

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### WILL SUSTAIN THE PRESIDENT

The question as to whether or not the southern congressmen will support the President im his hard fight for railway regulation and control is agitating the public mind all over the country, and there seems to be some apprehension that southern support will be lacking. The Childress Post, a bright and sprightly Panhandle weekly, says:

"President Roosevelt is thoroughly in earnest in the matter of railway regulation and control, and if the democratic members of congress give him the support that seems probable the desired reform will be easily accomplished.'

Our level-headed contemporary is quite right as usual. But the question is, will the southern democrats in both house and sen-

ate do it? ident Roosevelt, as no other President has done since the writer has been old enough to know, has proven himself the President of ALL these United States and ALL of its people. He has shown his broadness of mind in more ways than one and especially in having adopted several of Mr. Bryan's policies and in showing himself in nowise too arrogant to accept advice from that most worthy statesman and representative of the common people. Nevertheless, he is a republican and a republican President, and will the southern democrats in congress for once in their lives be sufficiently broad-minded to "meet him half-way" and sustain him in carrying out what is certainly good democratic doctrine?

Or, will these democratic representatives and senators continue their partisan narrowmindeness and remain apathetic or oppose the sincere efforts of a republican President to bring about the "devoutedly to be wished"

regulation of railways? The Post heartily hopes our southern congressmen will be behind Mr. Roosevelt in this fight as a single man-determined and united. But, while the Post will acknowledge the superiority of the representatives of no section over those of our beloved southland in manhood, integrity or statesmanship, it is recognized that we of the south have our faults and one of them is that "No good cometh out

and that finish will be railway regulation.

The Telegram thinks there need not be the slightest apprehension concerning the attitude of the southern congressmen on this very important issue. In the first place, the regulation and control of the railways is a democratic principle, and the first great effort made in that direction was the interstate commerce bill introduced and fought through congress by that grand old commoner, John H. Reagan of Texas. It is true the effects intended to be gained and the real purposes of the law were thwarted by republican members of congress, who were serving by the grace of railway influence, but the democracy has never lost sight of that original intention, and the present effort, which involves the amendment of the interstate commerce law so as to permit the commission to make and enforce interstate rates, is but the result of continued democratic agitation.

The President has showed his greatness by getting in behind this democratic demand and making it an administration measure. He laid aside all question of partisanship and came out boldly for the great democratic principle of the greatest good to the greatest number, and it is incumbent upon the democratic members of congress to rise to the same heights as have been attained by Theodore Roosevelt and secure for the masses this reform that is so generally demanded. The President realizes the futility of hoping for assistance from his own party. His trip to the south recently was principally taken to warm the southern heart and assure southern support for this great reform. He is showing himself to be the President of all the people of these United States, and the people of the south, including our southern congressmen, can be depended upon to meet him in the same broad spirit. The indications all seem to denote a sweeping victory for this measure, and if such is not the case, the blame will lie with our democratic congressmen, who are too hide-bound to rise above partisanship.

### GARFIELD PROMISED IM-MUNITY

Gradually the true facts are coming to light in regard to the justly celebrated Garfield report on the a most startling nature. The packers now under | year. indictment at Chicago as a result of the recent federal investigation, are alleging that in return for the testimony furnished by them Commissioner Garfield promised them immunity from punishment. An Associated Press report from Chicago says:

Complete immunity from prosecution under the pending indictments returned by the federal grand jury several months ago is claimed by J. Ogden Armour and the other so-called beef trust officials, in additional pleas in bar, filed late this afternoon by Attorney J. S. Miller the packers' representative.

The new plea, which comes as a surprise to the government, sets up the fact that when James R. Garfield, commissioner of corporations, investigated the trusts, he told the packers that whatever testimony they gave without being under oath, or whatever documentary evidence they voluntarily produced, the defendants should have the same rights. indemnities and immunities as if they had testified under oath and compulsion. Under this new plea Attorney Miller hopes to establish the fact that there was an agreement between the packers and the government that they should testify and produce evidence without being subpensed or the oath being administered, but that, as far as immunity was concerned, it should be considered as if they had been subpensed and took the oath.

