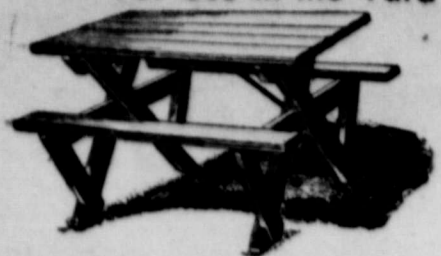


Sturdy Table Ideal For Use in the Yard

UNIVERSITY MEDICAL SCHOOL STUDIES POLIO

GALVESTON, Texas—Some dimes Texans contributed to the March of Dimes have come home to go to work in the medical research fight against polio.

Basil O'Connor, national Foundation for Infantile Paralysis president, and University of Texas President T. S. Painter, have announced jointly a \$2,650 March of Dimes grant to aid scientists at the University of Texas Medical Branch here continues research on how polio virus enters the body through the alimentary tract.

The investigation on polio virus infection was initiated in 1947 to determine through what sections of the food passages polio virus gains access to the nerve cells in the brain and spinal cord, and to find out where the virus multiplies in the food passages.

Plant Tomato Seeds Now For Early Start

COLLEGE STATION—In order to get an early start with tomatoes, it's necessary to plant the seeds now in a plant box or hotbed.

The tomato seedlings can sprout seed now and spend the next six to eight weeks under protection from the cold, growing big enough for transplanting, when all danger of frost has passed.

For the average home garden, says J. F. Rosborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A. & M. College, a small plant box can be built 18 inches wide, 30 inches long and four inches deep. The soil should be made up of equal parts of compost material and good garden loam soil, thoroughly pulverized and packed.

It's suggested that the rows be four inches apart, and the tomato seed planted three per inch in rows running the width of the box. Cover the seed one-fourth inch deep and sprinkle the soil well with warm water to speed up germination. On warm days the plant box may be left in the sunlight on the porch, but brought inside when the temperatures drop below 40 degrees F.

When the plants get to be two or three inches high, it's a good idea to thin them to spacing of four inches between plants. But don't throw away the ones you thin out. Shift them over to another box, or give them to a neighbor who may have also prepared a tomato box.

After growing in the plant box for six or eight weeks, the seedlings will be about eight inches high. Then they're ready for transplanting into the open garden when all danger of frost is over, and water them good before setting them out, suggests Rosborough.

In order to have your tomato seedlings ready to set out in the garden on time, it's a good idea to start the plant box preparation around seven weeks before the usual date of the last killing frost.

The book, sub-titled "A Study in British Heritage and Colonial Freedom," is Texas Tech's research publication number 12.

District Wheat Variety School Is Scheduled

Grain buyers for country elevators, flour mills and sub-terminals as well as county agents, highschool vocational teachers, veterans training instructors, and certified wheat growers all will have another opportunity to study wheat variety identification at a district school to be held March 9 in the Hilton Hotel at Plainview. Chairman of the school will be M. W. Ayres. The school will start promptly at 9:30 a. m. and close at 4:00 p. m.

Ten of these district schools are scheduled in wheat territory of Texas and New Mexico under the direction of the Texas-Oklahoma Wheat Improvement Program according to Keats E. Soder, Director. "We had so much interest and such good attendance at our variety schools last year we're offering them again," explains Soder. At the close of each school we give a test and award "Certificates of Merit" to the graduates. Last year we gave out over 400 certificates, advises Soder.

Program for the one-day school includes study of the principal variety groups under the direction of Fred Dines, the national variety authority employed by Tex-O-Kan Flour Mills at Amarillo; a review of individual variety samples by Keats Soder; a discussion of field characteristics, yields, test weights, and disease resistance, by a representative of Texas A. & M. College Experiment Station; plus an open forum discussion of methods of wheat handling and storage at country points needed to collect the premium prices now being offered by terminals and mills. Two 2-day schools are scheduled for Fort Worth and Amarillo, the first day will be the same as the other district school's while the second day will be advanced training for experts.

The School will be open to all who wish to attend but is designed to help local grain buyers prepare for the day our extensive wheat exports stop and the buyers in some areas will be forced to offer two prices for wheat at country points, concludes Soder.

Critical Shortage Of Teachers Expected

AUSTIN, Texas.—Schoolhouses in 1953 may be bulging with students but lacking in teachers, a survey of elementary teaching positions in Texas by a University of Texas graduate student indicates.

Hollis A. Moore, Jr., who is assistant to Dean L. D. Haske of the College of Education, found there will be a shortage of more than 20,000 teachers by 1953.

He drew his figures from the Bureau of Vital Statistics and elementary enrollment data in the State Department of Education.

His survey showed Texas schools will require 29,844 new elementary teachers in the five-year period, 1949-50 through 1953-54, to replace experienced teachers who leave the classroom, and to provide additional teachers for each 30 pupils due to increased enrollment. Less than 2,000 elementary teaching certificates of all kinds were issued in 1947-48 and if this production rate continues, the shortage is inevitable, he emphasized.

