Resignation of the Government Ministry Demanded-Newspaper Office Damaged

TOKIO Sept. 5 (Delayed in transmission.)-The first turbulence attendant on the popular anger over the terms of peace arranged with Russian took John R. King, commander-in-chief place today. A mass meeting of protest against the action of the government was called to take place in Hibiya park but the metropolitan police closed the gates and attempted to prevent the assemblage of the people. The municirality protested against the action of the police and finally the gates were thrown open and a large crowd gathered and voted in favor of resolutions declaring the nation humiliated and denouncing the terms upon which the treaty of peace was arranged. The rowd was serious in its conduct rather than angry, and the police handled it discreetly. The gathering eventually

Travis County Court House Librarian's



# PANHANDLE CALVES SHOW BETTER QUALITY

Supply Also Larger Than Ordinary and Demand

Is Active

AMARILLO, Texas, Sept. 6 .- "Better alves and better grass I have never seen year," said Judge O. H. Nelson, president of the Amarillo Stock Yards Company. "A few weeks ago I traversed most of the grass country in Texas and New Mexico, above the quarantine line, and everywhere found conditions superb. The ountry is long on grass and short on cattle-a most desirable condition. "Panhandle calves are incomparably

better than last year. They are thrifty and will make much better material for feeders' purposes. Last year, owing to drouth many early calves died and others were stunted. This year the whole crop has been raised and calves average about twenty-five pounds heavier than last year. At weaning time they will average 350 to 400 pounds and will be rolling fat More Panhandle calves have been de horned this year than ever before.

"Popularity of Panhandle calves in east ern feed lots is developing rapidly. While a goodly portion of this year's crop wil go into Kansas, Missouri and Nebraska. there will be a decided increase in the number sent to Iowa. East of the Mis sissippi river, Illinois, Indiana and Ohio will absorb the bulk, but we are highly gratified this year at receipt of order from New York state and New Jersey Kentucky, Virginia and Pennsylvania wil also be good customers. "It is somewhat early to talk prices." believe trade will be on a basis of steady to strong compared with last year, when the bulk of calves, exclusive of tops and tail ends, sold at \$15 to \$20 per head. 





CATTLEMEN KILL SHEEP

The sheep camp was visited at night by a band of masked armed men, who first captured the herders, burned the camp and equipage, killed the horses of the outfit, and then began shooting and clubbing sheep to death. Large numbers were driven over a high precipice and others were drowned in the river. The entire flock, consisting of 8,000 sheep,

was killed. Cattlemen in the district have complained of Gantz for some time, claiming that his sheep were destroying the home cattle range, and insisting that he move them into the mountains. After the killing of the sheep the herders were given two days' food and freed. They were warned not to disclose the names of the destroyers even if they knew them.

REPORT CATTLE EPIDEMIC The fact that two Illinois stock laws conflict is said to be responsible for the epidemic of Texas fever which prevails among the cattle in Morgan county and vicinity. Already the disease has killed over a dozen cattle in Morgan county alone, while many other animals are af-

fected and will probably die. State Veterinarian L. C. Tiffany returned from Jacksonville, where he made a complete examination of the cattle that had died, and also of those that are suffering with the infection. By order of Dr. Tiffany, a quarantine was established to prevent a further spread of the instance where theory does not stand through high school and college. That "Happy?
