County Farmers End Season With Best Cotton Crop Yet

Castro County farmers apparently made the lushest cotton crop in history this year as the U. S. Department of Commerce rated production at 51,658 bales by December 1.

At the same time last year the county had produced 34,458 bales according to the Department. The figures were made public last week. There has been much specu-

tion over the county during past weeks over actual production. The only criteria checked to this time has been gin records by the News and these figures disclosed an excess of 47,000 bales. Since

last year's final was in the neighborhood of 50,000 bales and production at December 1 was about 20,000 bales ahead of last year, it is possible the final tabulations will give Castro County almost 70,000 bales for the 1956 season. However an earlier harvest this year than last might well have an effect on this figure.

The Department gave the state a total of 3,398,756 bales on December 1, which was about 135,000 less than last year. While the state as a whole slipped on cotton production, the nine major cotton producing counties in the Panhandle increased their yield with the exception of Briscoe which dropped about 400 bales. As usual, Lubbock county led the pack with a prodigious 165,084 bales.

Over the United States as a whole, 12,788,884 bales have been produced and Texas accounted for better than one-fourth of this total to lead the states of the nation in cotton production. Breaking it down further, Castro County produced about .004 of the nation's yield. This county had ginned more cotton by December 1 than had the cotton-producing states of Florida, Illinois, Kentucky and Virginia.

The Lubbock classing office had received 1,603,798 bales for classification up to December 20. Of that classified 49.8 per cent was white; 49.8 spotted; 2 per cent gray.

Staple was excellent 78.6 per cent below 7-8 of an inch. Bulk of the crop was in the range of the sort of staple goal cotton experts have set for this area—15-16ths give or take a thirty-second of an inch. For the season 11.8 percent stapled 29.32; 25.6 was 15-16 and 26.1 was 31-32 to make 63.5 percent of the total.

The cotton harvest was virtually over by December 1 this year and county gins have shut down.

Three Injured In Collision Here Thursday

One of the most violent accidents in the history of the county this year occurred about 5:15 Thursday afternoon just outside the north Dimmitt City Limits on Highway 51. There were no lives lost, however.

The accident occurred when a car, driven by Willie Pearl Jackson, a colored female, collided with the rear of a pickup driven by R. S. Vestal, superintendent of Dimmitt Public Schools. The Jackson car bounced off the rear of the pickup into the left-hand lane and collided head-on with another pickup belonging to Pioneer Natural Gas Company and driven by Mr. Fred Batterman. The gas company pickup was thrown on its side and the front end of the Jackson car smashed beyond repair.

No one was seriously injured in the accident. Two Negro passengers were with the Jackson woman and all three were hospitalized but their condition is reported as not serious. They suffered a few cuts and lacerations. Mr. Batterman was not injured nor was Mr. Vestal. The pickup driven by Mr. Vestal suffered only negligible damage. The gas company pickup was heavily damaged, although probably not beyond repair.

SISTER BENEDICT MARIE BORGERDING
General Science, Biology, Bookkeeping, Typing

Sister Benedict Marie Borgerding is a versatile person in her teaching, for she instructs her pupils in general science, biology, bookkeeping and typing. She is another teacher in the Nazareth Public Schools who lists her home town as Fort Smith, Arkansas.

Sister Benedict Marie taught for three years formerly at Nazareth and is now in the first year of her return. In other schools she has taught chemistry and home economics.

She has attended three institutions of higher learning and holds a B.A. in Chemistry from Mount St. Scholastica College in Atchison, Kansas. She also attended St. Louis University in St. Louis, Mo., and State Teachers College in Conway, Arkansas. Her summer occupation is graduate work in Home Economics at St. Louis University.

The Dimmitt High School will hold its annual basketball tournament January 3, 4, and 5 with some of the top schools of the Plains participating.