Tech Plans 10-Year Expansion Program

LUBBOCK—A 10 year master expansion and improvement plan for Texas Technological college to cost approximately \$4,000,000 has been adopted by the board of directors. Specific details for beginning several projects this spring are under consideration.

First attention will be given to the expansion of the buildings of the college divisions, board members decided in their regular February session.

Some \$1,960,000 has been designated from the college's unappropriated funds to begin the initial portion of the expansion and improvement program. A report by the board's building committee, headed by Chancellor E. Weymouth of Amarillo, on priority of construction and definite allocations of funds is expected at the April 11 board of directors meeting in Austin.

Included in the board's allocations was approximately \$500,000 for the addition of two three-story wings to the Administration building. Other

definite decisions included \$100,000 for emergency improvements, such as construction of sidewalks, landscaping and paving dirt parking lots, and \$60,000 for improvements in the water system.

Board members officially adopted

a policy of uniformity in the purchase of uniforms for the staff. The first uniforms will be worn by the staff on July 25, 1949.

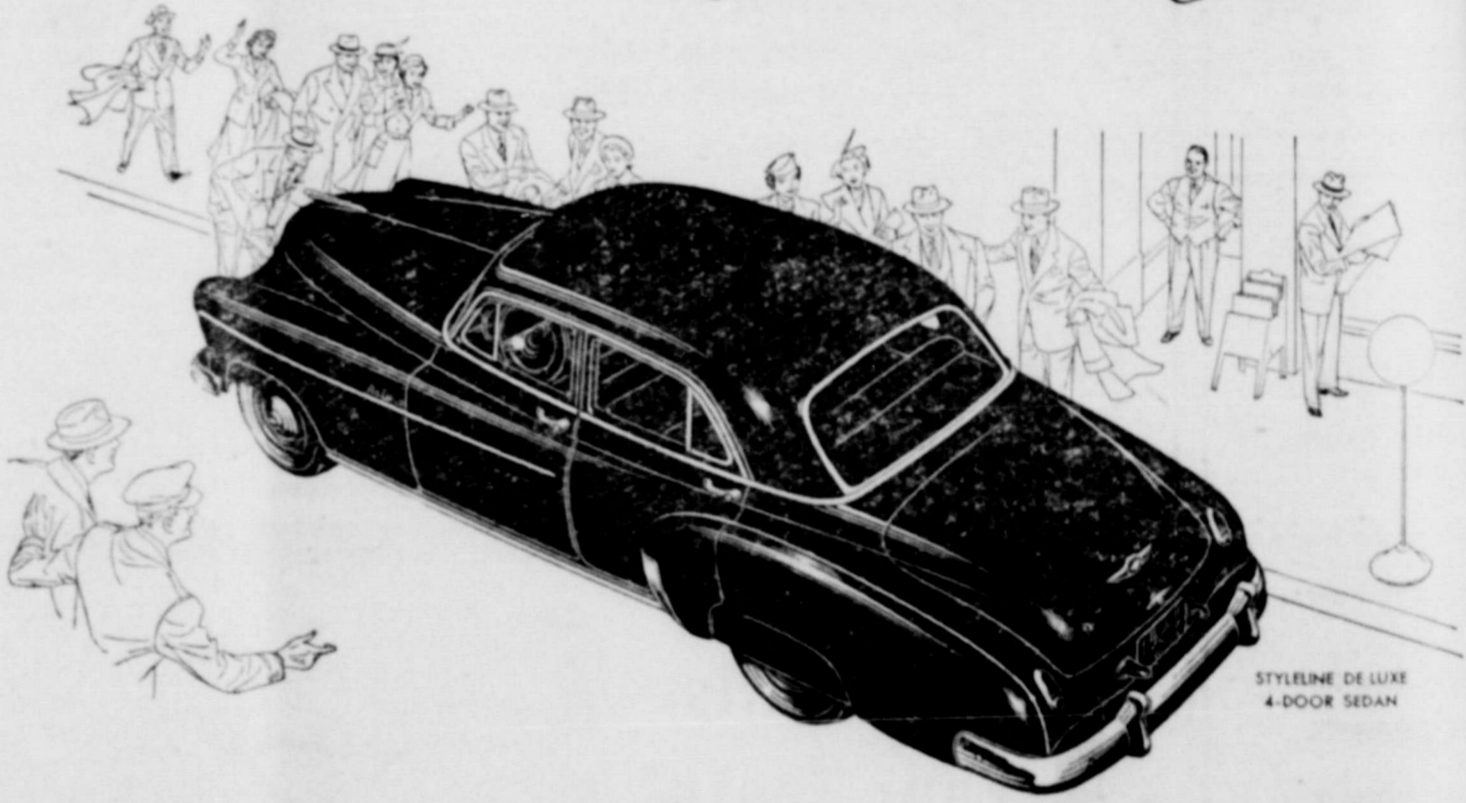

AFTER ALL the hullabaloo, back and forth, a number of non-combatants are wondering just what Joe Louis plans to do about his title and his return to action.

