HUMANE CAMPAIGN

NOW IN PROGRESS

Treatment of Animals Being Looked After by Local Organization

The Fort Worth Humane Society has recently revived its efforts to enforce the objects of its formation and will from now on see that dumb animals are the recipients of that consideration and care due them from owners.

It was said today that Fort Worth people are, as a general rule, free from abusing animals, but the Humane Society now proposes to carry out its work to the letter, if such a thing be possible.

"Be kind to and blanket your horse. Feed your horse. Treat the sores on your horse. Do not overload your horse. Do not overdrive your horse. Do not overcook your horse. Ordinance to prevent cruelty to animals passed by the council of Fort Worth is as follows: That it shall be hereafter unlawful for any one to cruelly beat or otherwise cruelly maltreat any dumb animal in the city of Fort Worth, or to wantonly kill, maim, wound, poison or disgrace any horse, ass, mule, mactle, sheep, goat, swine, dog or beast or any kind, or to mutilate or cruelly kill other domestic animal or bird, or to overdrive, overwork or use the same when such animal is maimed, wounded, lame or otherwise unfit for labor, or to willfully abandon same to die, or to carry or cause same to be carried, hauled or forced along in a cruel or inhuman manner, or to leave any animal tied up or confined anywhere, day or night, without proper feeding and caring for same. This article is not to be construed to prevent policemen or other persons from killing dogs when lawfully entitled to do so."

DR. TABOR TALKS OF PROBABLE DANGER

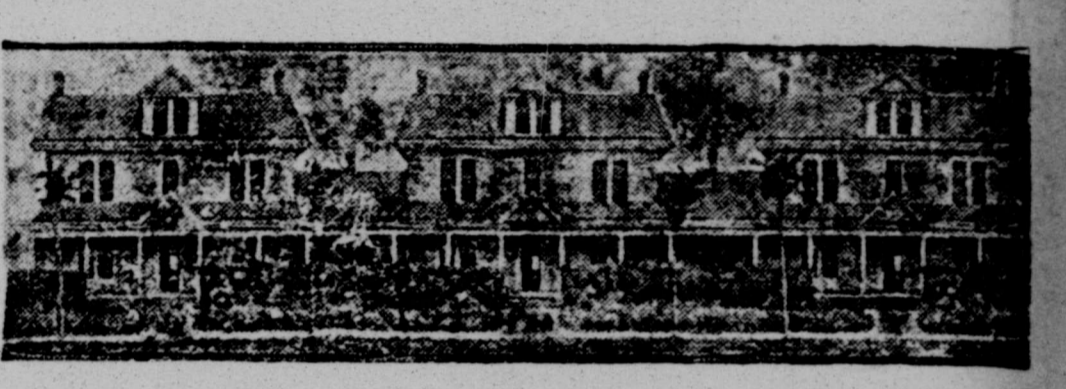

Large Area Withdrawn

Peculiar Action of U. S. Government as to Uintah Lands

SALT LAKE, Utah, Aug. 9.—Renewed activity is observed in the registration of applicants for lands on the Uintah reservation. At all points in Utah where registrations are being made the number of applicants increases daily. At Provo the total number registered to date is 9,824; at Vernal, 1,484, at Price, 1,035. It has developed that the area withdrawn from entry by the government is 200,000 acres, instead of 50,000 acres as at first reported. Much curiosity is manifested as to the purpose of withdrawing so large a tract, which is said to contain some of the best land in the reservation. So far as known, the government has no irrigation project in contemplation on the reservation, and no explanation has been made for the reason for withdrawing so large an area on the very eve of opening the reservation.

A rush of prospectors has begun to the mineral tract of the reservation, although Commissioner Richards in an interview is reported to have stated that mineral claims could not be taken up at present.

DOUBLE TRACK FOR CAR LINE PLANNED

Rosen Heights System to Arrange for an Increased Car Service

Notable improvement to be made by the Fort Worth and Rosen Heights street railway will be the double-tracking of the line as far as Chestnut avenue, Rosen Heights, beginning at or near Lee avenue, in North Fort Worth. This will give the company double track three-quarters of a mile in length and with the spur will permit the running of cars every seven minutes, instead of twelve, as at present.

