PROVO, Utah, Aug. 12.—For nearly a week this peaceful little city has been the scene of bustle and activity incident to the registration of homesteaders for farms on the Uintah Indian reservation...

Commissioner Richards, who arrived from Washington early this week, with his corps of assistants, is superintending the registration and will remain until the drawing occurs. In an interview he said: "I picked this point months ago as the logical place. It is accessible and near the reservation and it will give those who really want a homestead a chance to get one..."

"This will give the New York man, for instance, a chance to register and go back home. If his name be in the first hundred drawn he can get back to Utah and have plenty of time to make his selection. The eleven days between drawing and the first day's entry give him six days for notification and getting back here, and five days for selection..."

CONSOLIDATION CHANGES Southern Texas Merger Followed by Office Rearrangement. W. J. Duff, in charge of the Victoria office, has been appointed to a position in the office of Auditor Cottingham, effective Sept. 1. He will take with him to Houston his office force of fifteen men.

RAILROAD RUMBLINGS. Actions involving a total of \$500,000 are to be brought against the Southern Pacific, Santa Fe and the Union Pacific railroads as penalties for alleged violation of the twenty-eight hour law. There are twelve hundred suits involving penalties from \$100 to \$500 in each case. It is at the instance of the secretary of agriculture that this litigation has been instituted by the attorney general of the United States, and under his instruction these suits are soon to be brought by the different district attorneys. These prospective suits have stirred the railroads to take action, hence the conference to be held at Chicago today by representatives of the railroads and also representatives of large cattle interests in the south and southeast. It is more than likely some course to be pursued by the railroads in the future regarding this law will be decided on at the Chicago meeting. All the Texas roads are represented.

ENFORCING QUARANTINE Southern Pacific Declares Passage on Freight Trains Impossible. Officials of the Southern Pacific railroad company emphatically deny the report that refugees from Louisiana are getting out of that state into Texas by riding freight trains. The officials of that company announce that the most stringent rules are being followed in the movement of freight and say that it is impossible for others besides the trainmen to ride on freight cars coming out of Louisiana to this state. The company says further that the quarantine guards, who are stationed at all border gateways between the two states, would make such a movement of refugees from Louisiana infected districts impossible. There has been only one case where an effort was made to smuggle a person out of Louisiana into Texas, and that was by a fireman who was turned over to the quarantine officials, while the man being smuggled across the line was turned back.
