





The new Almanac-672 pagesis the largest ever published. It contains more than 650,000 words and word-equivalents in statistics, scores of maps and illustra-

Texas' population is predomnantly urban, for the first time in history. The net value of manufactured products has more than quadrupled since the pre war period. The number of infustrial wage earners has doubed, the Almanac reports.

With farm population down, agricultural production is up. Mechanization may be the answer, for the number of tractors in the state jumped from 98,923 in 1940 to 236,390 this year.

HOUSTON - There are two "weak links' 'in our chain of only the salt. cancer control in Texas, Dr. E. W. Bertner of Houston, Chairman of American Cancer Society, Texas stories high. Division, told a group of Texas cancer control volunteers recent-

"These 'weak links' are our two major needs," he continued. "They are our missing cancer control facilities in this state." Listing the first weakness, Dr.

Bertner said, "We must find some way of telling the public the truth about this disease, what they should look for, what to expect, and what to do when they find it. Some way must be found to let people know that cancer is curable in many cases, but that speed is of the utmost importance, and that the responsibility for delay usually must be laid at the door of the patient himself, since the doctor must wait until the patient seeks help. No doctor can compel a patient to consult him; the most skilled physician is helpless until the patient presents himself for

"The second missing facility is some way to take care of people who are recovering from active cancer treatment or for whom effective treament is no longer possible," the Cancer Society Leader added, "The care of those chronically sick either from advanced cancer or from any other long-drawn-out expensive illness is a social problem of great magnitude and one which will continue to grow in importance as we continue our present trend toward smaller families in smaller dwelling places and as the population continues to average a longer life with more and more people getting into the age when cancer and other infirmities spoken of as 'the degenerative diseases' become more prevelent.







In America on Christmas Eve. there is a merry tinkle of sleigh bells as Santa Claus drives up in a sleigh drawn by eight reindeer.

He drives from roof to roof, pausing just long enough to climb down each chimney. From a huge pack on his back he fills the children's stockings with toys and goodies. Gifts that are too large to be stuffed in the stockings are put on the Christmas tree or stacked underneath it.

This is Christmas in America -but it is not always Santa who brings the gifts to children in other lands.

The Dutch children anxiously await the arrival on Christmas of St. Nicholas. He was the bishop of Myra, so he is dressed in the traditional bishop's robes of black, wears a mitre, and carries a crozier.

He rides a white horse and is accompanied by Black Peter, his page boy. Instead of hanging up their stockings to hold the gifts, the Dutch children place their wooden shoes in the chimney corner before going to bed. On the window sills they leave a bunch of hay for "Sleipner," the bishop's white horse. Spanish children place their straw-filled sleeves on the window sills so the Magi may feed their horses while they leave gifts. The older people fill an Urn of Fate from which the gifts are drawn on Christmas Day.



### **Agent Urges** Fight on Rats

The rat population on the farms in Floyld County has rapidly increased during the past summer, states Robert H. Gibson, County Agent. Every farm in Floyd County is infested with a few rats to extreme numbers depending upon the location and food supply. A concentrated effort should be made by every one to destroy these rats, he said. One of the best methods of con-

trol is by poisoning the water the rats drink. Those farms where water can be poisoned without danger to humans and livestock should be poisoned this way. Use any poison that is rec-Mrs. George T. #### "Retun Home Safe" Miller Urges

AUSTIN-"Return home safely every time."

This was the plea to motorists today by Chas. A. Miller, President of the Texas Safety Association, speaking in behalf of the Texas Department of Public Safety's December program of traffic safety education.

"Last December," Mr. Miller said, "nearly 2,000 motorists did not return home safely, according to National Safety Council figures. This was the number of motorists killed in that one month alone. Approximately 70,-000 were injured in traffic acci-

The Texas Department of Pubic Safety pointed out that probably no other month of the year has the abundance of special winter driving hazards that December has. One of the biggest factors in December's out-of-proportion traffic accident toll is the length of the nights and the shortness of the days. This means greater exposure on the part of pedestrians as well as motorists to the dangers of nighttime accidents.

"In addition to this," Mr. Miller said, "December weather, with its snow, ice, sleet, and rain, not driver's visibility but lessens the national figures. Rain, fog. or Christmas in Scandanavian snow, was also present in one