President Sam Rosen says that it is possible to even make quicker time than this and it would not surprise him that the running time will be reduced to a five-minute schedule. If this can be done it will be done.

Rails and ties for this spur have already been bought and one car of the material has been received. Just as soon as enough of the rails and ties reach here the work of building the track will start. Graders are now at work.

The completion of the track through the cemetery and the spur will give the company two and a half additional miles of road. This work, previously announced in The Telegram, is being pushed rapidly.

These improvements, with the completion of a line to the South Side, as announced in The Telegram, and a possible line into the Third ward, will represent an outlay of a quarter million dollars.

ELKS PLANNING NEW QUARTERS

Building Committee Considering Plans for New Building for Use as Club Rooms

Since the purchase of the old board of trade building by the Continental Bank and Trust Company, in which is the Elks' club rooms, the local lodge of Elks has seriously begun to consider the matter of new quarters.

While the building committee of the lodge declines to make any statement at present, it is known that plans are under way for the purchase of an exclusive building for Elks.

PRICE ON OIL FOR AUTOMOBILES UP

Retail Grocers Secure Promise From Garage Keepers Not to Cut Quotations

Automobile owners must now pay more for the gasoline to propel their machines over the streets and roads. Action has come through the Retail Grocers and Butchers' Association report being made at the meeting of the organization Tuesday night that automobile dealers and handlers had been visited by the oil committee and asked to discontinue the selling of gasoline at cost or cost and a small percentage to pay evaporation charges, as was reported to have been the custom. Report was made to the association that the gasoline would not hereafter be sold under 20 cents a gallon.

The oil committee also reported favorably on arrangements with oil wholesalers by which they are to sell in lots of not less than fifty gallons. The committee was continued and suggestion made that the body communicate with that of Dallas, asking co-operation.

Car load lot sales were again discussed at the meeting, the general opinion being that the operations had come to an end here for the time being. W. L. Wise, who was made attorney for the association, also made a partial report in this connection.

Report of the board of directors, urging the admission of other business men to the association as honorary members, situational changes. Standing committees reported were approved as follows:

Auditing Committee—E. A. Reeves, Sam Stearns and J. I. Mulkey.

Legislative Committee—W. L. Wise, Albert Foutz, Harry Adams, Mack Bergman and J. S. Noel.

Wholesale Committee—J. J. Iptman, Harry Adams and W. H. Tanner.

Committee on Weights and Measures—Harry Palmer, Henry Hammann and A. Westman.

An entertainment committee was appointed at the meeting with Chairman Chambers and J. S. Noel, J. S. Jeffries, Mack Bergman and J. C. Martin as members.

Matter of having association stationery for use in collection of bills by members was discussed following accident secured in covery by a member of such stationery. A committee was appointed to investigate the matter and provide regulations to prevent any abuse of the system if adopted.

Addresses were made by representatives of local oil companies, flouring mills, jobbing houses and other industries, while practically every member present had something to say regarding personal experiences or association matters.

FEDERAL AGENTS BUSY IN TEXAS
Collecting Evidence Among Ranchmen for use of the Government

It is stated on good authority here that two representatives of the United States department of agriculture at Washington have been busy at work throughout this part of the state for the past two weeks investigating Texas cattle conditions. From the character of the work done it is clear that they are gathering information for use in the government's prosecution of the big packers.

These men have gone directly to the larger ranches of the cattle producing country, evidently with the desire to thoroughly familiarize themselves with the situation as viewed from the standpoint of the range producer. They have been very busy in the character of communications they have sent out, and their investigations have been conducted with great secrecy, but enough has developed to indicate that the federal government is systematically at work in the Texas range country in an effort to dig up all the evidence possible to be used in the trial of men now under indictment at Chicago on charges of operating as a combination in restraint of trade.

