

Stars in Your Eyes

Duse played her most dramatic role in real life. In the twilight of her career the great Italian star was ill and financially hard-pressed . . . During the initial World War

she donated her savings to aid wounded soldiers and refugees . . . Nevertheless, she rejected a pension offered by Mussolini's gov't and decided on another tour of the United States. Although her health was impaired, Duse's artistry still glowed. The swing around the nation was a financial success, but its rigors proved too much for her ebbing strength.

Before the tour was completed she passed away in Pittsburg.

Mrs. Fiske was a fanatic animal lover. The actress refused to include in her wardrobe any furs or feathers.

After a critic had pelted her play, Mrs. Fiske wrote to him: "It is well known that I love animals. That is why I am not writing anything nasty to you now!'

Sarah Bernhardt's most cherished tribute came from an unknown admirer. During Bernhardt's heyday there were many imitators of her acting style . . . A devotee of her art sent Bernhardt an unsigned missive reading: "I agree with Goethe who said there are many echoes but few voices."

Performing the same role night after night after night can be an ordeal that verges on drudgery. After her 900th performance in "Victoria Regina" Helen Hayes sighed: "I feel as though I were playing it under water!"

Edwin Booth's most difficult acting assignment was trying to satisfy a director who wanted him to walk on the stage "looking like he had just drunk a cup of tea!"

Nora Bayes concocted a unique method of squelching audience coughers. When the hacking and barking irked her she would suddenly fake a coughing fit on the stage.

Then Nora would remark to the audience with obvious sarcasm; "Please excuse my very rude behavior."

Edmund Kean was one of Britain's great troupers. He was playing leading Shakesperian roles when only years old . . . But one thoughtless act shattered his career in the USA. Kean refused to perform in a Boston theatre because it wasn't filled. This incident incited a public uproar that forced Kean to scoot back to England. Theatergoers never forgot the insult. When he returned here several years later-there were riots where Kean appeared. Not even a publie apology could soothe the aroused Yankee Doodlers.

Maurice Barrymore's wily tip: "An actor's success is often as temporary as the sound of applause. Broadway is the longest street with the shortest memory."

One of the acting profession's strange quirks is that anecdotes about sparklers are remembered long after their most thrilling performances are forgotten. Theatrical historians have devoted more space to Mrs. Patrick Campbell's rapier retorts than her greasepaint skill . . . A thespian once accused her of quietly laughing at him on the stage while he was performing in a serious episode.

Mrs. Campbell intoned: "I never laugh at you on the stage. I always wait till I get home!"

Richard Mansfield never squawked when he was the target of a critic's barb. "Let them write what they want about me," he said. "I will continue to act against them."





Engineers Report Shows Water Level Decline 5-10 Feet

The annual report of the Texas Board of Water Engineers on the geology and ground water of the irrigated section of the high plains of Texas has been received by The

The report, as usual, paints a rather lack picture of the water situation in this area. It shows a water level decline in Western Floyd County of from 5 to 10 feet during the past year. In other areas the water level has declined from nothing to seven feet, the report shows.

Much of Hale County water level eas declined 3 to 5 feet as has the reas around Lubbock, Ralls, and

The report shows that the water evel has declined from five feet to round 45 feet during the time 1914 to 1949 over the high plains. The average in Western Floyd County is given

The average number of wells per quare mile has risen to 31/2 in this

The report predicts that the rate of decline in water-level will decrease somewhat as the lowering continues on the brighter side but doe, predict that some areas will be seriously af fected within five to 10 years if present pumping rate is continued.




