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

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
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
