





There is no question but that the referendum is a good things if it can be made representative of public sentiment, but the experience Fort Worth has already had in this direction clearly established the fact that the referendum in its present shape is defective and affords too many opportunities for designing persons to accomplish their purpose at the expense of the city. The procedure suggested by Judge Lassiter will but serve to strengthen the measure through the elimination of existing imperfections, and that is just exactly what the people of Fort Worth want and require. If the plan suggested by Judge Lassiter is adopted it will have the further effect of making the seeker after franchises under the referendum plan just a little bit more particular in the character of the proposition submitted, and it is clearly apparent that this safeguard is badly needed. The people should not be left absolutely at the mercy of the corporation who wants something for nothing. Neither should the diffidence usually prevalent in elections of this kind be permitted to longer remain as the decisive factor in the situation. Let the city council see that the proposed measure is all right before it is submitted to the people, and if the recommendations of the council are not accepted by the franchise seeker, let both propositions be passed up to the people. There is universal fairness in that

note to the situation. As the day for the primaries draws nearer, it but becomes more apparent that Judge Lassiter is the real champion of the people in this campaign. He stands for all those principles dear to the heart of progressive Fort Worth, and the tide that set in his direction early in the campaign already promises to sweep onward to a glorious victory. THE TWENTY-EIGHT HOUR LAW

The cattlemen of Texas and the Southwest are represented at Washington by a strong delegation of representative stockmen, who are there to urge upon congress the necessity of amending the twenty-eight hour law. This law was enacted by congress nearly twenty-five years ago, and governs the shipment of cattle to market, providing among other things the number of hours the stock shall be confined in cars while in transit without feed and water. Its passage was inspired by a genuine humanitarianism, and there is no doubt that it was a good and proper law at the time of its enactment.

But conditions have been changing from back at have these changes been more apparent than during for the big advance in the price of shoes.

the time this law has been in effect. Railways are no longer conducted on the same principles that were in vogue when this law was necessary. The rights of way and streaks of rust that did service in those days as great arteries of commerce have been succeeded by great steel highways, built and operated upon the highest plane of excellence that money and ability could devise and procure. The ramshackle old cars in which cattle were then crowded and hauled at a snail's pace have given place to modern palace stock cars equipped with all modern appliances for safety and comfort for the animals. Feeding, and resting pens have been established at suitable intervals, and there is no stock shipper in the country who does not thoroughly appreciate and try to enforce the sentiments that are serving as the inspiration of the good people who are opposed to any change in the existing law.

It is a reasonable proposition that the men who raise and sell the cattle are the best judges of the time they should be confined in cars without feed, water and rest. It is an established fact that the price that is to be obtained for the cattle when they reach their destination is largely dependent upon their condition upon arrival, and of they are starved and otherwise mistreated while in transit the loss must fall upon the men who have produced them and are seeking to market them. And while the average shipper may be calloused and hardened in some things, when you begin to strike him in the near vicinity of his pocketbook you are nailing him very close to his heart. The owners of these cattle are the ones most interested, and their desires in the premises should receive at the hands of congress the most serious consideration.

The humane societies of the country are to be commended for their zeal in the premises, for it shows they are consistent in the great work to ameliorate the conditions usually attached to the dumb brute. But in this case it is so clearly a case of misdirected energy as to inspire the hope that they will not further antagonize the real stockmen of the country in the effort they are making to do what is only right and proper under the circumstances.

WHY SHOULD A WOMAN HANG

There was enacted in the state of Vermont Friday a tragedy that should cause every American citizen to blush with a mantle of scorching shame. It makes no difference that this tragedy was enacted with the sanction and approval of the law, and it was but the culmination of the old idea of justice embodied in the demand of an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth. It makes no difference that the principal in this tragedy was guilty of the heinous crime of murder, and according to the laws of the land should render up a life in return for a life. principal in this Vermont tragedy was a woman.

Think of it, men of America-a woman summarily out to death in a shameless manner upon the gallows in free and civilized America, where men boast of their chivalry, and where the stars of civilization are alleged to shed their brightest and most refulgent

Tear away the curtain that enveloped that unhappy home, and see if there were not things there that are calculated to mitigate this woman's offense. We cannot know now, for the principals are both dead. But we can believe that when Mary Rogers plighted her troth and gave her love to the man she afterwards slew she genuinely loved him. Women do not usually mate with men they do not love, and there was no thought of murder in Mary Rogers' heart until something had happened to turn her from that love. The fact that she killed with intent to link her life with another goes to prove that love was the inspiration for the crime.

> And would you hang a woman for the crime of loving?

Woman was created to love. It is the very quintesence of her nature. It permeates every fibre of her being. No woman can exist in this world without the blessings of love, and when love is stifled in her heart all that is womanly is sacrificed.

