## CITY DEPOSITORIES SOURCES OF REVENUE

Departure From Old Method of Handling Municipal Funds-Law Goes Into Effect Today

Special to The Telegram.

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 14 .- One of the icts of the Twenty-ninth legislature which becomes operative today (Aug. 14) is the bill providing for depositories in every city or town incorporated under the general laws. This is a departure from the old method of depositing municipal funds and will hereafter be the source of some reve-Heretofore the cities cash has been deposited with the various banks, FIVE DEATHS EVERY DAY where there was more than one in a own and although it might remain on teposit for months drew no interest. Under the new act if banks use the funds of a city they must pay for the privilege.

This law provides that the council of every city or town incorporated under the general law at the regular meeting in July of each year is authorized to receive sealed proposals for the custody of the city's funds from any banking corporation, association or individual doing business in the city, that may desire to be selected as the depository. # **GULF STREAM STOPS** LINER'S PROGRESS

Peculiar Current Reported Unusually Active 600 Miles

East of New York

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—That the gulf city at point in the Atlantic ocean, where according to the best authorities it should be hardly discernable and with such a flow as to hold back to a serious extent the steamship Moltke on her western way, was asserted by Captain Russer of that ship when she arrived at Hoboken yes-terday from Hamburg, Boulogne and Do-

This activity was observed on Thurs-day. On Monday the midday speed reckoning showed 404 knots, the next 397 knots and 390 and 392 on the following days, cause. The water suddenly began to grow warmer in streaks and there were high temperatures that were startling. For five hours this high temperature was recorded and all day the peculiar activity of the gulf stream was apparent. When puted, it was found that the ship had

logged only 367 miles. All this time, according to Captain Russer, there were light winds from the southwest, a high barometer and an insmooth seas went, but the temperature on shipboard was almost unbearable, registering nearly 90 degrees.

"I have never before witnessed the gulf stream active in so high a latitude," said Captain Russer. "When we felt its full strength, we were approximately in north latitude 41 degrees, on the same latitude as New York, and in 60 degrees west

longitude. "I have no theory to account for the current we met. If it keeps up the speed that it had when we crossed it, it will be heard of again on the other side."

Dollar Gas Promised by Armstrong When That Plant

Is Erected

letter concerning the franchise asked by himself and associates under the referendum clause of the city charter, makes the following announcement of proposed prices to be charged:

"Electric light plant. We are put ting in a duplicate plant of the best and most modern machinery that money can buy. We are going to charge a meter rate of from 6 to 12 cents per K. W. The flat rate is unjust, both to the company and the con-

"Steam heating. We propose to heat the business part of the city within five or six blocks of our plant with our exhaust. Eventually we may extend this to heating residences with hot water. The contract for this work will be let immediately after the election, if favorable. Our charges will be on the basis of 25 cents per square foot or radiating surface.

"Gas. As soon as the electri light and steam plant is completed we propose to build the gas plant. It is our purpose to make only fuel gas. Gas will not compare with electricity as light and it is only a matter of short time until it will cease to be used for that purpose. We expect to charge a net rate of \$1 per 1,000 feet, or \$1.10 if the bill is collected by a






