

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote

of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE
LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

the constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be Known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. ture is authorized to provide for creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service this Section shall apply to ap-pointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the pro-visions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting

machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:
"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil So islature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and "AGAINST The Constitutional

Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one

The cut throat competition for the service of hoe hands during the summer is likely to prevail during the cotton harvest unless farmers cooperate toward maintaining a reasonable price level for cotton pulling.

Failure to maintain a reason able cotton-pulling price this , harvest will prove highly expensive to the farmers of this area reason during the hoeing season.

It doesn't take much of a disturbance for prices to get completely out of hand. One farmer can break the customary price and others will follow, leaving in their wake confusion, misunderstanding and loss of faith among farmers without accomplishing anything.


