



Now Is Time To

COLLEGE STATION - Most farms could use the services of the "Pied Piper" for a few minutes at least but since this is hardly possible, you had better make plans to collect a few rat scalps on your own. The best time to get rid of the rats is before the barns and bins are filled with this year's grain crops, says James E. Poore, mammal control supervisor of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.


He says that clean-up work removes hiding places and tends to concentrate scattered rat populations so that they can be poisoned easier. Pile posts and lumber on supports at least two feet above ground. Scrap lumber not worth saving and other junk should be destroyed or removed from the premises. Stack bottoms, other feed waste and manure piles should be scattered in the field so they will not give rats a good hiding place. Tall weeds also make fine rat hideouts if left standing, says Poore. Clean up, poison and then ratproof farm buildings is Poore's advice. Farm buildings in a good state of repair aren't likely to be infested with rats. Check

to see that walls are tight, and foundations and floors are in good shape. A strip of galvanized metal,

three feet high, placed around the building will keep the rats out, says Poore, provided they can't get in through the floor. If you are building a new granary, set it on piers at least two feet above the ground, and then construct it so rats can't get in. The greatest damage from rats is not the grain they eat but the amount they waste. Both losses can be prevented by getting rid of the rats and rat-proofing all farm buildings, says Poore.

#### **Cancer Ranks 2nd** As Cause of Death

AUSTIN, TEXAS-Dr. Geo. W Cox, State Health Officer, in speaking of cancer, said that it ranked second as cause of death in Texas, being exceeded only by heart disease. Last year approximately 6900 Texans died of this disease. One of the reasons so many people die of cancer is because the disease usually exists some time before it is recognized. By then it has progressed from a small local cancer to a large and dangerous one.

In the beginning cancer is not painful so many persons do not consult a doctor. Any lump, especially in the breast, should be looked upon with suspicion. Other suspicious symptoms are any sore that does not heal about the tongue, mouth or lips; sores caused by broken teeth or ill ing or discharge from any opening of the body is a danger signal. Persistent indigestion with loss of weight is a symptom of cancer of the stomach. With any of these signs one should go .immediately to a doctor Many times the suspicion of cancer will have been unfounded but it much better to be safe. It is desirable to treat all diseases in their early stages, but in no case is it more important than cancer. Periodic examinations made with cancer in mind affords the best protection against this disease. Surgery, x-ray and radium are the main weapons which are used to combat cancer.