The allegation of an agreement between Commissioner Garfield and the packers was a surprise to District Attorney Morrison and Assistane General Attorney Pagin, and it was said tonight that Mr. Garfield was asked concerning just what happened during the investigation.

The plea alleges that the testimony and evidence, it was understood, should not be used by the department of justice in any way as a basis for any proceedings against the defendants. Then it is declared, with the assurance of the commissioner, the defendants appeared bfeore him and told him of the things he wished to be inquired into and which are now incorporated in the indict-

Notwithstanding the promise of the government, it is declared, the testimony and evidence procured by the defendants were given to the department of justice and finally to the local district attorney, and this information has been used and is now being used in the prosecution of the packers. All these allegations the defendants proclaim themselves ready to verify.

If Commissioner Garfield entered into any such agreement with the packers, the question is, what did he expect to gain from his investigation? He was expected to make a fair and impartial acertainment of the facts in the situation and report the same to congress. Preliminary to that investigation, it is declared he entered into a treaty with the concerns he was required to investigate, under the terms of which he agreed that if they furnished him with any evidences of rascality it should not reach the department of justice and be used against the men under investigation. In other words, it seems to be a case of a trusted government official engaged in a very important piece of work, entering into a combination with alleged culprits to defeat the objects of the very work in which he was engaged.

The packers told Mr. Garfield that they were not operating as a trust or combination in restraint of trade, and furnished him figures which he very promptly embodied in his official report and declared that the packing business of the country was being operated at a direct loss to the packers. He accepted the figures furnished as profit on one animal as the net profits of the year, instead of figuring on the feet that under the above ficent system employed by the big packing concerns the money invested in one animal is turned over with perhaps increasing profit several times each month. When that fact was directed to Commissioner Garfield's attention he proceeded to look wise and say nothing, from the very simple fact there was nothing for him to say.

How Garfield can stand up in the face of all the adverse criticism that has been hurled in his direction is one of the most surprising features of the situation. The action of the federal authorities in finding those indictments in the tace of his worthless report should have been sufficient to retire Commissioner Garfield from business. But even when e was confronted with indisputable evidence of the unreliability of his report in the presence of the President, he could offer no satisfactory explanation, but faced the situation in a manner indicative of absolute unconcern. Now that it has been charged that he has arrogated to himself the functions of the federal government and promised the packers immunity from punishment on account of any incrimnating evidence they may have felt compelled to furnish him, he is placed in a still more unenviable light. As the federal government was not influenced by the Garfield report in the further investigation and indictment of the packers, it is a pretty safe proposition that no attention will be paid to the alleged promised immunity. The government has accumulated a mass of testimony on which those indictments were predicated, and while the big packers may wiggle and squirm to their hearts' content, the full power of the law which they are alleged to have violated is going to be turned in their direction and no effort spared to secure conviction. The packers do not want a fair and impartial trial, however. They are exhausting every possible resource to keep just as far away from the temple of justice as possible. That fact within itself is very conclusive evidence that they very keenly realize the gravity of the situation. The packers are up again the real thing this time.

### MASON AND DIXON'S LINE

To the average reader perhaps it will be a matter of news to hear that the old familiar Mason and Dixon line, which figured so prominently in the problems leading up to the civil war, did not come into existence as a result of the arising of these problems, and its original projection was not even remotely connected with the matter of slavery. An explanation of the causes leading up to running of the line that was much copied in the thirties was printed originally in the old Salame Gazette, a journal published early enough in the past century to print extensive reports of the trial of Aaron Burr. As narrated by this old paper, the running of the line antedated even the revolution, and occurred a full century before the war between the states. This ancient account is as fol-