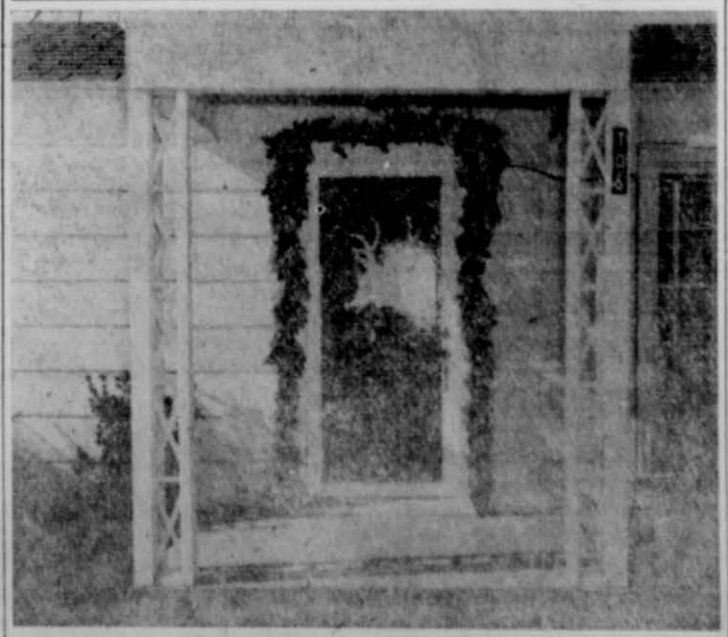
This will be the last tournament this year for most of the schools and each team is expected to be close to top form with everyone pointing for a win before they start their district play.

Bula girls will bring one of the best records into the tournament after winning the Abernathy tournament over the Dimmitt Bobbies 79 to 72. The favored

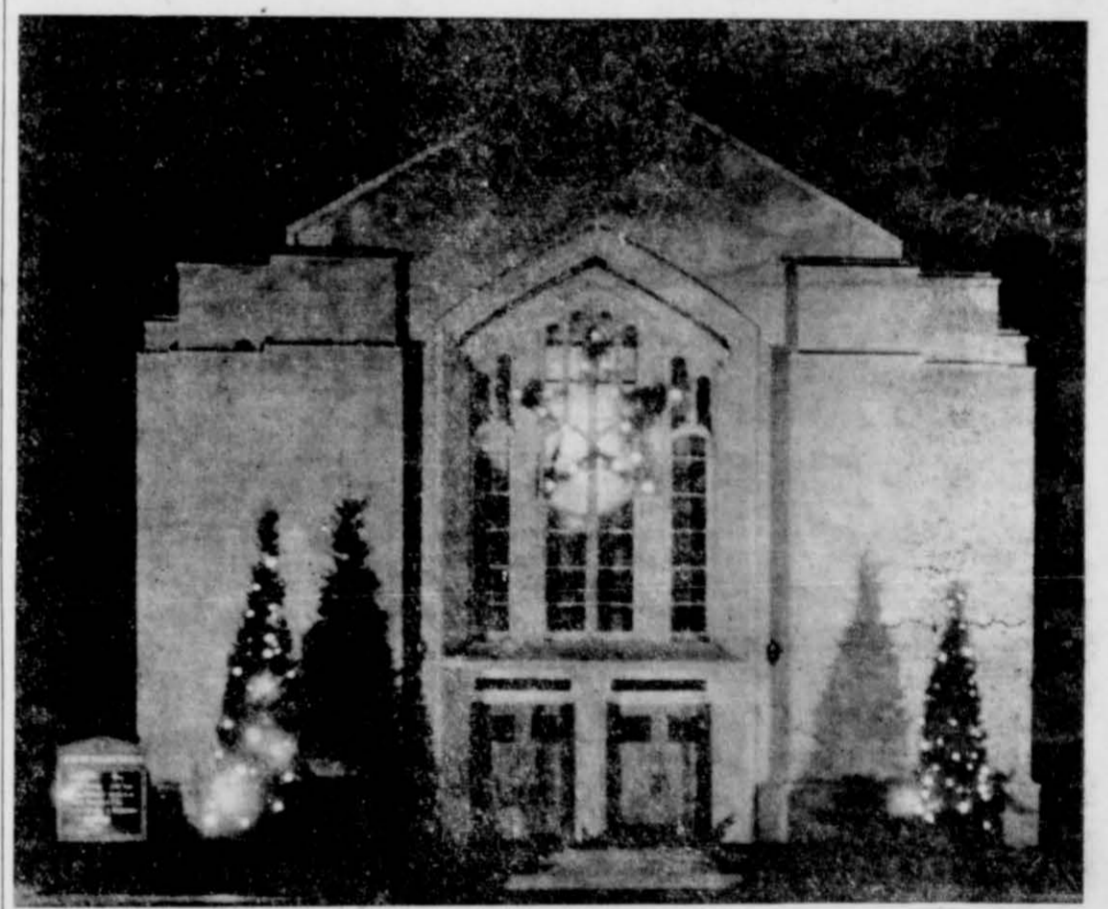

In the boys division Slaton, Vega and Nazareth are considered the top contenders.

