NEW HAVEN, Conn., July 15.—Dean Wright of the Yale academic department in a report to President Hadiey says that one of the worst evils in Yale is the segregation of rich students in expensive ormitories. He said:



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



Most of the cattle were shipped early to northern pastures, the rest being picked up in very small bunches and shipped to market.

I do not see but what the state is making a good bargain by allowing it to stand awhile longer.

"The excuse for selling this land is to settle the country. It is also claimed that another reason is to furnish cheap homes to settlers. Candidly I cannot see why the state is obligated to furnish a few with cheap homes while the many must go without. So long as there is not enough land to furnish a home to all that will come to get one, then why should the land be sold for less than it is worth? Only a few will be provided with homes, and the price that will be asked will prevent many deserving people from getting possession of the land. Therefore the low price will make it possible for a cer; tain class to get the homes, and since it appeals to classes only, I think that the state should do justice to all her citizens by selling the land at auction, to the highest bidder and in any amount they would like to buy, providing the bidding was done on each individual sec-