It is understood that the state of Texas will be carefully covered in this manner and ranchmen and cattle shippers generally will be given ample opportunity to furnish all the evidence they possess with regard to the situation. The federal government had the district attorneys of the various federal judicial districts in this state institute quiet investigation just prior to the meeting of the Chicago grand jury, but not much evidence of an important nature was unearthed, the cattlemen seeing the conditions under the apprehension that should they volunteer what they know they would be marked for vigorous retaliation when their cattle reached the big markets. Several of the leading ranchmen expressed themselves in this manner, and in order to obviate that feature of the situation and extend the cattlemen the protection they seem to think is their right, the government has sent these special men out down here to quietly get the desired information from the ranchers without the publicity that would attend a summons to attend a federal grand jury investigation.

TEXAS SUFFERS MOST
As Texas is the largest producer of range-bred cattle of any state in the union, the statement has been made and is persisted in that this state has suffered from the manipulations of the beef trust to a greater extent than any other state. It is a well known fact that during the past three years cattle values in this state have depreciated to the extent of millions of dollars, and while there has been some improvement in the situation since the beginning of the year, the normal has not been restored by any means. The cattle that have been rushed to market during the greater part of the present year have not brought prices that were satisfactory to the producers, and as market values have been low, the values prevailing on a range have been correspondingly reduced.

BLAME BEFF TRUST
The cattlemen of Texas are practically a unit in charging a majority of the ills that encompass them to the workings of a beef trust. And they have entertained but slight hopes of relief from the manipulations of the fact that they have continually doubted the sincerity of the movements that have been made by the government. They have believed that was all he had to do to get out until the indictments were finally returned against leading packers of the country, and now that the range investigation is being made for additional testimony, they have greater confidence in the situation, and the hope is quite freely expressed that relief from prevailing conditions will finally be consummated.

GARFIELD REPORT AGAIN
While the cattlemen in this section believe the packers will plead the Garfield report as a complete exoneration of all with which they are charged, it is known here that President Roosevelt is not yet through with the Garfield report. Cattlemen have been given the assurance that he does not accept his findings as final. In fact, it is known that other steps are to be taken prior to the assembling of congress that will bring the Garfield report to the front again in a manner that will be far from pleasing to its author.

And in the meantime, the cattlemen of the range country will furnish the government with the character of evidence it feels in need of to secure the desired results in the pending trials of the packers, who are now under indictment.

COUNCIL PASSES WEED ORDINANCE
North Fort Worth Provides a Penalty for Permission of Unhealthy Conditions

In line with general cleaning campaigns throughout the state, North Fort Worth, by the passing of a resolution at a meeting of the city council Tuesday night, put on foot a war against weeds and rubbish, making it a penalty for negligence regarding sanitary conditions. Persons allowing weeds or rubbish to collect on their property will be fined on conviction not less than \$1 nor more than \$25. All property owners will be notified of the new regulation early.

The Frisco, the Cotton Belt and the Belt railways will be instructed to clear weeds from their rights of way, while the Stock Yards Company will be served with a similar order.

In regard to collections of water and ponds, City Secretary Proctor was instructed to notify railroads and property owners that all standing water must be drained off.

A detailed report of the water works committee telling of the changes in the laying of pipe of additional lines was adopted. The report said that the planing would be complete by Sept. 1 and that the water system should be in operation by Sept. 15.

Alderman Lydon suggested that a committee be appointed to confer with the Rosen Heights railway company and the Northern Texas Traction Company in regard to street sprinkling. This was referred to the finance committee.

Estimate No. 4 amounting to \$12,342.49 in favor of the McQuatters Plumbing and Machine Company for work on the water works system was allowed. Payments allowed so far make a total of \$13,942.49.

Bids for the construction of a fire wagon were referred to the fire committee.

The water works committee was referred the matter of purchasing an air compressor for the water works. The committee will report at the next meeting of the council.

City Engineer Hall was instructed to notify the street car lines to properly fill and grade their tracks on Main street. The Traction company will be notified to place their tracks on Twentieth street in proper shape.

WATER WORKS MATTERS

In order to discuss the water works situation, the rate of supplying water to citizens, etc., the water works committee was instructed to make a thorough investigation of the matter and report at the next meeting of the council. Rules of Fort Worth, Houston, Hillsboro and other cities will be gone over by the committee.

