

TEXAS HISTORY IN THE MAKING*

No. 3-The Alamo, Cradle of Texas Liberty



This is the Alamo, "Cradle of Texas Liberty," pictured as it stands today. Here Travis, surrounded by Santa Anna's men, wrote: "The garrison will be put to the sword if the fort is taken . . Victory or death!" Here 182 brave Texans died, besieged by 10,000 Mexican troops, in one of the most heroic struggles ever recorded in the pages of history. March 6, 1236, sad day for Texas, and the men who fell here only urged Texas on to victory and independence. The Alamo building was erected in 1744 (although an inscription on the wall bears the date 1754.) this shrine stands in the heart of San Antonio, facing beautiful Alan plaza. It was not a mission, but an overflow meeting place for Mis-sion San Jose de Aguayo. Alamo means "Poplar tree" in Span h. so the name translated into English, would be "Poplar Church." (.exas
