believe that most people agree that the Co-operative hospital here is an asset to the community. First it is a place for the relief of suffering and treatment of injury at home, much more to be desired than a place away from home for most of us. That the hospital has done a good deal in this belief that all of us will admit. It is best equipped small hospital on the plains to our knowledge.

The hospital is a benefit to the community from a commercial point. Most of us would not have a factory with a 16 man staff here, yet we have just such a hospital. Every citizen in this city has felt the benefit from the hospital from a monetary standpoint. The hospital has, up to this point, paid all its current operating expenses when due and not owe any money at this time. Its credit is excellent with all with whom it does business. It has paid off about 80% of its building indebtedness and now owes less building indebtedness than any hospital of this type in the area which has been established within the past few years.

The hospital has installed a x-ray machine which is its equipment to top. It is one of the few state-licensed laboratories in small towns in this area. Despite these factors there are people here who would like to see the hospital in any way. They circulate rumors and gossip which is without foundation in fact, repeat them over and over again, and are working on Joseph's theory that any lie, regardless of how big it is, will be believed by some people if they tell it often enough.

Others fail to pay the hospital for charges for treatment when they are able to do so, thereby throwing a hardship on those who do pay. Some even boast about their ability to avoid payment of their debts there.

If we are to have a hospital here and have the kind of hospital we want, the hospital must have the support and cooperation of everyone in this community. Problems facing the hospital at this time include these:

- Securing and keeping of a capable, efficient help.
- Retiring of building indebtedness.
- Collection of charges from those who have received treatment.

Some people do make every effort to pay their debt to the hospital and even then are unable to pay all. That person should be commended for their effort. But others shirk their duty.

Every person who is interested in the hospital should attend the meeting at the auditorium next Tuesday night. We hope that a large crowd is present.

Boy Scouts Will Act As Traffic Patrolmen Sat.

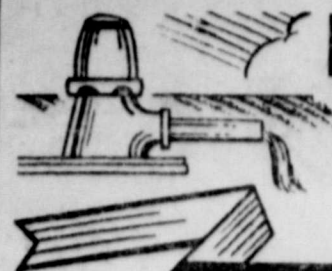

However, motorists are urged to cooperate with the boys who are on duty. Motorists will not be stopped except for good reason and there will be no "horse-play," Mr. Barker said.

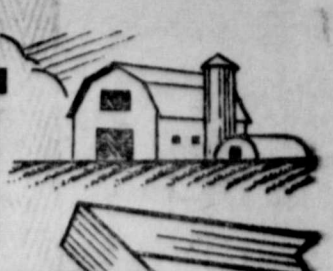

JUNE 16 IS TENTATIVE CUT-OVER DATE ON NEW DIAL SYSTEM

J. A. Cornell, district manager of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., announced this week that the schedule of installation of a new dial telephone system in Lockney called for a tentative date for the cut-over to the new dial system to be made on June 16, 1951.

Plans and specifications for the new telephone building to be constructed here were sent to prospective bidders on November 1, Mr. Cornell said. Four or five of these were sent to Lockney building contractors who might want to bid on the new building, he said.

The bids are due in by November 22 and the company expects to let the contract about December 1. The new building will be approximately 24 by 25 feet, brick veneer and will be constructed on the lot just west of the present telephone exchange building. The company purchased this lot several weeks ago.

An order has already been placed for the special dial equipment, Mr. Cornell said. The equipment is scheduled to be shipped by March 17, 1951. The building is to be completed by April 1 and the installation of the equipment is to start May 9.

However, local maintenance men will start the installation of dial telephones here soon after the first of the year. This is necessary because the installation of the telephones is a long, drawn-out process and must be completed by the cut-over date, June 16.

The company was serving 727 subscribers out of the local exchange at the close of September, Mr. Cornell said, and a number have been added since then.

The dial equipment will all be installed and completed and all dial telephones will be installed along side of the present telephones before June 16. At or about that date, late at night, the switch-over will be made and then the old telephones will be removed at a later date.

In Meeting Here
Mr. Cornell with A. O. Thomas, Amarillo manager, met with a group of local business men here recently to discuss the switch-over. Some local men were opposing the move since it would relieve all local operators of their jobs and the city would lose a big part of the present payroll of the company.

Mr. Thomas explained that it was impossible to continue to use the present type switch board since this board was made to be used by not more than two operators or two positions. At present there are four positions on the board and under these conditions the operators cannot possibly give patrons good service, Mr. Thomas said. He said that the flash-signal type board would not be installed here because it would be completely out-moded within a few years.

He further stated that he believed that positions could be worked out for most of the local operators who wanted to work in the Plainview exchange and they would be allowed to drive from Lockney if they so desired. Maintenance men will be stationed here, as they are now, to take care of the equipment and repair jobs.

Dr. Wester Called For Physical Exam

Selective Service Board No. 45 issued a call this week to one doctor and two dentists, to take physical examinations, one of them a Floyd County man. He is Dr. James D. Wester of Floydada, a dentist.

