NOT RAISING THE DEAD BUT HEALING THE LIVING

The Remarkable Case of Daisy McCauley as Viewed by a Local Reporter

The remarkable recovery of Miss Daisy McCauley of Twelfth and Main streets. North Fort Worth, from an illness which held her a helpless invalid for twenty-two conths, is exciting the interest of the sitizens of that town and of Fort Worth. "It is the first time I have felt well or hopeful for more than two years.' said Miss McCauley to a Telegram re-

"It is the first time she has smiled in more than two years," said her mother. "Tears have been in her eyes for most of that time; now there is laughter. I do not understand it-I cannot explain it; all I know is that she was a helpless invalid despite the attentions at different times of sixteen doctors whom we had employed; now, as a result of the work of Dr. J. Austin Larson, who is at the Delaware hotel, she is gaining strength, has an appetite, is hopeful and

"I do not know much about it," said Miss McCauley, "except that I was so ill for a long, long while that I could not walk or hold up my head, and now I

can walk, can get into a buggy, and enjoy a long drive. This miracle has been wrought during the three weeks that I have been under Dr. Larson's treatment." There is ample substantiation of the statements of Miss McCauley and her mother. Mrs. John F. Grant, who lives across Twelfth street from the McCauley home, and who has taken Miss McCauley on the drives which, before Dr. Larson's visit, exhausted her, can tell and does tell the story; so does Rev. J. P. THE PRESIDENT'S RATE VIEWS

It is now stated about Washington that President Roosevelt has very radically amended the views which he held a year ago as to the character of the relief congress ought to afford to communities and individuals that suffer from discriminatory or unreasonable freight rates. The President now favors granting to the interstate commerce commission power to fix a maximum rate instead of a flat rate. Last winter he strongly advocated the flat rate, and it is said that perhaps five-sixths of the members of congress are also in favor of the flat rate.

If the President's ideas should be adopted, according to the senators and others who have made a lifelong study of the transportation problem, it would eventually create new complications as serious and disturbing as those which are responsible for the present agitation in behalf of reform. In his recent chat with Senators Cullom and Dolliver the President outlined the bill which he would like to see passed. He explained that he wanted the interstate commerce commission empowered to receive and pass upon complaints by shippers or communities concerning alleged unreasonable freight rates. Some members of congress have held that this is a greater evil than the mere overcharging of an individual shipper upon one or a number of consignments of freight, and are insisting that no measure which congress may pass will be even approximately satisfactory unless it contains provisions that will render discrimination between communities impossible. They insist, however, that the substitution of a maximum rate for a flat rate would place in the hands of the railroads abundant authority for carrying on discriminatory practices. The maximum rate could be just as elastic as the railroads desire to make it, and very few persons doubt that they would stretch its elasticity to the limit in some instances. This view of the maximum rate will be presented to President Roosevelt hereafter by members of the senate committee on interstate commerce, who are favorable to his rate reform ideas. They have no doubt that when the President is brought to understand the possibilities of the maximum rate as a medium of discriminatory practices he will again become the champion of the flat rate.

While the President was discussing railroad legislation with some callers the other day he said with a republican party in the city of Cincinnati and state chuckle: "I have just received a letter from my friend Senator Lodge, in which he assures me he is with me in my battle for railroad reform, but that he cannot support any bill that contemplates giving the interstate commerce commission power to initiate rates. I suppose that Senator Lodge knows that that

is all I want."
