All persons not less than seventeen (17) and not more than twenty-two (22) years of age as of July 1, 1951, who desire to apply for entrance to the United States Military Academy or the United States Naval Academy should immediately write Walter

Rogers, Congressman-Elect for the Eighteenth Congressional District, at Box 1699, Pampa, Texas.

The examinations will be conducted by the United States Civil Service Commission and will be given to candidates on Monday, January 15, 1951. Names of those desiring to undergo the examination should be in the hands of Walter Rogers not later than December 15, 1950, as this information must be furnished the Civil Service Commission not later than December 18, 1950. The examinations will be conducted at points that will readily accessible to persons desiring to take the same. Any person desiring to take the examination should undergo a thorough physical examination by a qualified physician, so that the possibility of passing the written examination and then being rejected by the medical officer will be avoided.

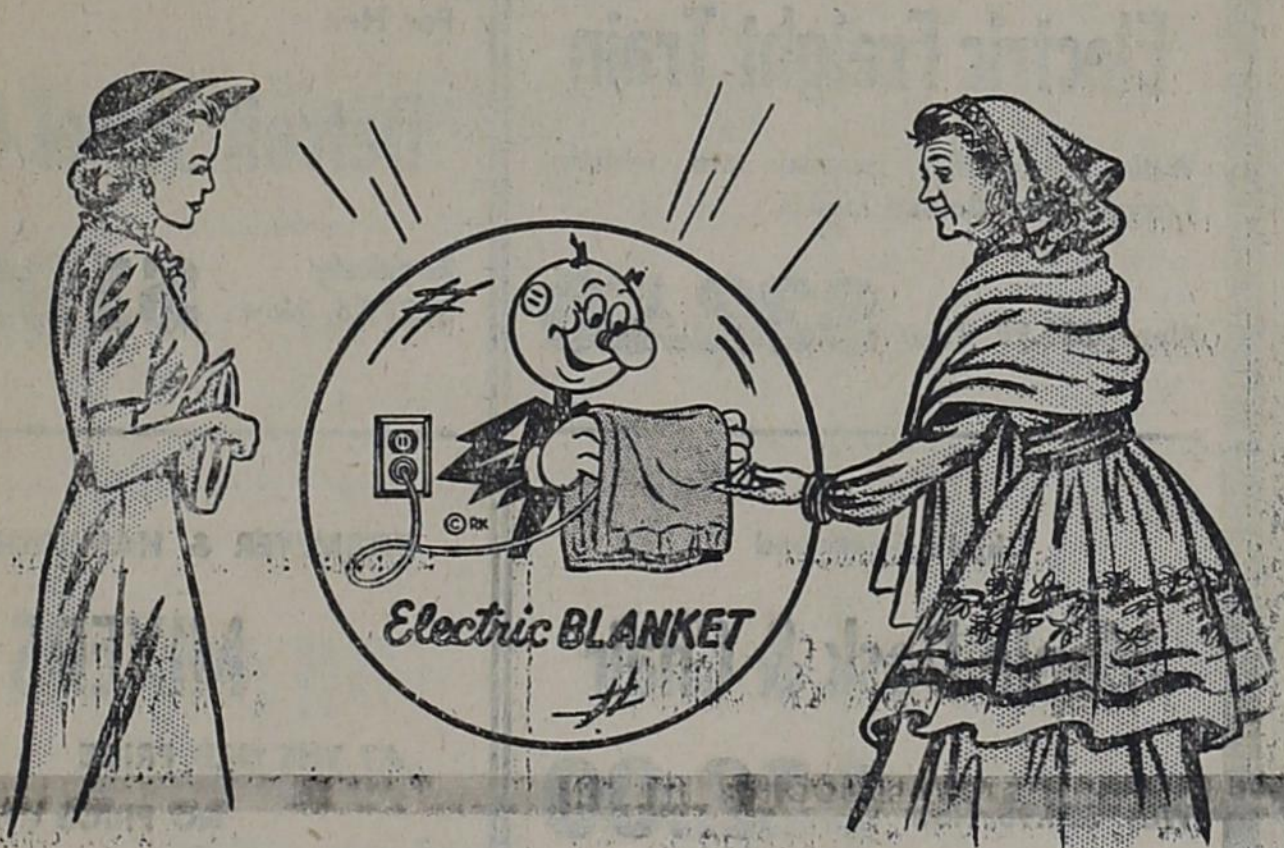

Health Talks . . .

When you walk into your doctor's office, shake his hand and sit down in the chair, he has made a rather hurried survey of your extremities. The way you use your feet and legs, the grasp and feel of your handshake, the movement of your arms and shoulders, and the way you bend at the hips to put yourself in the chair may give him enough information right there to know where to look further for danger signs to your health.

Starting at the lower extremities and working up, he will note blemishes on your toes and feet, knots that may speak of gout or calluses, toes that are webbed or missing, toe nails that separate from the beds, arches that are not there—denoting flat feet. The movement of the ankle, the turning in of the foot or too much turning out of the foot, all these are noted when he checks those feet and toes.

The legs are checked for sores, arising from outside influences or from the inside out. Distended and discolored veins are always important as to how they may affect the circulation of the legs and the feet. Legs that bow in or out may be due to disease that would be located elsewhere in your body. Oversized knee-caps or knees that don't bend easily may be significant.

Pain around the hip joint may be caused by diseases of the spine, nerve inflammation or dislocation in that joint.

Your joints are the hinges of your body, some of them operat-

ing on a limited motion, some on a full circular motion. Where those bones come together to form the joint, the enlarged ends of the bones are covered with cartilage, between the cartilages where they rub together is located a small sac called a bursa, and oiling the joint is stuff that looks like the white of an egg. All these things work together to form easy-moving joints and when any of them get out of whack, such as too much oil in that joint or too little, then the joint is likely to hurt, get stiff, and maybe swell and redden.