The others are Dr. Chester Cook of the Plainview Hospital and Dr. C. M. Baldwin of Plainview, a dentist.

They are to report at Amarillo Nov. 20 for their physical examinations, draft board officials said.

900 Votes Cast In Election Tues.

Floyd County cast approximately 900 votes in the general election Tuesday, according to a report from the office of County Judge G. C. Tubbs Wednesday afternoon. This was about 30% of the county's voting strength.

There were no races close enough to call contests on the ballot in this county. The governor's race polled more votes than were cast for any other office, a total of 892. Totals in the various races were not available since one box, Goodnight, had not been brought in, Judge Tubbs said.

More Republican votes were cast than had been cast in this county in many years, the Judge said. Fifty-seven Republican voters cast their ballots in this election.

Write-ins were numerous although not heavy in any race. Judge Tubbs received 25 votes written in for county judge. W. E. Grimes received two votes for the same office. Earl Cooper received two votes for sheriff and Joe Parrish received one vote for governor.

East Lockney cast 70 votes while 107 votes were cast in West Lockney. Totals in the West Lockney box were not available but those in East Lockney showed that most Democratic candidates received 63 votes while their Republican opponent received five.

Walter Rogers, Democratic candidate, defeated the Republican incumbent, Ben Guill for the post of Congressman of the 18th District by about 2,000 votes out of 45,000 reports Wednesday said. This race drew more interest than any other in this area.

Nationally the Republicans were reported to have gained some seats in Congress but not enough to control either house.

Freeze Sets Up Last Stage Of Crop Harvest

The last stage of harvesting crops in this area will begin soon due to the freeze last Thursday night. Some late feed is already ready for harvest, elevator report and a week more should just about complete the cutting of grain sorghums.

The thermometer hit 20 degrees above at Lubbock but it was not believed to have been that low here. However there was some ice. Weather warmed up again by Sunday but another cold wave was scheduled to strike this area Wednesday night of this week.

Cotton harvesting was gaining headway and harvest hands were more plentiful this week. In fact, demand for hands had slowed some with most farmers waiting for the green holes to dry out after the freeze before continuing their harvest.

Most farmers expect to hand pull their cotton one time over and then strip it, it was said.

The three Lockney gins had ginned approximately 1875 bales up to Wednesday afternoon. The Aiken gin had turned out 1180 bales and the two gins at Lone Star had turned out around 400 bales, according to a survey by The Beacon.

Longhorns Play Last Game Of Season Friday

The Longhorns will be playing their last game of the season—barring a miracle—Friday night on Mitchell-Zimmerman Field when they take on the rugged Paducah Dragons. Six boys will be playing their last game for Lockney High.

The Dragons are rated as the toughest team in the district and although they lost a game to Spur even Spur fans admit that the Dragons had the best team. So the Longhorns will be expecting a busy night Friday night and their attitude this week didn't indicate that they were discouraged.

The Paducah boys can pass the ball some as well as run with it. They completed five passes against Rails last week, two of them for touchdowns.

Especially dangerous on the Dragon team are Joe Clark and Pat Green in the backfield and Lee, a tall end. The Longhorns will have to be prepared to stop both a passing and a running team and Coaches Curtis Kelly and Elvin Lyons have been working the boys hard this week to achieve that goal.

Everyone is back in good shape now after an open date last week end, Kelly said Wednesday. He thought the boys were ready to go, both mentally and physically, and said, "If they beat us, they'll just beat us—that's all."

Huntin' AND Fishin'
By Harve Pennington
The duck season opened last week with a "bang." Most of the hunters reported good hunting and say they got their limit of duck. Not many geese in yet, some on Buffalo lake but no hunting there.
The conflicting reports on the disease—aspergillosis, a form of fungus or mold—came from Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the State Fish and Oyster Commission and the county health officer at Victoria. Dodgen said the disease was harmless and that every check and investigation had been made as a matter of precaution, and that there is no danger to the hunter even if he eats an infected goose provided it is cooked properly. But Dr. Roy Landers warned hunters to refrain from handling the fowls. He said the disease could invade the eyes, ears, nose and lungs. When the lungs are invaded, he said the results were fever and coughs. General health may not be impaired for some time, but the eventual outlook is bad, he declared. Further studies of the disease are being made at the U. S. Fish and Wild Life Laboratory at Denver, Colo. We haven't heard of any ducks being affected, only geese. The Texas bag limit is five ducks per day, possession limit ten. For geese it is five per day, possession limit is also five, except that not more than two may be Canadian Geese. That you better watch because the most of the geese that come here are Canadian geese.

Next time you go duck hunting take your hip boots or waders and go out in the lake as far as you can wade and you will see

that you get more ducks, or better still, get a boat or raft and anchor it out in the lake and if you have decoys so much the better. When ducks come into a lake they are high until they get near the center before they circle down and if you are there you get good shooting. They don't shy from you if you are in the water, but they sure watch the banks. Try it sometime, I did.

McElroy, executive secretary of the Ex-Student Association.

