First Couple Were Crushed to Death by Train-Narrow Escape of Infant HILLSBORO, Texas, Aug. 7.-Asleep on the railroad track, two negroes were killed early Sunday about one and a half miles east from here on the Cotton Belt railroad and two others were badly bruised. Ray Edwards and his wife, Janie, were crushed to death and Henry Thompson and his wife, Mary, were badly wounded.

The negroes had been engaged in chopping cotton in the county and were on their way to Corsicana, traveling along the railroad track. Edwards and his wife were run onto by the train and were crushed to death. Their child, an infant girl of about 3 years, was passed over by the cars, but escaped injury.





ARGENTINE REPUBLIC CAN'T RAISE COTTON PLENTY OF MONEY Texas Man With Experience There Says That Country is Not Adapted to Producing the Staple WAXAHACHIE, Texas, Aug. 7 .- D. J. McGee of this city, representing a Liver-Funds Asked by Government pool, England, cotton firm, has just returned from an extended visit to South America. Mr. McGee visited the Argentine Republic for the purpose of investigating the conditions there with reference to the cultivation of cotton. He made his headquarters at Buenos Ayres, from which point he made frequent trips to other parts of the republic. Mr. McGee states that from his obser vations, he believes the attempt to raise cotton on an extensive scale in that country under present conditions would Federal Authorities Will Use be a failure. The most serious obstacle is the absence of competent labor, and while some cotton is grown there now, it is under the most primitive manner of

cultivation. He also stated that the northern part of the republic was a great wheat country, and that the finest horses and cattle in the world were raised there. Mr. Mc-Gee left Buenos Ayres on June 18, amid freezing weather, it being winter time there, and returned by way of London and Liverpool, reaching New York on July 27.
