If not, you can expect him to do so any day now. 4-H'ers are making an all-out attempt to reduce the annual cost of accidents affecting farm folksincluding motor vehicle, fire and property damage - which totals more than one billion dollars, or about \$35.00 per person! They are also trying to cut down the number of accidental deaths, which kill 51 farm residents in the U.S. every day in the year. Your 4-H'er doubtless will can

In fact, more fatal automobile accidents occur in rural areas than in any other location. Falls rank second in farm accident causes. 


FIXING UP the HOME By Diane Greeter

How to Make Simple Drapes

IF you, like many other home makers, have replaced the double beds in your household with twin beds, you may have on hand a few of the doublesize bed sheets. Don't discard them; they can solve your window drapery problems in bedrooms or dining nooks. Torn sheets can also be used.

Bed sheets can be converted into extremely effective window draperies—with little effort and almost no expense. Simply cut the sheets in two, lengthwise. Hem the raw



edges, then tint them whatever color you have chosen for your decorative scheme. Soft pastel colors are best. The deep hem at the top and bottom of every sheet makes a perfectly satisfactory sleeve for the drapery crane or rod, and good wash tints are obtainable for a few cents.

Thus, in a few minutes you can transform an unwanted article into draperies of the type modern decorators most often suggest for bedroom window treatment.

Having Fun Rewards 4-Hers In National Recreation Program

Among the events designed for club groups are indoor and outdoor games; dances, festivals, tours and plays. For members there are numerous types of recreation such as leather, metal or wood craft; stage and set designing; sports and hobbies; singing or dancing leader, and serving as a committee member.

The following counties won the \$25 cash award in the 1948 recreational and rural arts activity; Bastrop, Bexar, Castro, Dallas, Frio, Guadalupe, Somervell, Nacogdoches, Calhoun, Atascosa, Tom Green, Parker, Terry, and Cooke. Gene Massey, Jr., of Moore, was named outstanding

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
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
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
