

WARNING TO REPUBLICANS

Commenting upon the result of the recent state and municipal elections, Leslie's Weekly calls attention to the fact that President Roosevelt's plurality of 505,000 in Pennsylvania and 225,000 in Ohio in 1904 has been succeeded by democratic pluralities for state officers in 1905.

Quoting the St. Louis Republic, which says that the defeats in these states means that the republican party has no popular asset except the President. whose actual value is not known until he has passed through the crucial test of the coming congress, Leslie's adds: "It will be well for republicans to ponder these facts. After a long series of disasters the democrats at last see a ray of hope ahead for their party. They will be encouraged to work harder from this time onward to the election of the next President than they otherwise would have done. This will mean a larger democratic vote than was polled in 1904. There will be no 2,500,000 plurality for the Roosevelt against a socialist democrat. In the congress of 1905-07, soon to open, the republicans will have to make a creditable record in order to get any plurality at all in 1908. The eyes of the country are on the republican party in a very critical way."

What the writer of this comment means by "socialist democrat" we don't know, but it is evident that he feels that investigations and rebellions against all kinds of bosses are signs of dissatisfaction with the way things have been going. If straws are indicative of the direction in which the political wind blows, there would have been more truth had the assertion been "in case the democratic pominee be nominated on a public ownership platform." He must be a superficial observer, indeed, who is not convinced that the general sentiment of the country at the present time is overwhelmingly in favor of public ownership.—Denver Times.

Not necessarily. The ownership of all public utilities is a demand that comes up from both demoerals and republicans who are more or less tinctured with socialism. But the real democracy of the country is unalterably opposed to that idea. There is also a growing sentiment apparently in favor of government regulation and control of almost everything in sight, and many of the things that are not in the open; but this is only the net result of the failure of state officials to enforce the laws that are already upon the statute books of every state-only an evidence of the impotency of the average state government, which fails to measure up in the proper

protection of its people.

There is a strong but mythical belief existing in the minds of the masses that the federal government is clothed with almost omnipotent power, and it is capable of dealing with any situation that presents itself. When the state government fails to measure up to the requirements of the public estimation, the disposition is to clamor for federal interference, and it is in this manner that government ownership and government control has been brought to the front as an impending issue. The Telegram believes that if each and every state government would do its duty in the enforcement of existing laws both issues would soon die the death to which they are already clearly destined.

The republican idea of a strong and centralized form of government is doing much, however, to foster and encourage this sentiment among the masses. And if the party leaders are wise they will begin to break loose from the present moorings. The centralized form of government means the maintenance of a great machine, which in time must destroy those who constitute its component parts through the rottenness and corruption that invariably springs into existence. This has been demonstrated in Pennsylvania and n Ohio, and it will be demonstrated in New York in the next state election. There is a warning for the republicans, which, if they are wise, they will hearken to.

The democratic theory of government is that the best government is that which governs least. and this is within itself ample refutation of the government ownership fallacy.

SETTING A BAD EXAMPLE

It is unfortunate that while the negroes of Texas are forming themselves together for the purpose of aiding in the enforcement of all laws that leaders of the race elsewhere are giving vent to some very inflammatory utterances. Henry M. Turner of Georgovernment and the United States supreme court in his annual address at the Macon conference a few days ago. He declared that no man hates the American nation any worse than he does, and he referred to the United States supreme court as a damnable institution, which had raped the negro | Partyism is all right in its place, but patriotism is of every vestige of human or manhood's rights. in concluding his address, which stirred his hearers to

a perfect frenzy of excitement, Turner challenged Thomas Dixon, Jr., to meet him on any platform in the country, and offered Dixon a bonus of \$500 to meet him. Among other things Turner said:

"I am not pleased with this-nation. No man hates this nation more than I do. When I go to say my prayers I have a struggle to get to the place where I am willing for God to allow the United States supreme court to have part in my prayer. That damnable institution which raped the negro of every vestige of human or manhood's rights-the men that compose that body may get to heaven the best way they can, but very little help God will grant them from any request I make.

"The negro will never be anything in this country but a scullion until he shows his manhood. Go to Africa and build up a great nation that will command the respect of the civilized world."

While Turner was talking about the treatment he alleges the negro is receiving, a negro preacher by the name of Smith interrupted him with this assertion: "The negro was given his freedom by the republican party, and his privileges have been killed by the same party." Bishop Turner replied:

"We recognize and agitate and pay men to stay at Washington and plead for the cutting down of southern representation, while the South is pleading for our disfranchisement, and much good could be accomplished, but the negro is a miserable coward. He just stays here and preaches 'heaven up yonder' and 'hell down yonder,' and says 'wait on the Lord.' Why wait on the Lord to do for you what you can do for yourself?"

The effect of this intemperate language throughout the South will be very unfortunate. It is well calculated to still further inflame race prejudice, and when race prejudice is inflamed the negro always suffers the most serious consequences. As the head of the negro Methodist church in the United States, Bishop Turner is in position to do his race much good if he would but direct his efforts in the proper channels. But when he openly acknowledges that he hates the white people of America, he is teaching his race the same abominable doctrine, and hate of the white man means hate of the white man's laws and a disposition to defy them when it can be done with fancied impunity. When the negro proceeds to deport himself in that manner he is but inviting deliberately the most serious and disastrous consequences, and Bishop Turner has been led into the commission of a most grievous error.