Alderman Shannon said during the discussion of water works matters that the Fort Worth Stock Yards Company was considering the purchase of water from the city system, providing the city furnish it at a rate not greater than the present cost of pumping it. He said further that the packing plants needed more water and felt sure that both Armour and Swift plants would take all the water the city would allow them.

ROSEN HEIGHTS

Sam Rosen Tuesday closed a deal to build nine neat cottages and seven more to be erected as soon as he can secure mechanics, which seems to be a difficult matter just at this time. He says there is a scarcity of good carpenters at this time and that his building work is necessarily being delayed. These houses have all been sold to newcomers who will make Rosen Heights their home.

Besides these improvements there are quite a number of others, the most important being the Catholic school building that is already under way. It is being put up by the Sisters of San Antonio and when finished complete will cost approximately \$15,000. The basement for the building is now pouring concrete. The remainder of the construction will be done within the next two or three months.

PHILANTHROPIST DIES SUDDENLY
Nat Kramer, Noted for Unique Charity, Is Stricken by Heart Failure

Nat Kramer, a well known citizen of Fort Worth, died suddenly of heart failure shortly after 7 o'clock Tuesday night, while seated on the front porch of his home in East Fifth street. Mr. Kramer was 68 years of age and had been a resident of Fort Worth for more than twenty years. He was an ex-Confederate soldier and a charter member of the Eagles' lodge of this city.

When the civil war broke out Kramer was in Denver, but came south and enlisted with the Confederate army. He was widely known in this city as a philanthropist and one who gave large donations to charity. He maintained at his own expense a burial plot in Oakwood cemetery where he buried indigent persons.

Chief of Police Maddox tells of a pathetic incident which took place five or six years ago. A poor woman lived in a tent in the river bottom, herself and two small children being sick. When one of the little girls died, Kramer hearing of the case had the little one buried in his private lot.

"It was in the dead of winter," said Chief Maddox in speaking of the case

WITH THE CATTLEMEN

THE ALPINE COUNTRY ALPINE, Texas, Aug. 9.—Albert Cokerill shipped fifty-eight cows and twenty calves bought of Kokernot & Kokernot, to El Paso Monday. A. Cokerill bought of Kokernot & Kokernot thirty bulls, which were sent over to the Nation's ranch in Pecos county. Jackson & Harmon bought of Kokernot & Kokernot eighty calves, which they shipped to Fort Worth. Jackson & Harmon sold to T. W. Ardoin twenty-six steers at \$25 per head. J. L. Wade, a ranchman from Sonora, has purchased the residence here of W. D. Kincaid. The price paid was \$5,100 cash. This is one of the prettiest and most comfortable houses in Alpine and Mr. Wade expects to move here and occupy the house. J. A. Hanson has bought twelve head of horses from the 22 ranch and 150 head from Dick Riggs, all at private terms. Several of the Prestidio county ranchmen are rounding up their yearlings to deliver to Murphy & Co. next week. Ben West, stockman on the Gillette ranch, received quite a severe fall, caused by his horse stepping in a rut last week while rounding up the Gillette steers for delivery. Ben has just recovered from having his arm broken, caused by his horse falling with him. L. B. Caruthers has purchased a ranch up near Van Horn. The price is not given out. This year is said to be the best season in this country for twenty-one years. The country is a solid sea of green. Weeds never seen here before are growing luxuriously and grass is knee high all over the country. Stockmen have nothing to fear except the trusts this year. J. M. Sawell, a prominent ranchman from South America, has returned to his faraway home, accompanied by his wife and daughter.

AFFECTED BY HEAT The reports from Fort Worth stock yards show that the extreme heat of the weather during the past few weeks is having an effect upon the condition and weight of cattle which is to be feared by the ranchman and which proves a loss to the shipper. A bunch of fifty head was driven through Wise county on Monday of this week by Scott & Allen, one being found dead from overt heat and another having been killed to place it beyond further misery, it being seen that it could not live long. Drivers coming through Montague and Wise counties say that the condition of the range through that section is better than during the same period of several preceding years. The late rains continuing into the summer to the detriment of the field crops have proven a blessing to the cattlemen in the freshness of the grass.

