## \*Cold' Checks **Investigated** By Grand Jury

'Cold' checks given to hay raisers in the irrigation district of Floyd county, during the past season, which came in for investigation by the grand jury this week, are due to result in tangles with law enforcement for at least five truckers.

Six indictments have been returned into district court, and one man is in custody. The checks given ranged in amount from \$112.50 to \$305.50. The total of the six checks is approximately \$1,500. The checks were written in payment for hay bought directly from the raisers. The man in cusody is C. F. Hobson, of Abilene, married, 40, who gave a check for \$305.50 to Bill Wesley of Aiken, it is alleged in the indictment. Four others are involved and arrusts are expected in the next few weeks.

More Check Trouble

If you want a strange check cashed at a store in most any West Texas town mark it "labor". Acting on this axiom two young men, who have since beer learned to be named Allen Uxer and James R. Barrett, with a New Mexico address, passed a series of drive. forged, fictious checks in the county four of them in Floydada, it is charged. All had the sterling "labor" notation in the corner and were in sums of \$28 plus to \$29 plus. Each is the basis for an indictment that was re turned by this week's sessions of the grand jury.

District Attorney John B. Stapleton said the Floyd County sheriff, Leland A. Hart, located the two young men through the sheriff's office at Brownfield and the youthful men are in jail there. They are said to have made confessions. All the checks were dated October 30. Two more checks of the same kind have turned up in the hands of Lockney firms.

I am a little suspicious of bad girls (and that's what you call yourself in your letter) who turn around and charge that other Americans are so rotten that they are ready to deprive a hapless wonian of liberty, toss her into jail, trump up evidence and try her for treason just to have a goat.

Your words over Radio Toxyo constituted psychological warfare and aided and abetted Japan in its attempt to destroy Americans and conquer the United States, where you were

What is psychological warfare? Col. Mori, chief of Japanese Intelligence in China, when testifying before a U. S. #### **Development of Bicycles** Traced to 1816 'Caleripede'

Joseph B. Niepce, French physicist best known as one of the inventors of photography, was active in other fields as well. In 1816 he invented the "celeripede," or "hobbyhorse"-two wheels and a crossbar upon which the rider sat while he propelled himself with his feet against the ground. It was the forerunner of the modern bicycle.

There were a few minor improvements during the next two or three years. But the price was high and the machine was not within the reach of ordinary folk; thus it became known as the "dandy horse." It even reached America, but the natural crudities of the device finally ended the craze.

The idea of propelling oneself on wheels, however, had taken root. The velocipede, or "boneshaker," was the first crank-driven blcycle, in 1865 named. With heavy wooden wheels, thick iron tires and a massive iron backbone, these machines were extremely heavy and they vibrated in a terrifying manner over the rough

Then came the tall "ordinary," with front wheels sometimes over five feet in height. But it was not until 1876-a little over 70 years ago-when H. J. Lawson invented the first rear-driven bicycle. Then followed many patented improvemests and in 1877 Col. Albert A. Pope of Boston organized the Pope Manufacturing company, launching the bicycle-making industry in the United States.

Pneumatic rubber tires followed in 1889. Free wheels, which enabled the bicycle to coast, were introduced in 1894. By the turn of the century the tandem, or "bicycle built for two," had become exceedingly popular. The bicycle industry, spurred invention, soomed to new

Today it is estimated that more than 60,900,000 bicycles are in use throughout the world, 12,000,000 of them in the United States.

#### Italian Riviera Is Cheaper Than French