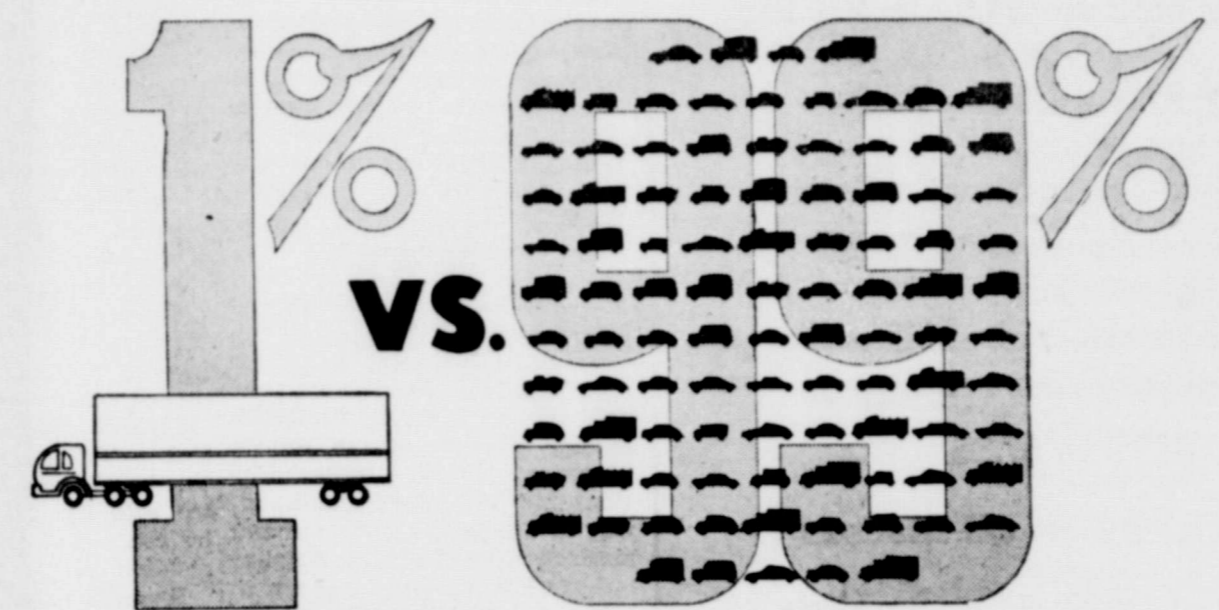
But the parade will be only one part of the Nov. 11 festivities at Tech.

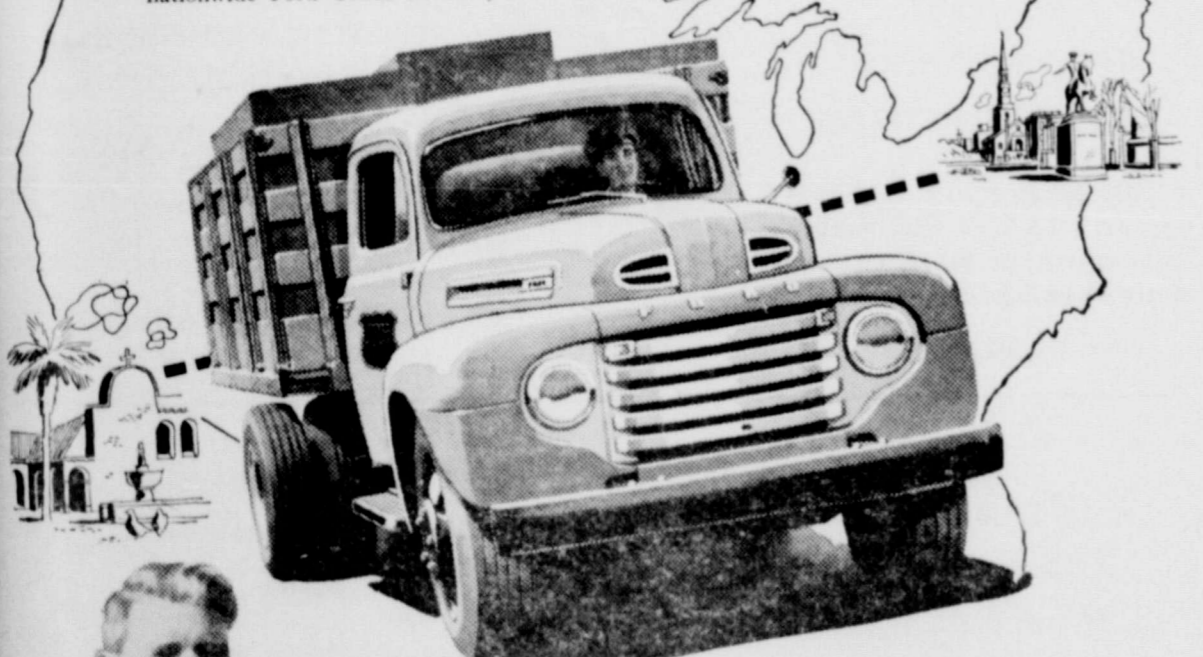