TO THE TELEGRAM

MUNICIPAL EXPERIMENT To The Telegram. As a spectator at the meeting of the city council on Friday evening I had the pleasure of hearing the discussion there of the proposition to furnish water to suburban additions outside the city limits. The different phases of the question were ably presented and the arguments advanced would have reflected credit upon any legislative assembly of the state, municipal or otherwise. The proposition that Fort Worth, with an abundant supply of the finest water, should deal in a broad, liberal and progressive spirit with the growing additions that are in many respects already a part of the city, and are expected to become ere long a part of the corporation itself, appeals with peculiar force to the enterprising Fort Worth man, and especially in this case, where the water asked for by the additions can be furnished at a clear financial profit to the city. With liberality and without the going hand in hand it is not strange that the city council should have been willing to at least venture upon an experiment in the matter with the city, reserving the right to cut off the water at any time it may see proper to do so.

That the council's action in the premises is, if I understand it aright, only experimental in character and temporary in duration, should be distinctly kept in view by all parties. It would be manifestly unwise for the city to commit itself to the policy of undertaking to permanently supply outside additions with water, or to encourage a belief on the part of the people therein that they can depend upon getting city water while they are not a part of the city corporation and not liable for the share of its burdens and expenses. Alderman Zurn, in the statement of his views on the subject as published a short time since, declared himself, if I remember correctly, in favor of allowing the outside additions to have city water until they could become a part of the city, but with the understanding that if they fail to come into the city as soon as the assembling of the legislature affords an opportunity to do so, the water will be cut off. I do not suppose that any stipulation of this effect was embodied in the ordinance or resolution providing for furnishing water to the additions, and there may be no distinct understanding of this sort on the part of a majority of the council. If there is not, then my contention is that there should be such an understanding, and that it should extend to the people of the outside suburbs, for unless the matter is so understood by them the requisite action to get those additions into the city

RANCHMEN MARKETING CALVES J. W. Yokley of Rhome, Texas, who arrived with a bunch of cattle Tuesday morning overland from his place in Wise county, says that he has been living near enough to drive his cattle to this market for the past eight years. During the period of his residence in this section Mr. Yokley states that he has never seen so many fine young calves thrown into the market in comparison to the number of steers or cows offered.

