Area Soil Meet At Floydada Next Wednesday

On Wednesday, August 24, at 10 a. m. there will be a meeting, in the County Court room of the Court house at Floydada, of seventeen Soil Conservation Districts from this immediate area. The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the recent \$5 million appropriation for the use of the one hundred and sixty soil conservation districts in Texas. Mr. V. C. Marshall, executive director of the State Soil Conservation Board will be here to explain what each district can do with the funds that will be available to them.

All interested farmers, ranchers and business men are invited to attend. The money will be used in assisting landowners in applying conservation practices. Around fifty soil conservation district supervisors are expected to attend the meeting.

MEETING HERE MONDAY NIGHT TO DISCUSS COUNTY BOND ISSUE

A mass meeting will be held at the City Auditorium in Lockney Monday night to discuss the proposed \$200,000 courthouse bond issue which is to be voted on September 3. It was announced this week. Time is 7:30.

A meeting will be held at Floydada tonight (Friday) for the same purpose.

The Court has issued the order for the election on the bond issue to be held September 3. The amount of \$200,000 is deemed necessary to supplement the \$104,000 insurance money now on hand to build the courthouse back in an acceptable manner. The plan is to make a 35 foot addition on both the north and the south ends of the old building, make all necessary repairs to the building, make alterations in the interior to make the building more modern and convenient, install a modern heating and cooling plant and purchase the necessary equipment to replace that which was destroyed.

The architect has estimated the cost of this plan at around \$300,000. However Judge G. C. Tubbs said Thursday that, by keeping the same brick now on the old building instead of re-

placing them as the architect had suggested, he believed that the county could save perhaps \$20,000.00.

At the meeting here the plans will be discussed, the architect's drawing will be shown and the Court's plans will be explained thoroughly. It is hoped that a large attendance from this part of the county will be present.

Judge Tubbs said that bonds, spread over a 25 year period, would require 12c per \$100 valuation at the county's present total valuation of \$11,000.00. However he pointed out that property valuation in the county had been increasing in the past few years and that if that trend continued and the valuation increased then the rate could be decreased.

Haynes & Kirby of Lubbock are architects for the building. The voting precinct lines have not been changed and voters will vote in the same precinct they did last year, Judge Tubbs said.

Local Scouts Win In Swim Meet

David Ray Visage of Boy Scout Troop No. 59, Lockney, won first place in the junior free style swimming race at the South Plains Council swim meet at Lubbock, Tuesday night. Jimmy Williams also entered the meet in the side stroke and breast stroke but did not place.

In the Blanco district Boy Scout swim meet at Floydada Thursday night, the local troop divided honors with Troop 64 and Troop 57 of Floydada.

Floydada's troop 64 captured six first, six seconds, two thirds and two fourths to top contenders in the junior tourney. Lockney garnered four firsts, seven seconds, two thirds and a fourth to win in the intermediate division and Floydada troop 57 walked away with the senior competition with nine firsts, seven seconds, four thirds and four fourths.

Individual stand-outs of the Thursday meet included George Chapman, who won five first places in the junior division; Dorsey Baker, who placed in all intermediate events, including two first and four seconds; Jimmie Williams, who placed in all but one of the intermediate division events, including two firsts and two seconds; and Dan Hagood, who placed in all senior division events, including four first places.

Lockney was runner-up in the junior division, composed of boys not older than 12 years of age, with a first, a second and five third places. Crosbyton garnered two fourth place spots. Floydada Troop 64 was runner-up in the intermediate division with three firsts, two thirds and two fourths. Crosbyton got two seconds, two thirds, and three fourths in the senior division.

City Valuations Now Slightly Less Than Million Dollars

Valuation of property within the City of Lockney now totals a little less than one million dollars, City officials said Thursday. The equalization board met recently and raised most property valuations.

Purpose of the raise as explained by the officials was a long range plan to get out from under a judgment taken against the city in 1936 which requires that three-fourths of the city tax money go to pay off bonded indebtedness.

The equalization board met with citizens last Monday and Tuesday to discuss the matter. "We appreciate the attitude most people took on the matter of raising valuations," Mayor G. M. Brunner said. "We thank you for your willingness to go along with us in trying to bring progress to our city."

McPherson received a broken nose, bruised shoulder and was suffering from shock. His condition was improved this week.

Miss Carter, daughter of Mrs. Frank Jones of the Prairie Chapel community, lost six front teeth and received a bad cut on her lip. She was also improving this week.

Francis Jackson of Dimmit was driving one of the cars and was charged with murder without malice after the death of Melton. Jackson's car plunged across the road and in front of the car driven by Melton in which the Lockney people were riding. He was driving the car while intoxicated, the complaint stated.

