### Oregon's Governor Salutes Champion Jersey



COLUMBUS, OHIO. - Opal Crystal Lady, a registered Jersey and Oregon's most famous cow, receives official congratulations from Governor Douglas McKay of Oregon upon completion of Lady's record breaking production stint. Holding Lady's halter is her young owner, Ralph E. Cope, Jr., of Langlois, while Ralph's mother, Mrs. Cope, beams approval. Governor McKay watched Lady finish her 365 day official test to set a national butterfat record over all breeds.

Lady is the only cow of any breed in this country to have made three successive yearly records of over one thousand pounds butterfat each on twice daily milking. This is a feat equivalent to a baseball player clouting sixty home runs a year for three successive years. During the year's test which has been verified by the home office of The American Jersey Cattle Club in Columbus, Lady produced 23,725 pounds of milk and 1,237 pounds of butterfat. This is more milk and more butterfat than any other Jersey in the country has ever produced in a single year, and more butterfat than any cow of any breed has ever produced on twice daily milking.

#### Several Points Must Be Considered In Farm Home Plans

College Station. - Since the farm or ranch house is only one part of the farmstead layout, Mrs. Bernice Clayton, home management specialist for the Texas A. & M. Extension Service, suggests planning the farm home from more than one standpoint.

Although the farmhouse is the center of interest, its location needs to be considered from the standpoint of its relationship to the rest of the buildings, the road, the source of water, and to the breezes in the summer and the cold winds in the winter.

As both a home for family living and a headquarters for operating the farm business, the farmstead needs to be planned with the object of providing the family with a pleasant and healthful place to live and making the farm work easier, more convenient, and safer.

Mrs. Claytor suggests locating the farmstead on a site somewhat higher than the road. A knoll or small hill is an excellent location because it allows quick surface drainage from around the house, barns, and the livestock pens.







#### Nitrogen For 5c Per Pound In Soil

College Station.-It is possible to put nitrogen into the soil for five cents per pound if it is done by turning under legume cover crops. M. K. Thornton, extension agricultural chemist of Texas A. & M. College, says this information is contained in a report he has received from one of the experiment stations in Virginia.

He says the report shows that corn yields rose to 104 bushels per acre on plots where crimson clover had been turned under for the purpose of adding nitrogen to the soil. The per acre yields on the plots where no legume was turned under, and on which no commercial nitrogen was applied, were only 50 bushels per

The application of 100 pounds of nitrogen, in commercial fertilizer, raised the per acre yield to 102 bushels but the nitrogen application by this method cost 17 cents per pound. He adds that tests conducted by the Texas when it's full grown can turn Experiment Station gave similar

The test plots in Virginia were not grazed. Thornton says if livestock is taken off the legume of a top field hand, and turn a plowing it under, that there will be no appreciable decrease in the amount of nitrogen added to the soil. The reduction, if any, will be more than offset by the feed produced and utilized as a grazing crop by livestock.

> In addition to adding nitrogen to the soil than can be used by the crop that follows the legume, Thornton says the addition of the organic matter to the soil is also very important. Organic matter increases the water holding capacity of the soil and is a big aid in checking erosion. It also aids in improving the tilth of