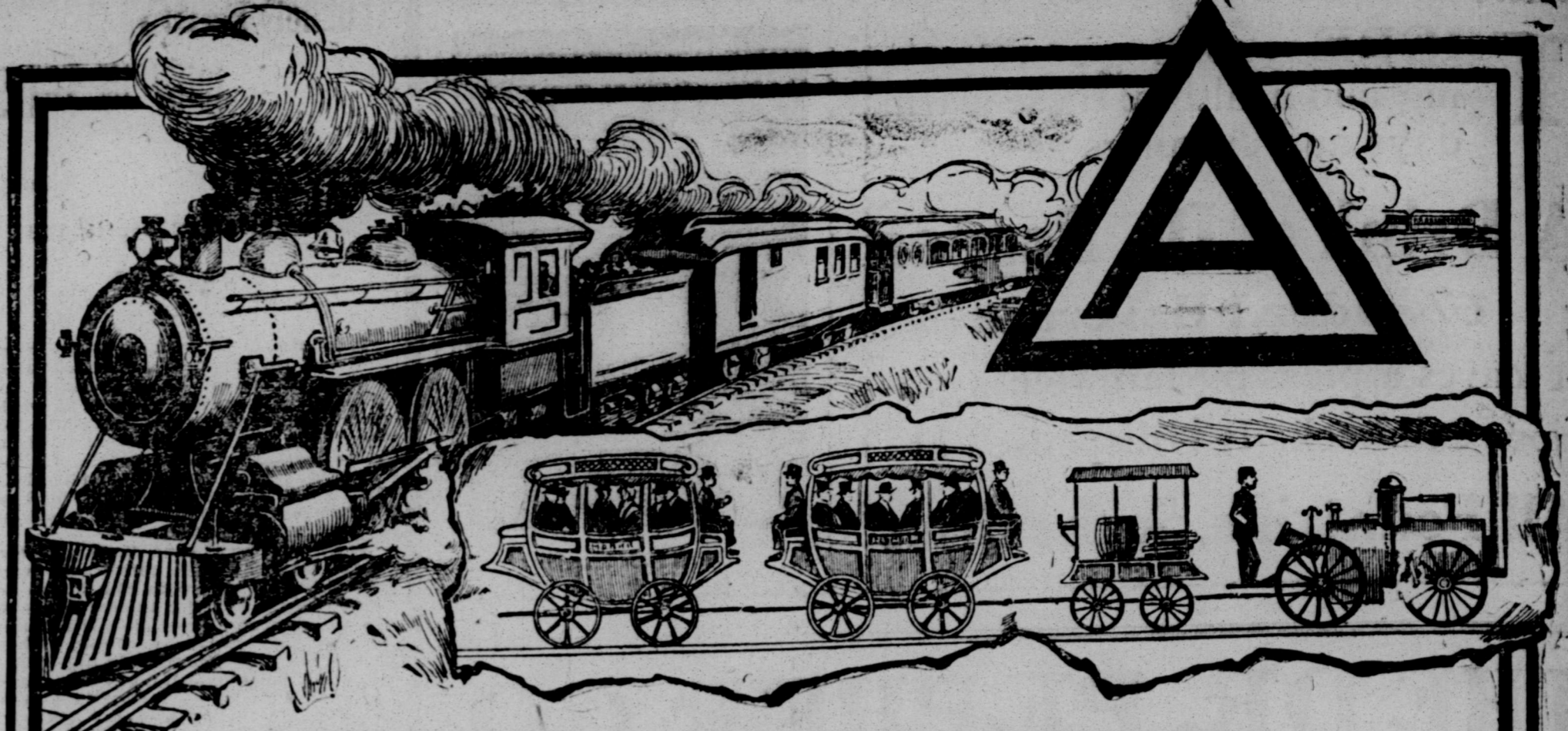
"The shipments into Fort Worth during the months of July and August are never very heavy and are never expected to be so," said the Wise county rancher. "but they tell me that between thirty-five and forty car loads of young calves arrived in this yard since Sunday night." Pointing to a nearby pen containing about forty heaves in embryo, Mr. Yokley continued: "The most of those calves would be worth a great deal more next fall without even taking into account that they should not be sold then. I don't really see why a man will sell such little fellows."

It was suggested to Mr. Yokley that perhaps he was bringing a fancy price, to which he only smiled and said: "Maybe so, but if I had a few hundred of the little fellows no ordinary price could tempt me to part with them." Asked as to the general condition of the range in his section, Mr. Yokley said: "The range is well better than for at least the two past years, but say—you just ought to see the little town of Rhome. That place is almost as full of weeds as Oak Cliff." Asked how that could be, Mr. Yokley made the point that in the Rhome people have voted down the town cow, and as a result the weeds were "about to take the whole place." "If you drive a herd of cows through those weeds you'll be sure to lose a satisfactory number of calves," said the cattleman, "and, if you should stay all night, I wouldn't be surprised half of them would be lost from themselves before morning. But," he added, "the thing over which I am worrying is to see so many hundreds of good calves turned loose in the market in the middle of the summer," and he began the preliminaries to what proved to be a profitable sale of the cattle he had driven in from Wise county.

is not likely to be taken at the proper and earliest time. Since the city reserves the unqualified right as I understand to cease furnishing the water at any time, there is nothing to prevent it from insisting on this condition of annexation, whether or not a stipulation to that effect has been expressly declared in advance. The earlier, however, such an understanding is had all round the less of equitable ground for complaint will there be should the water be cut off hereafter from people who have bought and builded expecting, though unwisely, that it would be continued.