Then the muscles that keep that joint flexible as it should may dwindle and as the muscle shrinks there is a pulling such as is sometimes seen in arthritis. Diseases of the joints frequently lead to deformities.

There are other causes of deformities of the extremities, of course. Those present at birth are called congenital deformities and those that occur later are called acquired deformities. Injury, disease and amputation lead to acquired deformities.

Changes in feeling of the extremities may also be important. Heat, cold, pain or no feeling at all in certain areas certainly belong in the report of a medical examination.

The upper extremities include the shoulder, arm, wrist and fingers. They may offer much health information. As mentioned before, the way you shake your doctor's hand may tell him something about your health. Certainly a hearty, firm handclasp is associated with well-being, whereas a limp, cold hand may be significant of undue nervousness. A warm, moist hand is sometimes associated with thyroid trouble.

Hands that shake all by themselves not only mean health

trouble, but the different ways and different times they shake are by themselves important. Hands that tremble when at rest may signify one disease, whereas those that are steady at rest but start trembling when put to work may mean something entirely different.

Short, quick trembling or shaking of the hands would fit into one category and a rough, coarse shaking over a prolonged period would lead to another type of medical diagnosis if it fits in with other signs which the doctor had already picked up during the course of the physical examination.

Oversized hands, clubbed fingers, nails that curve in from top to bottom as well as from side

to side, nails that separate from the bed may have a special bearing upon the fortune of your good health as your doctor checks your extremities, or limbs, in the medical examination.

A Moment of Time

It takes only a moment to write a check or slip some bills in an envelope. If the envelope is addressed to the Texas Tuberculosis Association, that brief moment may help save a life.

Some of us neglected to take that moment to acknowledge our Christmas Seals when we received them in our mail last November. It is easy to put something like this aside during the busy,


pre-Christmas days. But it is not too late to take a moment off to make our return for the Seals. Funds realized from the sales of Christmas Seals are the sole financial support of the association in its work to bring tuberculosis under complete control in our community. The activities of the association include such worthwhile projects as case-finding and health education.

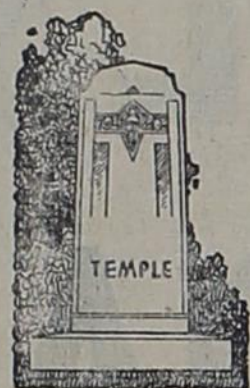

part of its citizens is ever present. Because the efforts of the community can best be directed through the Chamber of Commerce.

The Castro County of tomorrow is being built today, and the continuous use of manpower is an essential factor in the building of a community. It is the duty and obligation of every citizen to devote some of his time toward the civic, commercial and agricultural development of his community.

Some people have the idea that the Chamber of Commerce is a social organization, or an organization that has the specific purpose of propogandizing for the businesses of our cities and towns, and some even want to compare it to a luncheon, but the Chamber of Commerce can not be classified as either.

The Chamber of Commerce is a business organization composed of both commercial and agricultural members of the area in which it serves, for the purpose of devoting its full time to the commercial, civic and agricultural development of that area. Its Constitution and By-Laws clearly defines that its activities shall be non-partisan, non-sectional, non-sectarian, and shall take no part in, or lend its influence to the election or appointment of any candidate for national, state, county, or town office.

the same time. Gardner is cooperating with the Running Water (Castro County) Soil Conservation District and receives assistance from technicians of the Soil Conservation Service whenever he needs it in carrying out his conservation practices.

By the way, I'm interested in learning what all of you conservation farmers are doing along this line, so if it's not too much trouble I'd appreciate it a lot if you'd drop me a card whenever you plant some improved pasture, or some winter peas, or hairy vetch, or anything else along this line that would be of some help to other farmers. Maybe, you planted some last year and now have figures on the results of some good practices that pay off. What I want to do is spread information. If you had some bad results with some practice or other we'd like to know that, too, so that we can all profit by each other's mistakes and also by each other's good fortune.

Castro County is at least as good and I believe it's better than any other county around here, but we are not pushing our county like we should. A farmer told me the other day that a friend of his wanted to buy a farm. After showing him one of our better farms which happened to be for sale, this man said, "Well, I don't know. I believe I'll buy a farm around Hereford because I've read and heard a lot about the land around there." So, come on, you farmers. Shoot me the dope about what you are doing and I'll see that other people will read and hear about it.

EASY FRUITCAKE

- 1 cup candied cherries
- 1 cup candied pineapple
- 1 cup dates
- 2 teaspoons candied orange peel or grated orange rind
- 1 cup salted pecans
- 1 lb. marshmallows
- 1 cup light cream
- 2 cups graham cracker crumbs
- 2 teaspoons cherry juice or other fruit juice
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice

Chop up cherries, pineapple, dates, orange peel and nuts not too fine. Then cut marshmallows in quarters right into top of double boiler or saucepan (scissors do a fast job). Add cream and cook over boiling water until marshmallows are melted.

Remove from stove and beat the marshmallow mixture with an egg beater until fluffy and smooth as velvet. Now let the mixture cool to the luke-warm stage.

Pat graham cracker crumbs firmly onto bottom and sides of a well-oiled deep baking dish or bread pan. Save out a few crumbs to sprinkle over top of this holiday fruitcake.

Stir chopped fruits, nuts and fruit juices into marshmallow mixture well. Spoon into crumb-

lined pan, sprinkle top with crumbs and cool in your refrigerator overnight.
