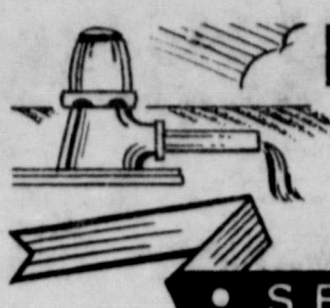

Proclamation
WHEREAS, it appears that the fate of this nation and its freedom loving people is endangered, and
WHEREAS, we have loved ones and friends who are even now fighting and dying on the fields of battle, and
WHEREAS, human wisdom and resources are inadequate to meet the needs of this nation, now therefore
BE IT RESOLVED, that I, G. M. Brunner, Mayor of the City of Lockney, do here and now proclaim and set aside the day of Monday, January 8, 1951, as a special day of prayer for the people of this town and community, and
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the time from 12 noon until 1 p. m. on said day be designated as the special time for prayer, and that every citizen be urged to pause sometime during this hour to utter a prayer for the nation's leaders, for the national welfare and for the men who are fighting in this country's battles, and
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that it be urged and suggested that the doors of all churches be open during this hour that people may come to pray.

Canyon Girls Here Friday; Floydada Tues.

The next week will be a busy time for the Lockney High School basketball teams with games being played both at home and away. Of outstanding interest probably will be the games Friday night between the Lockney girls and the Canyon girls on the local floor.

A large crowd is also expected to witness the first district game of the season next Tuesday night when the Floydada boys come to Lockney to play.

Tonight (Thursday) the local teams, boys A and B and the girls team will travel to Kress where they will return games played here before the holidays.

On Friday night there will be no boys games but the local girls and the Canyon girls will play two games, with both A and B teams in action.

The first district game here next Tuesday night will draw a lot of interest. The local teams were badly outclassed in playing Floydada last year but this year they think they have a better chance to defeat them.

On Tuesday night of this week, the three local teams played Silverton on the local courts and swept the series clean. The A boys team won 43 to 30 with Sid Thomas crumming in 20 points. The B team won 38 to 18 with Don Bartram making 21 of his team's points and in the girls game the locals won 30 to 23 with Velma Seale scoring 17 points for her team.

In the boys game, Eddie Fortenberry and Barry Thompson were outstanding in the backboard play while in the girls game Patsy Poteet showed up well in her guard position.

Fire Department Elects Officers

New officers of the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department were elected at a meeting of that organization last Thursday night.

Officers of the department now include Lowell Bilbrey, fire chief; Charley Cross, assistant chief; Audie V. Barnett, sergeant-at-arms; Bunt Jester, secretary.

The department was called out Monday afternoon of this week to fight a grass fire near the Lockney Cannery. The fire was extinguished without damage.

The department meets every other Thursday night, officials said.

Hospital Group Change Name In Annual Meeting

The membership of the Floyd County Co-operative Hospital in the annual meeting last Thursday afternoon at the City Auditorium in Lockney voted to "authorize the board of directors to take whatever steps are necessary to change the name of the hospital to the Lockney General Hospital." Other business attended to included the re-electing of two directors and the audit report by Claude White of Lubbock.

Discussion of the name changing brought out that the name of the hospital had proved to be a draw-back in the maintaining of an adequate staff in some instances and the membership voted unanimously to give the directors the authority to take steps to change it. Probably a new charter will have to be secured from the state.

Re-elected to serve another term on the board of directors were Hilburn Casey and Berry Hooten. The terms are for three years with two members' terms expiring each year except the third year when the terms of three directors expire.

Hubert Frizzell, secretary of the board of directors read the minutes of the last meeting which were approved. J. D. Copeland, business manager of the hospital reported on the drive to secure funds to pay off the building indebtedness on the hospital.

Auditor Claude White's report for the fiscal year October 1, 1949 to September 30, 1950, showed that the hospital had done a gross business of \$95,990.26 with total expenditures of \$87,062.26 leaving a net saving of \$8,928.00. However other expenses, including a reserve of \$2,907.88 for bad debts and interest in the amount of \$1,238.47 reduced the net saving to \$5,310.90. Current assets showed accounts receivable of \$25,163.79, fixed assets, including buildings and equipment at \$60,432.90, and total assets at \$86,895.15.

A brief history of the church was given by the pastor, Rev. O. J. Welch.

The church trustees, Lois Williams, Bert Elam and Carl Chandler, burned the note signifying the church was dedicated free of debt. L. L. Scott, chairman of the board of deacons, led the dedication prayer.

The services were climaxed with a message by Rev. F. E. Swanner. Services were concluded a few minutes after 12 o'clock with five additions to the church.

New Manager At White Auto Here

Gayle West is the new manager of the White Auto Store in Lockney, replacing Bunt Jester who has disposed of his interest in the store.