The council would have been justified in refusing water to these additions until they came into the city and so assume their share of the municipal expense. The city desires that they should so come in; and the obtaining thereby of the superior water privileges is leading inducement for them to do so. For the present convenience and advantage the city surrenders this inducement for the time being by furnishing the water to them in advance but it would be an injustice to its own best interests if it permitted such an arrangement to be other than a temporary one, to be discontinued unless the additions become a part of the city. This water arrangement is also necessarily experimental in other respects, since there are features connected with it which, when put to actual test in carrying it into operation, may demonstrate it to be impracticable and unsatisfactory and thus call for its early abandonment. The city's regulations and ordinances as to meters, connections and the water service generally cannot, to a large extent, be legally enforced in territory outside of the city limits and so beyond its territorial jurisdiction. It cannot, for example, enforce its penalty of fines for turning on the water without authority and for tampering with the meters, and it could visit no adequate penalty upon parties who might make connections with the mains without authority and appropriate the water, nor recover for the water so taken, as the additions will be outside of the city's territory and the agreement to furnish water for parties there ultra vires and outside of the city's legal power, as the Texas courts have already held (Ward vs. Victoria, 18 Texas Civil Appeals reports, p. 573). It follows that the carrying out of the arrangement is a thing that must be accomplished without the aid of the laws. If the city cannot, as it seems, satisfactorily carry on a waterworks system within its limits without the aid of law and its penal ordinances governing the subject, it can hardly be expected that, without such aid, it can satisfactorily carry on a water service beyond its limits. The population of suburban communities is not composed entirely of people who always do right merely for the right's sake, and even if it were so composed, misunderstandings may arise on the part of some of the water consumers as to what is right with reference to a public water service. Having myself lived in the Dissect Tract addition I feel warranted in saying that Fort Worth's suburban residents are an unusually fine lot of people, but still it will be safe to assume that human nature is, on a general average, about the same out in the additions that it is within the city limits. These additions are not Utopias, and if the city satisfactorily carries on a water service in them it will be by virtue of such a co-operation on the part of the water consumers there and such a voluntary assent to the city's requirements in cases of disagreement of opinion as we have not yet witnessed elsewhere. Still such a thing may be done, and Fort Worth has enterprise enough to essay anything not absolutely impossible. If she succeeds in this matter, surpassing the expectations of the timid ones, who doubt, she will be fully entitled to stand at the head of the procession in the matter of municipal enterprise, and will become the envy and admiration of her sister cities throughout all the land. 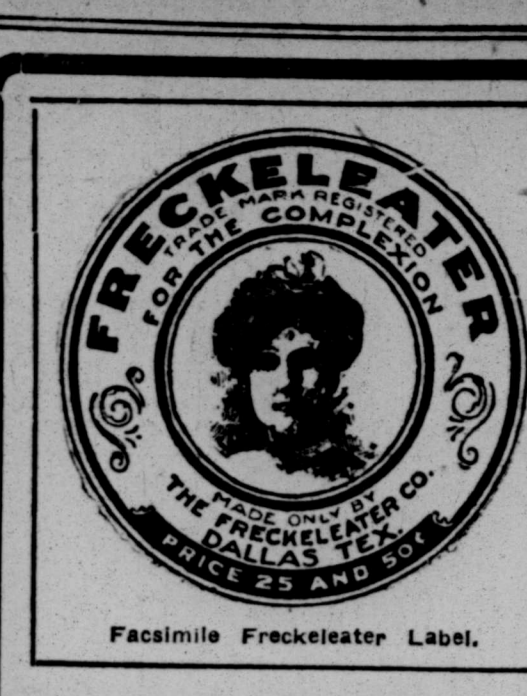





TRACTION COMPANY TO EXTEND LINES

President Bishop Announces Plans for Increased Service in the City

President George Bishop of the Northern Texas Traction company announced Tuesday afternoon upon his return from Dallas that his company will expend \$50,000 in improvements on the Interurban and the city lines. The former are to be rock ballasted from Fort Worth to Oak Cliff, while the lines in this city are to be extended and otherwise put in better condition. Mr. Bishop said that the Hemphill line will be extended to the iron and bolt factory, about one mile from its present terminal, with heavy rails substituted for the present ones. Ballasting of the Interurban will cost about \$35,000 while the improvements in this city will run the total expenditures up to about \$60,000. He will make a personal investigation of the proposition to build the line through the Third ward, as announced in The Telegram, at the solicitation of Alderman W. R. Parker, who has been working hard to secure street car facilities for the citizens of that ward. President Bishop, it is said, will give favorable consideration to the plan and may decide to build the extension asked for by Alderman Parker and his constituents.
