You may have believed that you were only doing as others had done before you-exercising a sort of human license, as it were, but right there you were tried in the crucible of true manhood and failed to assay pure gold. The dross in your composition was so great that the precious metal was completely lost in the shuffle. Right there you determined for yourself just what your future career should largely be.

And the next time you were tempted yielding was much easier. Thus it was during all of your downward career. As it became easier to stifle the admonitions of your conscience, the enormity of your transgressions increased. You soon reached the point where you were willing to go all the gaits and do anything that did not involve absolutely a term in the state penal institution. But you are not yet safe. If you are still adhering to these methods your sins are going to find you out sooner or later. You are sowing a crop of dragon's teeth, and the harvest will be reaped in sadness and tears in due time.

How many of the respectable young men of the world today would be behind prison bars if they had what is coming to them? How many are clothed in the garb of honesty on account of having their sins covered up, who should be wearing the stripes of a felon?


VICTOR HUGO AS A BABY AND A YOUTH.

No such wonder is known in the world at the Mariposa Big Tree Grove, and to spend a week or more amid these solltudes, sleeping among trees of such size, camping out or sleeping on the ground beside and beneath them, is to some men one of the great privileges to be had in California. The Big Tree Grove is eight miles from Wawona, and the forest, which covers an area of about two miles square. stands on a gentle slope of the mountains, forming what is known as the upper and the lower grove. It is not the largest, but is the easiest reached, and contains trees that make the impression of a lifetime upon the average person.

For years the Yosemite and its adjacent big trees was a secret bidden away in the heart of the forest, and known only to the few natives who happened to cross the range at this point from the desert beyond; and we can imagine the surprise and terror of the man who first came upon this vast gash in the earth from the East, stood, and looked down into it. There are 250 trees in the lower grove and 325 in the upper, spiendid spiresstepping stones that connect today with the time when the Christian era began.

The effect of the big trees on different people varies. As I write I have one in view-1 see it every day in Pasadena, Cal .-- a young one, not over 30 feet in height, yet few people pass it by without turning to look at it again.