THREAT OF COTTON BOLLWORMS FOUND, AGENT REPORTS

Agent, Ass't Harry Morckel, Carpenter, District Entomologist of the cotton county last Monday reported that he had found injurious cotton bollworms in various fields in various counties were checked for far advanced stages of the pest. Some great damage to the balance of the crop was feared. Some lice were found on the leaves of the cotton plants. The bollworm is now present in small numbers in all fields and a serious outbreak could come at any time. Early detection of these worms in damaging numbers, which means a few small worms and eggs, and the use of ten percent DDT or twenty percent taxaphene dust at the rate of ten to fifteen pounds per acre will control them. The adult worm, or one an inch long, is very difficult to kill so efforts should be made to get them when they are small. There is no possible invasion of leaf-worms for the next month or six weeks, Gibson

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
NO. 19**

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the

limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Sec. 2 The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3 The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Con-

stitution and laws of this State. Washington, D. C., is often called The City of Magnificent Distances.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32

proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice for such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases." Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the

necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary.

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Parents Urged To Watch For Decay In Child's Teeth

AUSTIN, TEXAS.—Tooth decay or dental caries is a destructive, progressive disease of the teeth. A large part of a tooth may be destroyed by decay with little evidence on the surface, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Surveys of large groups of preschool children reveal that 30% of them have decayed teeth at three years of age, 75% at four years of age, and 90% at five years of age. Six out of ten children age 4 and 5 have as many as seven or more cavities.

Decay begins most frequently in the small pits and fissures on the chewing surfaces and at the points of contact between the teeth. Pits and fissures with structural flaws should be filled at once to prevent decay.

Dr. Cox said, "Dental examination and care should begin with the three year old child, and periodic examinations and necessary care should follow, thereafter, as often as the dentist advises. The first or baby teeth should be kept in a healthy condition until it is time for them

to be lost. "X-rays aid the dentist in finding cavities, especially those between the teeth. Many of these beginning cavities are located in areas where they cannot be found in any other way. X-ray pictures are also useful in finding other conditions that require immediate attention such as abscesses, impacted teeth, broken roots, bone destruction due to pyorrhea, extra teeth; and other information that is important in treatment of the case.

"With periodic dental examination and adequate dental care for each child, beginning at three year of age, the great majority of the children will reach adulthood with good dental health."