This woman should have been punished, but there are many ways by which the ends of justice could have been attained without resorting to the expedient of sending her to the scaffold. The shame of hanging a woman could have been obviated by imprisonment for life. There need not have been such a reflection cast upon American manhood.

But the demand of the law was inexorable, and poor Mary Rogers has paid the price. More than this human soul cannot do.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 9.

and former republican delegate from that territory. "While in Washington this winter I shall do what I can to prevent what I consider an outrage," he said. "It is true," he continued, "that there are some men in Arizona, and quite a numeb of New Mexico, espacially from Albuquerque, who are anxious to see Arizona admitted to the union, no matter how she

comes in, even if she is tied to New Mexico. "No man is more anxious to see Arizona admitted than myself, but we-and I can speak for the bulk of the thinking men of my territory-are opposed to being joined to New Mexico in order to get in. If we cannot get into the union any other way we prefer to stay out. Disagreeable Features

"The reasons why this 'union' is disagreeable to us are many. First of all, there are pronounced racial differences; then there are no common interests between the two territories. Third, there is the difference of low practice, the New Mexicans practicing under the common law, while we are under a code; fourth, each territory has its own public buildings, and an entire difference of resources and liabilities.

"But one of the greatest objections is the enormous distances we would have to travel if we were united, making us almost another Texas. We would be as large as New England, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, West Virginia and Maryland combined, The whole idea is repugnant to us, and because half a dozen men say otherwise that is no proof that they carry with them the indorsements of the terri-

tory of Arizona. Puts Blame on Politics

"The easterners are anxious for this 'unholy union', because, first, they do not want any further senatorial representation than can be helped for fear of 'diluting' their senatorial power. They think they can offset this by making Arizona and New Mexico into one homogeneous whole republican state. But this is not such a sound argument to any one who knows how easily states may change their politics."

The ex-governor intimated that the Albuquerque people are anxious for the annexation in the hope of making their city the capital, and, therefore, a

In speaking of industrial conditions in Arizona, the ex-governor said: "Arizona is happily in the midst of three colossal booms-in the development of its mines; in the storing up of water for irrigation, and in the building of railroads."

The governor and his colleagues advocated reciprocity and general tariff revision, and the opponents eloquently preached the "stand pat" doctrine. The newspapers of Iowa point to the President's rebuke as having indicated that he was not in sympathy with reciprocity or tariff revision. Beef Trust Forces Up Shoe Prices

A direct appeal for free hides comes from Chicago, so the West joins with New England on this question. Predictions of a serious shortage in shoes and an increase in prices that may go to almost any extent are made by Chicago shoe merchants. They are backing up the manufacturers who are organizing for a visit to Washington with a view to having the duty taken off hides. The cause of the shortage is placed at the doors of the beef trust, although it is conceded that leather is naturally not so plentiful as it once was. It is declared that the duty placed on the import leather has netted some packing interests from \$3,400 to \$4,000 daily since the tariff law went into effect. It is no secret that since the safety valve of the immense hide imports of South America has been closed the Armours and some of the other big packing men have been forcing tanners to sell their plants to the combine, until it now controls more than three-fourths of the output of tanneries in the entire country. An instance was cited of a large tanner in this state who would not sell. The packers had so completely cornered the hides by last July that he was forced to seek his hides from them. He wrote asking for prices of 1,500 hides, and was told that the houses were 500 carloads behind and could not sell him

NOTES FROM THE FAR-AWAY EAST

The Japanese Army Will Be Out of Manchuria by First of April

The Japanese paper Asahi Shimbun says that in consequence of the financial engagements into which the government has entered it will be useless to expect the abolition of the special war taxes at the end of December, 1906, as provided by law. The government would only have to impose other taxes to take their place, so that there would be no difference in the end.

The evacuation of Manchuria by the Japanese is reported to be going on so rapidly that it is expected that the army will all be out of the country by April next. Some 150 transports are engaged embarking the returning troops at Tairen. formerly Dalny, Port Arthur and Korean ports, and transporting them to Moji, Ujina and Hyogo.

It is reported at Nagasaki that the Russian sick and wounded now in Siberia and Manchuria will be brought to that place for treatment and recuperation on account of the milder climate. The Russian naval hospital and establishment at Nagasaki being inadequate for the purpose, Gen. Daniloff, who is chief of the Russian mission for receiving the prisoners now in the hands of the Japanese. is, it is said, arranging for an extension of accommodation.

A revised list of the Russian prisoners in Japan at the beginning of November shows that there were 71.973 of all ranks. The officers numbered 1,438 and the men 70,535. Of the total, 1,921 were patients in various hospitals.-New York Sun.
