

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., July 18 .- As a result of advice received from Elihu Root, special counsel for Mayor Weaver, it is probable that the mayor will within a few days institute a criminal prosecution against persons prominent in municipal affairs. Mr. Root advises the mayor that in the face of the refusal of District Attorney John C. Bell to take the initiative in bringing furtheir prosecutions, the mayor should exercise his right to go before a magistrate and carry the prosecution as far as the law will permit him. This opinion was sent to Mayor Weaver today and was the result of a conference held in New York last Friday. FEWER KANSAS CATTLE

TOPEKA, Kan., July 18.-The cattle population of Kansas has decreased 6,860 during the past year. Returns of the county clerks to the state auditor show there are 3,179,500 cattle in the state now, against 3,185,860 last year. The assessed valuation is also down 9c per head. The average last year was \$5.57; this year it

Hogs show an increase of about 50,-000. Last year there were 1,140,450. This year there are 1,190,825. The price is a little lower though. Hogs were assessed this year at \$1.82 and last year

There are about 33,000 more horses in the state at present than there were year ago. The number now here is 780,054, against 746,171 last year, but the price has dropped from \$15 to \$11.

Sheep show a decrease, there being 200,239 this time, against 202,783 last Kansas continues to raise more

Mules show a big increase, 114,255 this year against 101,395 last. Price have adanced from \$16.71 last year to \$18.18.

harm to attendants. "Pooh," said Cabrera; "I'll tame the

beast." He issued invitations forthwith to scores of relatives and friends to see the Gaily attired they assembled at his handsome villa. After toasting the host in champagne the party repaired to the corral. When the bull was seen in a heavily-barred pen snorting with rage and clearly unmanageable, friends tried to dissuade Cabrera. He laughed them to scorn and vaulted the bars of the corral, giving word to the attendants to let down the bars on the opposite side and allow the

beast to enter. The savage beast dashed toward Ca-Then for the first time Cabrera's brera. Then for the firs suicide intent was seen.







NORWAY QUARREL

Question Which Resulted in Split Arise in 1827, Says Bjornstern Bjornsen

ENGLAND STARTED STRUGGLE

"We were united to Sweden in 1814, under one king. The question which has resulted in the cleavage first arose in 1827. A noteworthy fact is that England, by an unjust act, started the struggle. An English trading firm was caught smuggling in Bode, Nordland. By means of forged documents the English government induced the Swedish minister of foreign affairs to believe that damages were due from the Norwegian government for the onfiscation of goods and imprisonment of ersons. The Swedish foreign office was frightened into yielding, and Norway was nost unjustly compelled to pay. Subsequently great indignation was felt in Norway when it was found with what carelessness Swedish diplomacy had treated our interests, and Swedish tutelage was hotly denounced. Sweden had usurped authority granted neither by the Norwegian constitution nor by the act of

"I will mention some of the Norwegian claims which Sweden contested: That equal importance should be given to both kingdoms in the seal of the union; that Norway should have her own standard; that in Norway 'Norway and Sweden' should be spoken of instead of the reverse; that Swedish governors of Norway should no longer be appointed, as such appointment reduced our country to the evel of a province. Sweden eventually gave way on all these points, after holding out for a long time.

DIRECTION OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS

"Norwegians were appointed in the diplomatic and consular corps. Nevertheess, we could not obtain what we had most at heart-the sole direction of our own foreign affairs. A Swedish and Norvegian commission was named, which sat from 1865 to 1869. The Swedish members insisted that in return for other concessions Norway should recognize the Swedsh minister of foreign affairs as minister of the same department for Norway also. The Norwegian storthing rejected the proposal. In 1865 Sweden settled by law the question of our foreign affairs. question of our foreign affairs, which until then had been a royal prerogative. It was intrusted to the Swedish minister of foreign affairs. We saw in Iterated request for a share in the direction of the foreign policy was opposed the same answer, that we had to recognize the Swedish minister. In 1895 there was Plan for Fort Worth to Secure another mixed commission, which divided itself into several fractions. The work remained abortive and without result. Last of all, we witnessed an abortive attempt to give consular representation to each kingdom. This time the project emanated from Sweden. Russia Not Crushed

"Thirdly, Russia is not crushed, as the foreign press had led the world to believe. The interior situation is very serious. I do not deny, but in Europe and America the true significance of what is nappening is not understood. Correspondents come here and talk with a few hundred people in St. Petersburg and Moscow, misinterpret what is happening and fill the world with false impressions as to Russia's future.

"Russia has little resemblance to western countries. To know Russia, to understand the soul of the Russian people, it is necessary that one should have been born here or lived many years in Rus-The customs, history and mental psychology of the people are entirely different from those of western nations, and Russia cannot be judged by western standards. It is such an immense country, composed of diverse elements and interests, yet the Russian people are like a great family. At present they are torn by internal dissensions, but these divisreally feel that the integrity of the country and its future destiny were at stake. "Russia is not on the verge of dissolution as a great power, and is not obliged