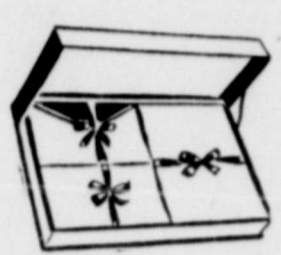

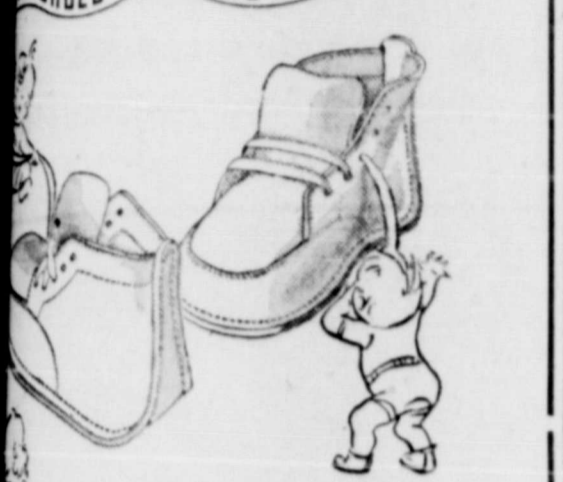

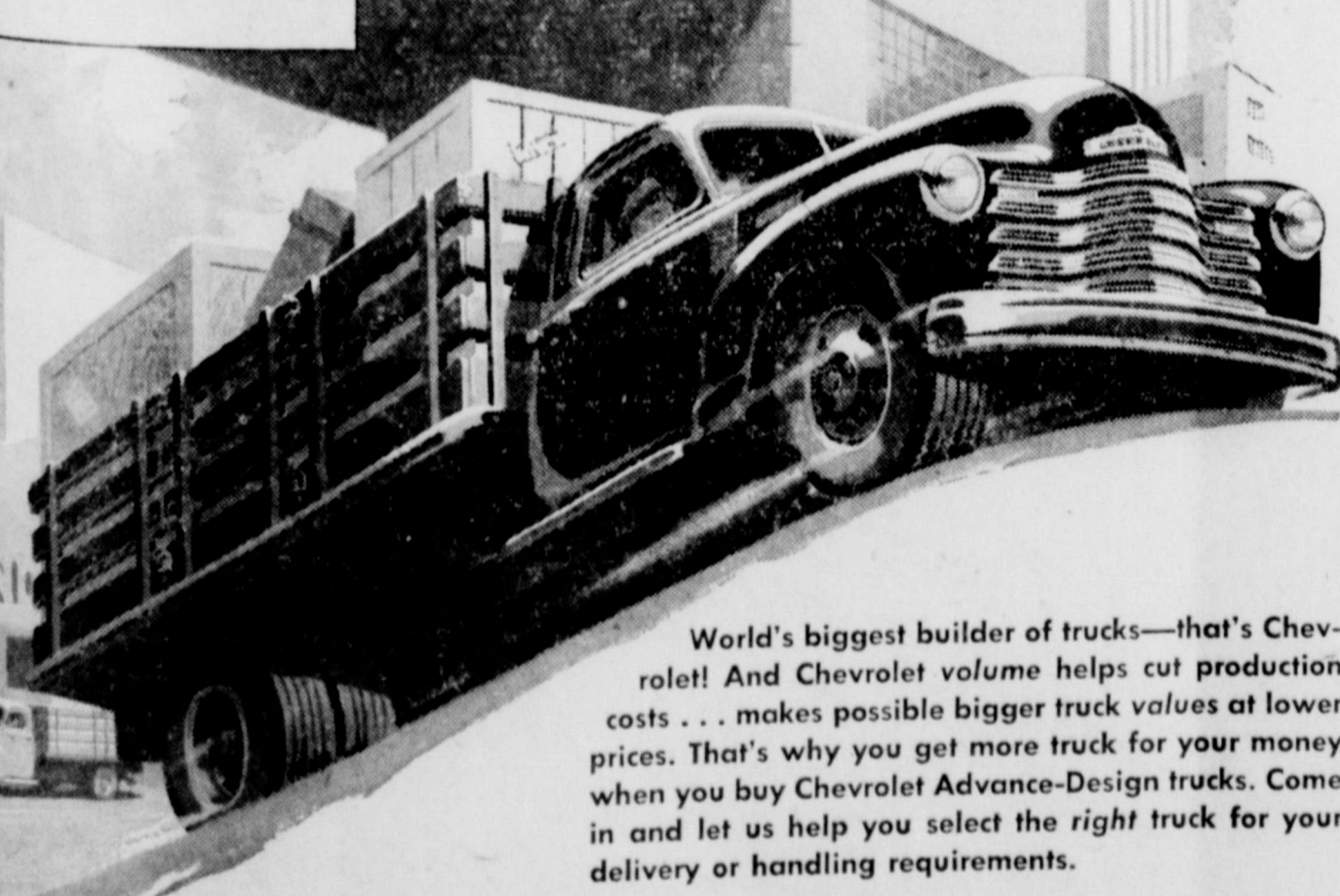

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be Numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of the State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary; and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees,"

the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

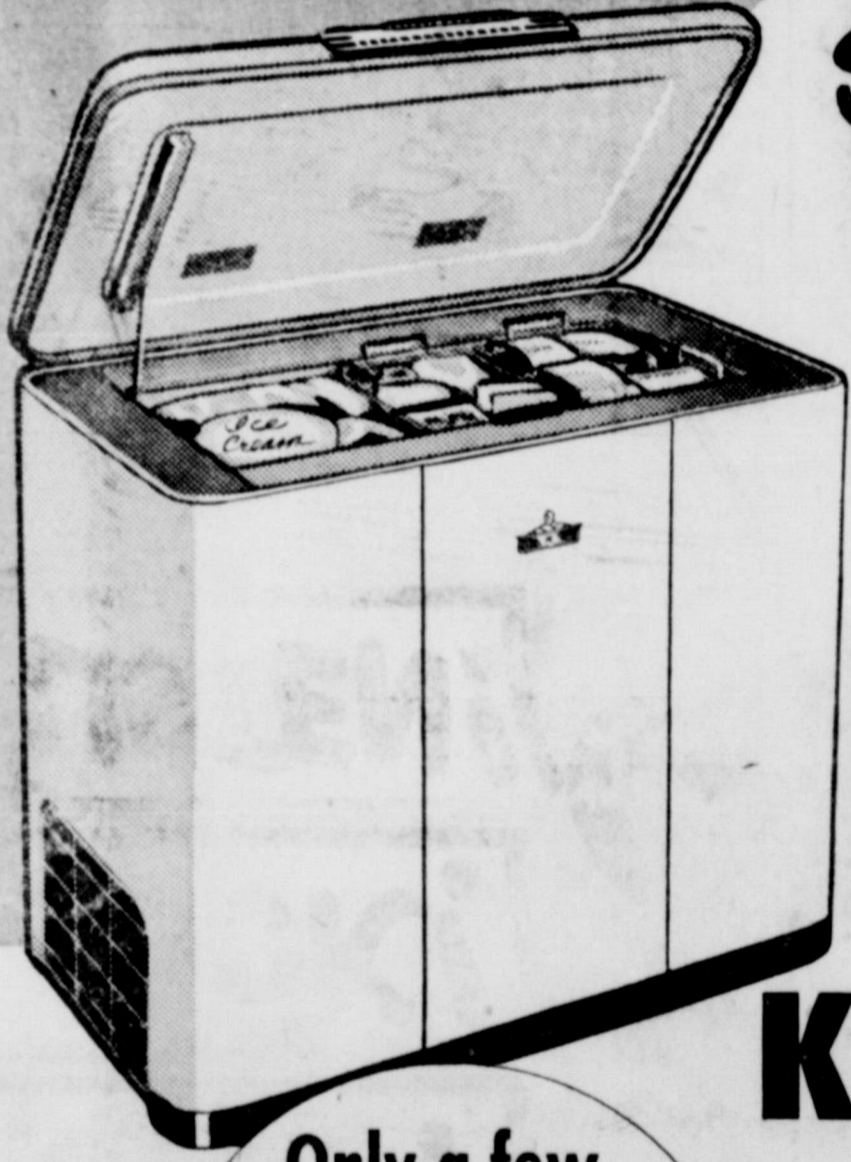