The negro has his grievances, as we all have our burdens to bear in life, but conditions are not such as to warrant such inflammatory diatribes from recognized negro leaders. The negro is strong numerically in the South, and back in former days was permitted to have things largely his own way from a political standpoint. But what the southern people could not do on account of inferior numbers was done in another manner, which has been upheld by the supreme court of the United States, and intelligence rules throughout the South. The negro has been largely eliminated from the political situation, but with him has been eliminated the poor white man who possessed the same electoral qualifications. a little better than ever before. As to the negro building up a strong nation in Africa, he was never able to do that when the country was entirely his own. With all of the bitterness that has been associated with his career in America, his days here have been his brightest and best days. He is a much superior being to what he was when he was brought over from this same Africa and sold as a human chattel, and his idea should be for the race to press forward in the great work of improvement and honestly try to still further improve. The hewer of wood and drawer of water cannot become a nabob within one generation. There must be a gradual evolution in the future as in the past, and the negro must learn for once and all that there is nothing to be gained from hating the American nation and American institutions.

SENATOR BAILEY DECLARES POSITION

Some of the Texas democrats have not been satisfied with the silence of Hon. Joseph Weldon Bailey. junior senator from the state of Texas, on the subject of railway rate regulation, and an open letter was recently published by leading Dallas citizens, asking him to define his position. The senator evidently takes umbrage at the interrogation and replies very sharply through the medium of the public press, asserting that he has stood for these ideas since before he attained his majority. The closing paragraph of his rejoinder-outlines his position, and is as follows:

"The demand to know whether I will support the President's recommendation seems to reduce the issue to the man rather than to the measure. The test with me on any question is not who recommends it, but whether it is right. I advocated the regulation of railroad charges through the instrumentality of a commission in the good old state of Mississippi before I was old enough to vote, and I have never wavered for a single moment in my conviction on that subject. While the present President was as silent on the subject as these gentlemen describe my Dallas speech to be, I was contending on every available occasion for an efficient railroad regulation law. and it sounds a little strange to be asked now if I will support the President's recommendation in that behalf. Although he accepted a nomination on a platform which made no mention of regulating railroad rates, and although both in his speech and in his letter of acceptance he was as silent on that question as the republican platform upon which he was a candidate, still if the President has the independence to turn from his own party's neglective position on that question and embrace the position of our party, he is entitled to receive, and he will receive the cordial support of every democrat. In supporting the President's recommendation for an efficient rate law, however, I feel that I am 'in line' with my own convictions, repeatedly declared through twenty years of public service, and 'in line' with the repeated declarations of the national democratic conventions, as well as 'in line' with the Presi-

OUR WASHINGTON LETTER

Special to The Telegram. WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 29. The controversy between Senator Foraker and former Senator Chandler as to the cause of republican defeat in Ohio has brought forth a startling explanation from Robert Miller, for many years editor of the bureau of publicity of the democratic congressional committee. "The vote for governor of Ohio," says Mr. Miller, "though it changed a republican plurality of 255,000 last year to about 43,000 democratic plurality this year, while the other republican candidates for state office were elected by from 30,000 to 40,000 plurality, is not the most extraordinary result in the Ohio election. The election of a democratic senate and the virtual tie vote in the lower house in the Ohio legislature is more surprising. The democratic gain of seats in the senate is 475 per cent, with nearly as great an increase in the house. If the state were not gerrymandered so artistically the democrats would have a two-thirds

Revolt Against Machines.

"The cause of this tremendous upheaval," declares Mr. Miller, "is not the railway rate question, a national issue, though the democratic position on this measure is squarely in line with public sentiment and helped to secure votes. The republican dissatisfaction was with the state and local leaders and their machines. It was a revolt against state and local ring rule, and a determination of the voters to establish a check on city councils and the legislature by installing the initiative and referendum. The democratic state convention, in line with the democratic national platform, declared for the establishment of majority rule, while the republican state convention spurned the idea. Then the hitherto docile republicans turned and swiped the machine.

Referendum an Issue The Ohio State Federation of Labor, at its annual convention, Oct. 4, reaffirmed its demand for the initiative and referendum and instructed the executive committee to question all legislative candidates and publish their replies 'to the end,' declared the convention, 'that the members of organized labor may not be betrayed into the support of their enemies.' Referendum Leagues, composed of business men and farmers, also questioned candidates. The republican candidates refused to pledge, while the democratic nominees pledged and then the indignant republican voters scratched their tickets."

Mr. Miller is of the opinion that this wonderworking method of campaigning against republican misrule will be accepted in other states, and that democratic victories next year may extend to the election of a democratic congress.

Rate Legislation

Two men who will figure prominently in the rate egislation of the coming congress exchanged greetings with the President today. They are both popularly reported to be averse to the attitude of the President in some respects. They are Senator Kean of New Jersey and Senator Millard of Nebraska, both members of the senate committee on interstate commerce, which began consideration today of a report to be made to the senate shortly after the opening of congress. Senator Foster, democrat, of Louisiana, likewise a member of the committee, called to see the President. Senators Elkins, Aldrich, Kean, Foraker and Millard are put down as five republicans of the committee who will not agree to as far-reaching legislation as the President wants and some of them are not in favor of any legislation at all except some strengthening of the existing laws

Senators Cullom, Dolliver and Clapp are republis put down as favoring such legislation as President favors. Senator Foster is placed in the same class, although a democrat.

Senator Millard said that he felt confident there would be some "conservative" legislation on the railroad rate question.

New York Politics

Representative J. Sloat Fassett of New York made a call at the white house. Mr. Fassett, like other New York republicans, is intensely interested in the New York situation. He is known to feel that there must be a reorganization of the party all along the line if it is to go to the people hereafter with prospects of success. This is also regarded as the attitude of the President, Secretary Root and Postmaster General Cortelyou.

"What Mr. Fassett describes as the "recrudescence of the civic conscience of the people" is expected to play havoc with some of the old-time leaders in various parts of the state. As to the suggestion that the people are not hunting leaders now and want to get along without one, Secretary Taft suggests they should do in Ohio, Mr. Fasset is not so certain.