"Whenever the rights, interests or duties of the northern or southern states, respectively, are in question reference is commonly made to 'Mason and Dixon's line.' This boundary is to termed from the names of Charles Mason and Jeremiah Diah, the two gentlemen who were appointed to run the unfinished lines in 1761 between Pennsylvania and Maryland, on the territories subjected to the heirs of Penn and Baltimore. A temporary line had been run in 1738, but had not given satisfaction to the disputing parties, although it resulted from an agreement in 1739 between themselves. A decree had been made in 1618 by King James, delineating the boundaries between the lands given by charter to the first Lord Baltimore and those adjudged to his majesty (afterward to William Penn). which divided the tract of land between Delaware Bay and the eastern sea on one side and the Chesapeake Bay on the other by a line equally intersecting it. drawn from Cape Henkopen to the fourth degree of north latitude. A decree in chancery rendered the king's decree imperative.

"But the situation of Henlopen became long a subject of serious, protracted and expensive litigation, particularly after the death of Penn, 1718, and of Lord Baltimore in 1714, till John and Richard and Thomas Penn (who had become the sole proprietors of the American possessions of their father William), and Cecilus Lord Baltimore, grandson of Cecilus, the original patentee, entered into an agreement on the Thursday, Nov. 30, has been officially designated 10th of May, 1722. To this agreement a chart was appended, which ascertained the site of Cape Henlopen, and was delineated a division by an east and west line, running westward from that cape to the exet middle of the peninsula. ### DRIFT OF STATE POLITICS

THE ELDER STATESMEN

The suggestion to send to the legislature a majority composed of men of middle age, of experience, prominence and demonstrated intellectual ability, has been received in certain quarters with something like ridi. cule, and the proposition has been treated by some a fit subject of jest, but this paper is of the opinion that there is much merit in the suggestion.

As the Chronicle understands, it is proposed to conscript men like George Clark, Dick Wynne, Horace Chilton, John Duncan, Gus Houston, A. W. Terrell William Poindexter and other men of that class and elect them to the legislature-mainly to the house.

It is believed that experienced men such as these, all lawyers of recognized ability, who have for the most part "put away ambition" in the sense of aspiring to office, and interested in nothing so much as to secure the passage of a few wise laws and the defeat of many unwise ones, would render the state most valuable service.

The Chronicle does not believe that the fact of being a young man, or that a man has not reached middle age, should bar him from the legislature, because not a few young men are very efficient, but upon the whole "old men for council" is a safe proverb by which to be guided. The trouble with the last house was that it was filled with young and utterly inexperienced men, half of whom were candidates for some office in the near or moderately remote future. They played to the galleries for sixty days, and concluded the performance with some of the most remarkable statutes ever sent forth from legislative halls,

The elder statesmen could not do any worse. That impossibility is a "cinch," to use a slang phrase. They could not fail to do better, unless they belied their record of former usefulness.

There is no doubt that the ablest legislatures ever assembled in Texas were those of 1855 and 1857, and the majority of the house was composed of men who had already gained eminence at the bar and in other professions, and some of whom had served in the legislatures of other states, or in the early Texas lerislative bodies.

Texas needs men as never before in her legislative halls-men of conservatism, patriotism, experience and ability. She cannot afford to place the power of legis. lation in the hands of those whose thoughts are rather upon themselves and their personal ambition than upon the interests of the people.

Higher interests were never committed into mortal keeping than those which rest in the hands of the legislature of Texas, and it will be most fortunate for the people if the state can secure the services of some of her older sons, who will out of sheer love of her give her unselfish, patriotic and efficient service .-Houston Chronicle.

\* \* \* \* COLONEL WYNNE SPEAKS OUT

Colonel Dick Wynne of Fort Worth, who is still be ing spoken of as an available man for governor, has given out a lengthy article for publication, setting forth his views on the situation in this state. And one does not get very far along in the colonel's

article till he perceives that he is a live wire. He admits right in the beginning that there is much that is wrong and much that needs drastic tree-ment in our state affairs, democratic though we have always been, but he declares that it is no use to outside the democratic party to right these wrongs.

He very sensibly suggests that admitting the wrong is not righting them. It is but the first little step to be taken in the long and painful march of progress on and up to

better things. He declares that what is most needed is an aggressive chief executive, one that wars mightily for that improvement of state affairs so patent to all.

