MOB WOULD LYNCH WOUNDED BANDIT

White William Chadburn Lay in Physia cian's Office, Angry Mob Clamored for His Life

WINFIELD, Kan., July 13 .- There were threats during the night of lynching William Chadburn, the surviving bandit who shot and killed Detective Calhoun yesterday, and he was guarded closely at the physician's office by the sheriff and a force of deputies until he can be taken to jail at Sedan today for safe keeping. He may recover from the wounds. Chad-burn was released from the Federal penitentiary at Fort Leavenworth a week ago, after serving three years' sentence for robbing the postoffice at Mullhall, Okla. The body of Ed Madigan, who was killed by the posse, will be buried in the potter's field.

Story of Crime C. S. Calhoun of Kansas City, an Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railway detective, was shot and instantly killed at Cedarville yesterday by two outlaws who were shot down later by a posse of citizens at Hewins, seven miles from Cedar-vale, close to the Oklahoma state line.

One of the outlaws, Ed Madigan, was instantly killed by the posse. The other, William Chadburn, was fatally wounded. Madigan and Chadburn held up six traveling men at a hotel in Winfield Sunday and escaped. At Cedarvale Detective Calhoun encountered both men on the street. Not being positive of their identity, Calhoun secured the city marshal and one of the robbed traveling men, and all three started in a carriage in search of the two men. They drove past the men in a side street. The traveling man identified them when either Madigan or Chadburn opened fire. Calhoun was shot through the heart and the outlaws made



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

There is a fascination in watching an experienced gun club team at the traps. A half dozen men stand in a semi-circle, face the box in which the traps are concealed. The first one aims at a point somewhere over the box, fingers his trigger, and shouts a warning, "Pull." Be hind him a boy jerks a cord, releasing the trap in the box and a clay pigeonwhich is not a pigeon and isn't made of clay, but is a small composition disks whirled up into the air. Maybe it goes to the right of the box, maybe to the left, maybe it goes straight ahead, skims along the ground or shoots up almost stright; the marksman never can guess the direction it is going to take. The muzzle of his gun moves an inch or two. he sight following the flying target. There is a crack, the spectators see the target break into pieces while still in flight, the referee calls "dead bird," and the next marksman in the semi-circle is ready for his turn.

Shooting live birds-pigeons are usedis different. Sensitive people have long decried the use of birds as targets, yet enthusiasts will argue there is less cruelty in it than many other forms of sport.
