

#### ECLIPSE OF THE SUN AWE-INSPIRING SIGHT

Astronomer Describes Last Appearance of Phenomena

to Be Repeated

NATURE TRNSFORMED

The first period of the occulation was not particularly remarkable in any re-It was only from the time when more than half of the solar disk was covered by the lunar disk that the phenomenon became impressive. When about three-quarters of the sun were eclipsed birds rushed back to their nests and bats came forth as at nightfall. Then, successively, the sky turned a leaden gray, the mountains stood out with surprising distinctness against the horizon and seemed to draw nearer; a cold chill shot through the atmosphere, a prolonged silence reigned in nature; the light faded more and more, the landscape became the sea turned black. It was then that we made our observations with

the spectrum. When totality had commenced, the sun had vanished, and the black disk of the moon showed all round it the admirable corona of brilliant light. The corona surrounds the sun completely, extending beyond it to the distance of about onethird of the sun's radius, and it may be considered the solar atmosphere. Beyond the corona is an aureole, a vaster but less luminous refulgence, which hurls out long plumes principally in the direction of the sun's equatorial zone, and the zone of activity of the spots and protuberances. On the summit of the disk it is conical and beneath it is double, the right exremity ending in a long point.

The eclipse which I have been describing took far less time to pass than I have quired to write these lines. The totality lasted only fifty-seven seconds, and a dazzling streak as of lightning shot out from the sun as the moon glided on. Several persons assured me that they had seen the shadow of the moon shoot swiftly by. My attention being monopolized in other directions, I could not notice this, although 1 had recommended others to watch for it. The moon's shadow crossed the Spanish peninsula from Oporto to Alicante in eleven minutes, flying at the rate of 3.737 feet per second,

or faster than a cannon ball. And so, suddenly, the illusion had vanished, like all that is beautiful upon The surprise, the oppression, the terror of some, the silence of all had ceased. The sun reappeared in its splendor, and the life of nature resumed its course, for a moment suspended.




