

Dr. Carlos Finlay of Havana had adraned the theory that a mosquito conveyed the unknown cause of yellow fever. but he did not succeed in demonstrating the truth of his theory.

Dr. H. R. Carter of the marine hospital service had written a paper showing that although the period of incubation was only five days, yet a house to which a patient was carried did, not become infected for from fifteen to twenty days. To Reed's mind this indicated that the unknown infective agent had to undergo a period of incubation of from ten to fifteen days in the body of the biting insect.





Trinity navigation to this city will be made an issue in the coming congressional race.

That a declaration favoring the active pushing of this matter before congressional committees on the part of the representative from the Twelfth Texas district is now assured, and a campaign of ssues is promised.

As announced exclusively in The Telegram of July 21, Engineer C. S. Riche, who made report for the government on the navigability of the stream to Dallas, following which steps for its establishment were taken, believes that the navigability of the river to this city is also practicable

Citizens of this city, it is believed, will readily raise a bonus sufficient to induce the government to make the outlay needed to extend operations to headwaters of the Trinity, any sum contributed being offset in a short time by reduced traffic rates necessarily following upon completion of water connections

A quiet campaign in the interest of Trinity navigation is now on foot and is meeting with a favor that promises to make it the issue of the congressional fight now rounding into shape.