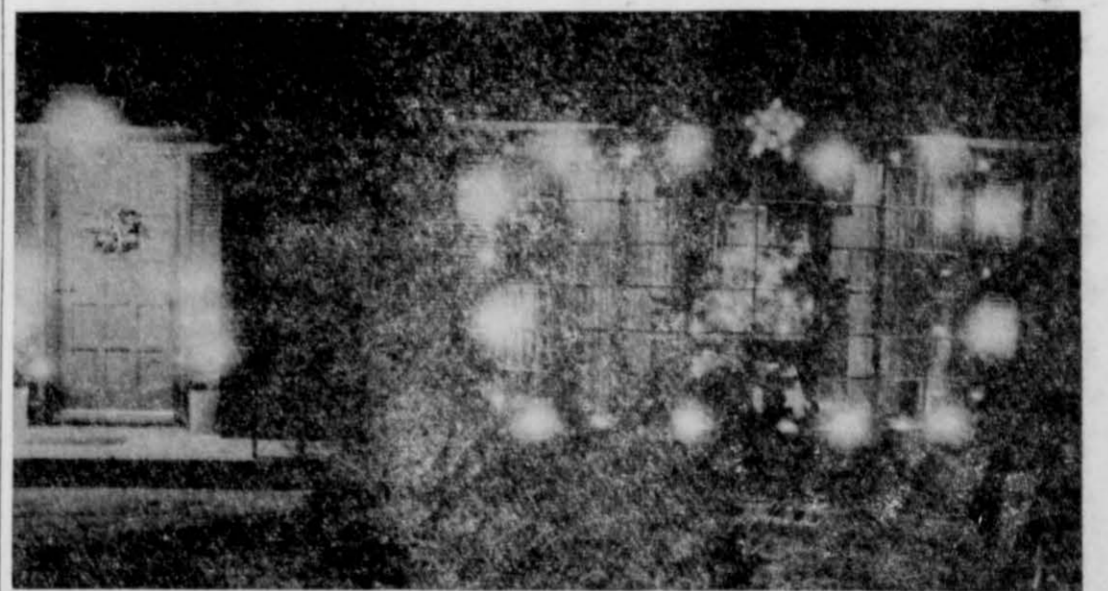

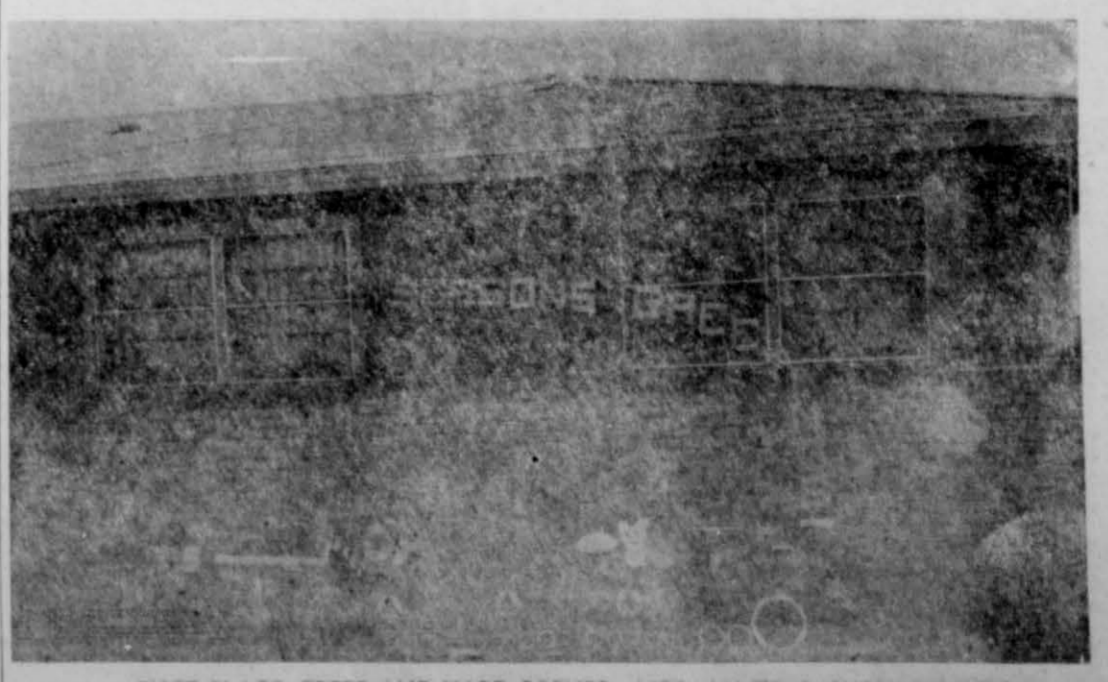
