

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 23 .- Russian Jews are without hope that the overthrow of the St. Petersburg bureaucracy means their own emanicipation. They will have to win their own victory from the new government that is to be formed in Russia, and it will be as hard for them to succeed.

The people in provincial Russia, after gaining the upper hand in their fight against absolutism, have begun, as their first act, a general massacre of Jews. In Odessa, Nijninovgorod Nicolaieff, Kischineff, everywhere where there are Jews and Gentiles, the Christians have celebrated their freedom from autocracy by turning on their Jewish fellow townsmen and treating them with a ferocity never excelled by the most bloodthirsty czarg

### A SEA LEVEL CANAL

After a great deal of discussion pro and con, it has at last been recommended by the engineering commission selected for that purpose, that the Panama canal be constructed on the level of the sea, do-Ing away with a cumbersome lock system. It is true that the lock and dam system would have been cheaper from a construction standpoint, but cheapness is not the matter to be considered in this connection. Anything that is worth doing at all is worth doing well, and as the canal is not a temporary expedient, but is being built for posterity as well as the present generation, it is but right and proper that the work should be done in the right manner. We are building the canal for all time, to provide ourselves and the world generally with better maritime facilities. If we build cheaply we can but expect disappointment at the result.

The Telegram thinks the people of the United States would very generally approve the determination by congress to have a sea level canal, and as they are the ones who must pay for it, they are the ones that should be pleased with the new developments. That the determination will meet the unqualified approval of the balance of the world goes without saying, for it is natural to suppose that Its desire is for the best facilities that can be provided. It can be expected, however, that the advocates of the lock and dam system will at once raise a cry of fraud or extravagance over the decision. The man who has a job in view, or who has an ax to grind, will be very much in evidence and prepared to make violent mouthings over the situation. This will have no appreciable effect on the great American people, however. The time has passed when much attention is paid to the agitator. The people want a square deal for themselves and a square deal for the people who are engaged in the great work of building the canal, the completion of which means so much for the country in general and the gulf states in particular. This great enterprise is meeting with powerful opposition from a number of sources, but it is going to be built just as fast as men and money can do the work. Secretary Taft recently made a speech in St. Louis, with the canal for a text, and told some inside facts.

Discussing the opposition to the canal and the difficulties of its construction, Secretary Taft said some of the opposition came "from those who are sincerely convinced that the Panama route is not a practicable route and that there are other and easier routes to be preferred. It is not to be expected that owners and managers of great transcontinental lines should become enthusiastic over an enterprise which, if carried to completion, must certainly affect the rates of freight between the Atlantic and Pacific coasts. Even now there is some question as to whether low rates and equality of service to all on the Parama railroad may not reduce transcontinental rates. Orders have been issued directing equality of service and rates to all and also a reduction of rates. But so congested is the railroad by transportation of material for the canal commission, and so interrupted is the traffic by quarantine and other causes, that it is impossible now to say what will be the effect of this policy under the conditions which we hope to make normal when all the commercial traffic and all the canal transportation can be promptly and easily cared for. But recurring to the obstacle found in the opposition of powerful interests to the building of the canal, it takes different forms. It is found in the misrepresentation of conditions on the isthmus, in unfounded reports concerning friction between those having authority in the canal work, in intimations of irregularities and frauds and favoritism in contracts without any evidence whatever to justify suspicion and generally in the constant suggestion of a presumption that the expenditure of millions of dollars in building the canal must involve what is called 'graft.' Doubtless congressional investigations will be held from time to time."

The general opinion is that Reed Smoot will be given the option of resigning as senator or quitting his position as apostle. On all sides he is censured for his part in the recent municipal election in Salt Lake City. Smoot is a resident of Provo. Nevertheless, he sought to dictate local politics all over the state, using the machinery of the Mormon church for his purpose.

Of course there was no danger. The old man was perfectly harmless and the knife was partially incased in the guard, but I didn't know that! Did Roosevelt?"

# OUR WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 23. Special to The Telegram

Mr. Cannon, who will be Speaker Cannon after the first Monday of next month, is charged by the democrats with having a scheme up his sleeve to cut the democratic representation on the house committees down to the lowest possible notch.

Democrats now in Washington, and among them some of the most influential of the minority, resent this. The probable action of the next speaker has aroused more comment among the democrats than any question of party policy that has yet been suggested. Mr. Cannon is charged with going back on his expressed opinion as to what he believed an aggressive minority should be, and arranging his plans to destroy that minority which he has often said acted as a desirable check over the majority.

Mr. Cannon will not have a virile minority if he carries out a plan to cut the democratic representation on the committees. The democrats claim that he is not giving them a "square deal," and they point to the fact that when they had a majority of 139 in the Fifty-second congress, and fewer members of congress, that the republicans had six on every committee and seven on some. They say that Mr. Cannon is contemplating giving them only five on each committee and giving the republicans one additional, thus making the committees stand five to twelve. The democratic contention is that the republicans have twenty-five less than two to one in the house, and that the almost exact proportion of membership on the committee would be six

He Has New Rate Bill

Representative Gordon Russell, one of the oldest lawyers in congress, has been giving much study to the railroad rate problem and as a result of his investigations he has proposed a bill which he will introduce in the house on the opening day of the

Judge Russell said in explanation of his railroad rate bill:

"I am not one of those who believe that in the enactment of railroad rate regulation we will find a legislative 'cure-all.' Undoubtedly much relief can be obtained by the people from the passage of a proper bill, but I do not think that any measure which has been proposed justifies the hysteria with which the railroads have regarded, or the hope on the part of many that in it will be found a remedy for all our ills.

"The avowed purpose of the measures introduced and proposed to be introduced is, in the main, to empower the interstate commerce commission to substitute a reasonable rate or practice for one which it finds, upon investigation, to be unreason-

"It is not to give the commission the general power of rate fixing, but, in a proper case, of rate

revising. "The weight of authority seems to settle the question of the right of congress to enact legislation in favor of that right. If railroad companies are correct when they assert that the rates and practices are now reasonable and just, then there is no reason why they should be disturbed at the prospect of a law which will clothe a tribunal with the power only

to correct them when they are not so. "The law, as it now stands, prohibits unreason-