Colonel Wynne's article impresses one with the idea that he is no goody goody demagogue, nor yet not a hopeless cynic. He also impresses one with the idea that the honor and well being of Texas is of more importance to him in the latter half of life, than is the bare fact of being a nominal governor.

There is always hope for a state when the "fathers." the real statesmen, talk in this vein, and if we can get a governor, and even a dozen or so, such legislators, things will be greatly improved in the Lone Star state next year .- Arlington Journal.

THE ELDER STATESMEN

The suggestion to send to the legislature a majority composed of men of middle age, of experience, prominence and demonstrated intellectual ability, has been received in certain quarters with something like ridicule, and the proposition has been treated by some 40 a fit subject of jest, but this paper is of the opinion that there is much merit in the suggestion.

As the Chronicle understands, it is proposed to conscript men like George Clark, Dick Wynne, Horace Chilton, John Duncan, Gus Houston, A. W. Terrell, William Poindexter and other men of that class and elect them to the legislature-mainly to the house. It is believed that experienced men such as these all lawyers of recognized ability, who have for the

most part "put away ambition" in the sense of aspiring to office, and interested in nothing so much as to secure the passage of a few wise laws and the defeat of many unwise ones, would render the state most valuable service. The Chronicle does not believe that the fact of being a young man, or that a man has not reached middle age, should bar him from the legislature, because not

a few young men are very efficient, but upon the

whole "old men for council" is a safe proverb by which

to be guided. The trouble with the last house was that it was filled with young and utterly inexperienced men, half of whom were candidates for some office in the near or moderately remote future. They played to the galleries for sixty days, and concluded the performance with some of the most remarkable statutes ever sent forth from legislative halls. The elder statesmen could not do any worse. That

impossibility is a "cinch," to use a slang phrase. They could not fail to do better, unless they belied their record of former usefulness. There is no doubt that the ablest legislatures ever

assembled in Texas were those of 1855 and 1857, and the majority of the house was composed of men who had already gained eminence at the bar and in other professions, and some of whom had served in the legislatures of other states, or in the early Texas legislative bodies.

Texas needs men as never before in her legislative halls-men of conservatism, patriotism, experience and ability. She cannot afford to place the power of legislation in the hands of those whose thoughts are rather upon themselves and their personal ambition than upon the interests of the people.

Higher interests were never committed into mortal keeping than those which rest in the hands of the legislature of Texas, and it will be most fortunate for the people if the state can secure the services of some of her older sons, who will out of sheer love of her give her unselfish, patriotic and efficient service .-Houston Chronicle.

If Commissioner Garfield entered into any such agreement with the packers, the question is, what did he expect to gain from his investigation? He was expected to make a fair and impartial acertainment of the facts in the situation and report the same to congress. Preliminary to that investigation, it is declared, he entered into a treaty with the concerns he was required to investigate, under the terms of which he agreed that if they furnished him with any evidences of rascality it should not reach the department of justice and be used against the men under investigation. In other words, it seems to be a case of a trusted government official engaged in a very important piece of work, entering into a combination with alleged culprits to defeat the objects of the very work in which he was engaged.

The packers told Mr. Garfield that they were not operating as a trust or combination in restraint of trade, and furnished him figures which he very promptly embodied in his official report and declared that the packing business of the country was being operated at a direct loss to the packers. He accepted the figures furnished as profit on one animal as the net profits of the year," instead of figuring on the feet that under the approficent system employed by the big packing concerns the money invested in one animal is turned over with perhaps increasing profit several times each month. When that fact was directed to Commissioner Garfield's attention he proceeded to look wise and say nothing, from the very simple fact there was nothing for him to say.

