### PEACE EMISSARIES OPEN CONFERENCE

Envoys of Russia and Japan Begin Sessions at Portsmouth Navy Yard

### ARMISTICE IS UNLIKELY

Believed No Truce Will Be Signed Unless Peace Is Assured From Start

### \*\*\*\*\*\* FIRST SESSION CONCLUDED

PORTSMOUTH, Aug. 9.—The first session of the peace conference has \* been concluded. It lasted about an \* hour. No business was done besides exchanging credentials and arranging the program for future sessions.

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Aug. 9.-The day which brings the initial meeting of the Russian and Japanese peace plenipotentiaries at the navy yard here opened with delightful weather onditions. Members of both the Russian and Japanese missions were early about the hotel and with the exception of Mr. Witte and Baron Rosen breakfasted in the main dining room. As several of the Russians were coming out of the dining room this morning they met two Japanese entering. They exchanged profound bows, but did not shake hands. An agreement was reached yesterday that the first sitting of the commission was to be held at 10 o'clock. There were many people waiting on the veranda of the hotel to witness the departure of the envoys.

With the approach of the hour of meeting the feeling became more pronounced than before an armistice will not be agreed upon unless the success of the negotiations is assured.

It is known the opposition of Japan to this formality and the hearty support which London is understood to have given Tokio, is believed to have operated to minimize the wish of the Russians for signal truce. Another cause for willingness not to press for an armistice at first meeting is believed to be the recent opposition said to manifest itself among the Russian forces at the front against the peace negotiations. It is felt that to ask them to sign the truce might have bad effect upon the spirits and serve to increase the opposition to ending the war.



### PRIVATE CAR LINE EVIL

The fruit and truck growers of Texas are up in arms against the private car line ev.l in this state, and it is stated on good authority that they will have all the power of the railroad commission of Texas behind them in the contest they have inaugurated for the amelioration of existing conditions, which are alleged to be irksome in the extreme. It is said the Denison fruit growers will institute the first test case against the private car companies. They insist on the privilege of icing their own shipments of peaches at the rate of \$25 per car, instead of paying the car line people \$60 per car, as is being demanded. The A. R. T. company, operating these cars in Texas, insists on icing all shipments made in the company's cars at its own figures, which ars said to be more than double the real

The use of these refrigerator cars has

done much to stimulate and encourage the development of the fruit and trucking industry in Texas, but the charges for using these cars have been advanced so steadily that the producers contend that It is stifling the very life blood out of their industry. When the late Phil D. Armour was still a comparatively obscure packer, he introduced the refrigerator car as a medium for handling fresh meat and was sufficient to induce the owners of the new car line idea to spread out and poultry and many other perishable products. agriculture: The weather was generally very warm during the past week. Over the northeastern and eastern sections, where heavy rains had continued so long, rainless weather prevailed. Elsewhere occasional scattered showers occurred and on the 2d showers were quite general. The dry weather has been very beneficial to crops over the northeastern portion of the state, and cultivation has proceeded rapidly. Crops are not yet, however, entirely clean. Texas is clear, and a few scattered weather has caused the soil to harden in showers are reported in the southern some localities. The week was quite generally favorable for farm work over the ed to some extent by showers. In some southern counties the dry weather has the last twenty-four hours-minimum been of long duration, and rain would be

> proved over the northeastern portion of Rain- the state by the favorable weather which prevailed during the past week. Cultivation was pushed as rapidly as possible, though much of the crop is still foul, and some will not be cultivated. Where clean the crop is now quite generally o in fair condition. Over the rest of the state there has not been much change the average condition of cotton. While there is still some tendency toward too much growth of stalk and poor fruiting, this tendency has been reduced. is still considerable shedding in southwestern and central counties. In a few counties rain is needed, and the absence of it has caused the crop to deteriorate somewhat. In some localities boll weevils and boll worms are doing great damage, but in general the numbers of these pests have been reduced by the dry weather. Cotton is opening rapidly in the south, and picking has become quite general over most of the southern and some of the south central counties. Pickers are rather scarce.

Corn-The crop of early corn has been made, and is ripening over most of the state. A good average crop is promised, but there has been some damage in the northeastern portion of the state. Harvesting is in progress in many southern counties. Late corn is generally doing well, but it is needing rain in some lo-

Rice and Sugar Cane-The rice crop is gererally growing well and looks promgar cane continues to do well.

Miscellaneous-Grain threshing has progressed rapidly in the northeastern portion of the state. Much grain was damaged by the previous rains. In the other portions of the state threshing is about completed. Gardens continued to deteriorate during the week, though in localities they are doing well. Meadows and pastures are good, and having was carried on under favorable conditions. Alfalfa and forage crops continue to do well. The harvesting for forage crops continued. ## TRACTION COMPANY TO EXTEND LINES

President Bishop Announces Plans for Increased Service

in the City

President George Bishop of the Northrn Texas Traction company announced Suesday afternoon upon his return from Dallas that his company will expend \$50,-00 in improvements on the Interurban and the city lines. The former are to be rock ballasted from Fort Worth to Oak Cliff, while the lines in this city are to be extended and otherwise put in better condition. Mr. Bishop said that the Hemphill line will be extended to the iron and bolt factory, about one mile from its present terminal, with heavy rails substi-

tuted for the present ones. Ballasting of the Interurban will cost about \$35,000 while the improvements in this city will run the total expenditures up to about \$50,000. He will make a rsonal investigation of the proposition to build the line through the Third ward, as announced in The Telegram, at the solicitation of Alderman W. R. Parker, who has been working hard to secure street car facilities for the citizens of that ward. President Bishop, it is said, will give favorable consideration to the plan and may decide to build the extension asked for by Alderman Parker and his