Here are some of the angles they are discussing here on the West coast:

1. LOUIS has no intention of returning to the prize fight ring. He is using this talk to help his exhibition trip where he has been knocking over from \$10,000 to \$15,000 for each show. This is the easiest money anyone can make, using 14 and 16-ounce gloves.

2. LOUIS has no one to fight except Granland Rice Ezzard Charles who doesn't want to fight Louis. Besides the 175-pound Charles would make Louis look like an elephant chasing a rabbit or a whipper. It wouldn't be a contest. It wouldn't draw \$300,000.

3. HERE IS the situation as it is today—Louis is through and there is no challenger to meet him. The heavyweight division today is at its lowest ebb in ring history.

4. (MINORITY OPINION) Louis is a professional fighter. That's his trade. Why shouldn't he pick up from \$200,000 to \$300,000 meeting some pushover?

These are a few of the angles I've gathered recently, from such boxing men as Jack Dempsey and Abe Roth, the referee, on down the line.

Louis is in a spot where he can get no credit for beating any of the heavyweights now gumming up the scenery. On the other hand, to be beaten by one of these alleged prize fighters would leave a large blot on his so-called escutcheon. The theme song with thousands is: "It isn't what you used to be—it's what you are today."

Any outsider advising Louis what to do is wasting his time. Louis will either do what he wants or what Mike Jacobs wants. Louis hates to pass up what looks to be the softest touch any champion ever faced. Mike can always use more money, no matter how much he has stuffed away through the years.

As things look now, the Bomber probably would be the slowest-moving champion that ever defended a heavyweight title if he went to post again in June.

Jim Jeffries

The old boy with the scythe can travel in a hurry. It hardly seems possible that 50 years have passed since young Jim Jeffries knocked out Bob Fitzsimmons.

This was Big Jim's 11th fight. He had been Jim Corbett's sparring partner before Corbett's fight with Fitzsimmons at Carson City. And there are still vague rumors that Jeffries gave Corbett a heavy beating before Jim lost to Fitz, via the famous solar plexus route.

Sullivan, Corbett, Fitz and Jack Johnson have put on their traveler's cloaks and moved on beyond. But Big Jim is still here with us, hale and a trifle hearty after a bad paralysis jolt a year or two ago.

Fifty years after he knocked out Fitzsimmons, Jeffries, now in his 70's, is as bald as two doorknobs, but still a powerful looking citizen.

When I first met Jeffries, back around 1902 or 1903, he could high jump six feet and run the 100 in about 10 seconds flat. He then weighed 212 pounds and he was as light on his feet as a featherweight. "In some way," Jim Corbett told me later, "Jeff has become a better boxer than I ever was. And nobody can ever hurt him, not even with an axe."

Fitz broke almost every bone in both hands slugging Jeff in their second fight, without even jarring him. "I might as well have slugged a bloody hydrant," Fitz told friends after the fight.

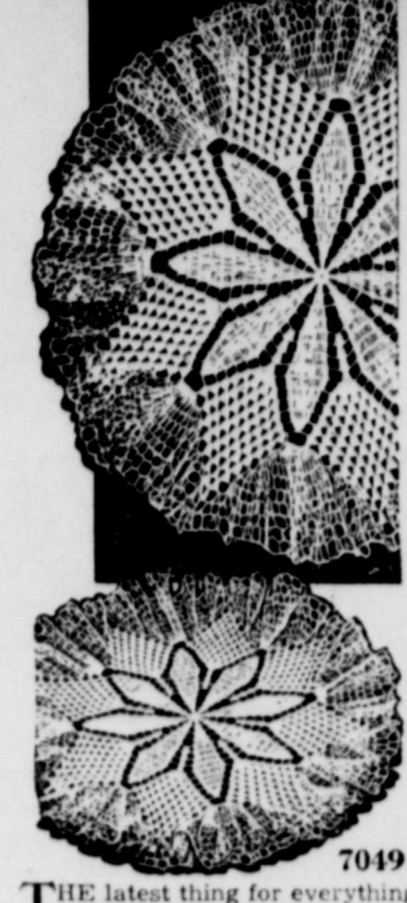
Jim Jeffries, around 1902 and 1903, was as great a fighter as the game has ever known. He could hit you and hurt you—and no one could hurt him.

I saw him in 1910 training for the coming Jack Johnson party. He weighed over 270 and he was bald, fat and slow. He had been out of action for seven or eight years. The Jeffries of 1902 or 1903 would have murdered Johnson. The Jeffries of 1910 was a pushover for anyone who could breathe and move around.

They still talk about Dempsey and Louis. I often wonder how either would have looked against the Jeffries that used to be. You wonder what shape their fists would have been in after a few rounds.

There has been a long gap since the days Jim Jeffries was so good he had to retire. It was a joke to mention anyone having a ghost of a chance against him. He dominated his field more than Dempsey ever did—more than Joe Louis ever did.