How Garfield can stand up in the face of all the adverse criticism that has been hurled in his direction is one of the most surprising features of the situation. The action of the federal authorities in finding those indictments in the face of it's worthless report should have been sufficient to retire Commissioner Garfield from business. But even when he was confronted with indisputable evidence of the unreliability of his report in the presence of the President, he could offer no satisfactory explanation, but faced the situation in a manner indicative of absolute unconcern. Now that it has been charged that he has arrogated to himself the functions of the federal government and promised the packers immunity from punishment on account of any incrimnating evidence they may have felt compelled to furnish him, he is placed in a still more unenviable light. As the federal government was not influenced by the Garfield report in the further investigation and indictment of the packers, it is a pretty safe proposition that no attention will be paid to the alleged promised immunity. The government has accumulated a mass of testimony on which those indictments were predicated, and while the big packers may wiggle and squirm to their hearts' content, the full power of the law which they are alleged to have colated is going to be turned in their direction and no effort spared to secure conviction. The packers do not want a fair and impartial trial, however. They are exhausting every possible resource to keep just as far away from the temple of justice as possible. That fact within itself is very conclusive evidence that they very keenly realize the gravity of the situation.

Sherman Democrat. Fort Worth affords an ideal location for a big cotton mill, and it is positively surprising that the existing opportunity has not already been taken advantage of. Work is progressing on the matter of obtaining such an enterprise, however, and it is to be hoped that the result will be made manifest in a big mill.

MASON AND DIXON'S LINE

To the average reader perhaps it will be a matter of news to hear that the old familiar Mason and Dixon line, which figured so prominently in the problems leading up to the civil war, did not come into existence as a result of the arising of these problems, and its original projection was not even remotely connected with the matter of slavery. An explanation of the causes leading up to running of the line that was much copied in the thirties was printed originally in the old Salame Gazette, a journal published early enough in the past century to print extensive reports of the trial of Aaron Burr. As narrated by this old paper, the running of the line antedated even the revolution, and occurred a full century before the war between the states. This ancient account is as fol-

"Whenever the rights, interests or duties of the northern or southern states, respectively, are in question reference is commonly made to 'Mason and Dixon's line.' This boundary is to termed from the names of Charles Mason and Jeremiah Diah, the two gentlemen who were appointed to run the unfinished lines in 1761 between Pennsylvania and Maryland, on the territories subjected to the heirs of Penn and Baltimore. A temporary line had been run in 1738, but had not given satisfaction to the disputing parties, although it resulted from an agreement in 1739 between themselves. A decree had been made in 1618 by King James, delineating the boundaries between the lands given by charter to the first Lord Baltimore and those adjudged to his majesty (afterward to William Penn). which divided the tract of land between Delaware Bay and the eastern sea on one side and the Chesapeake Bay on the other by a line equally intersecting it, drawn from Cape Henlopen to the fourth degree of north latitude. A decree in chancery rendered the king's decree imperative.

"But the situation of Henlopen became long a subject of serious, protracted and expensive litigation, particularly after the death of Penn, 1718, and of Lord Baltimore in 1714, till John and Richard and Thomas Penn (who had become the sole proprietors of the American possessions of their father William), and Cecilus Lord Baltimore, grandson of Cecilus, the original patentee, entered into an agreement on the Thursday, Nov. 30, has been officially designated 10th of May, 1722. To this agreement a chart was appended, which ascertained the site of Cape Henlopen, and was delineated a division by an east and west line, running westward from that cape to the exact middle of the peninsula. Lord Baltimore became dissatisfied with this agreement and he endeavored to invalidate it. Chancery suits, kingly decrees and the investing public is still able to recognize a good proprietary arrangements followed which eventually produced the appointment of commissioners to run the temporary line. This was effected in 1789. But the cause in chancery being decided in 1759 new commissioners were appointed who could not, however, agree, and the question remained open till 1761, when the line was run by Messrs. Mason and Dixon."

of continued democratic agitation.

The President has showed his greatness by getting in behind this democratic demand and making it an administration measure. He laid aside all question of partisanship and came out boldly for the great democratic principle of the greatest good to the greatest number, and it is incumbent upon the democratic members of congress to rise to the same heights as have been attained by Theodore Roosevelt and secure for the masses this reform that is so generally demanded. The President realizes the futility of hoping for assistance from his own party.