Mr. West, his wife and two boys have an apartment at the G. Milton home here. They came here from Memphis, Texas, where Mr. West was connected with the same type store.

Mr. Jester will continue to make his home here, he said this week.

HALF INCH OF MOISTURE

The first moisture to fall on this area since September came this week, starting Monday night in the form of rain and turning to snow Tuesday. The rain and snow together was estimated to total between a quarter and a half inch of moisture. According to press reports the fall here was somewhat heavier than most other areas.

Snow stood between three and four inches in level territory Wednesday morning but a bright sun started it melting early. Temperatures sank to a low of 15 degrees Tuesday night.

Wheat farmers especially were glad to see the moisture, although it wasn't enough. Wheat in this area has been suffering from lack of moisture as well as from insects in some fields.

Bob Smith Is Missing In Korea

Cpl. Bob Smith, 21 years of age, is missing in action in Korea, according to a message received by his mother, Mrs. Alice Britt of West Fork, Ark. Smith has several brothers and sisters here.

Cpl. Smith was attached to the Second Division of the Army. He has been missing since November 23rd, the telegram said. He spent his last furlough here last summer, relatives said.

He had previously been employed here by Joe Smith, at the Lockney Auto Company and had worked at a number of other places.

His brothers and sisters here include L. B. Smith, who is employed at Wofford Wood Shop, Ross E. Smith, Mrs. Vestal Eiland and Gwendolyn McClelland.

Fowlers Observe 63rd Anniversary

An experience that comes to few married people was enjoyed by Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Fowler on Monday of this week, January 1st. The couple celebrated their 63rd wedding anniversary.

Mr. and Mrs. Fowler were married at Bowie, Texas, January 1, 1887. They lived from 1889 until 1905 in the Indian Territory, now Oklahoma. Mr. Fowler is one of the few living men who drove cattle up the old Chisholm Trail to Dodge City, Kansas. He will be 90 years of age in February while Mrs. Fowler is now 81.

Floydada Man Dies At Littlerock, Ark.

J. D. Jenkins, age 67 years, died Wednesday night of last week in a tourist cabin at Littlerock, Ark., friends have been notified. Mr. Jenkins was a resident of Floydada where he had been employed for the past nine or ten years at Parker Furniture.

Mr. Jenkins' death was reported by officials at Littlerock as "from natural causes." It is supposed that he suffered a heart attack.

He had left Floydada a few days previous, visited a daughter in Dallas during Christmas and was on his way to visit relatives in Tennessee. He had been a resident of Floydada for about 30 years.

Survivors is one daughter of Dallas. Funeral services were held there Saturday.

Wiley Mudgett Is Buried Monday

Another Floyd County pioneer was claimed by death this week when Wiley Mudgett passed away at the Mercy Hospital in Slaton. Death came to Mr. Mudgett early Sunday morning after an illness of only a few days.

Mr. Mudgett had made his home here with his daughter, Mrs. Olive Myers for the past five years but had gone to Slaton on Sunday, December 18 to visit his sons, Jerry and Ray Mudgett and families. He became ill Wednesday of last week and his condition became so serious Saturday that he was removed to the hospital.

He had had a short illness about three weeks ago but had recovered from that, members of the family said. He had not been in bad health and his death was a shock to his family and friends in this community.

Funeral services were held at the Lockney Methodist Church at 3 p. m. Monday with Rev. N. S. Daniel, the pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. E. J. Cobb, local Baptist pastor and Rev. O. B. Herring of Slaton, a former Methodist pastor here. Carter Funeral Home of Lockney was in charge of arrangements and burial was in the Lockney cemetery beside the grave of his wife who preceded him in death on July 12, 1949.

Pallbearers were C. H. Rose, F. L. Brown, Frank Perkins, Leslie Floyd, Hugh Counts and E. R. Harris.

A large crowd attended the services and the many beautiful flowers attested to the many friends the deceased had in this area.

Mr. Mudgett was born in Osceola, Wisconsin, on April 2, 1888. When he was seven years of age, his parents moved to Terrell, Texas where he lived until he was 21, when he and his father bought land near Quanah and he rode the range as a cowboy for several years.

On October 26, 1890 he went back to Terrell and took as his bride Mary Viola Franklin. The couple moved to Oklahoma to make their home. They were living in Greer County, Texas when it was changed to Greer county, Oklahoma. In 1910 they moved back to Chillicothe and came to Floyd County in 1916.

Mr. and Mrs. Mudgett lived on a farm in the old Roseland community for several years and then moved to town where Mr. Mudgett clerked in the old Morris and Gruver store here. He was Sunday School superintendent of the union Sunday School at Roseland all the years he lived there.

In 1936 the Mudgetts moved to Oregon where they lived for eight years returning here to make their home with Mrs. Mudgett in 1944.

Mr. Mudgett was converted and joined the Methodist church at an early age under the influence of Christian parents and is known for his love of Sunday school and church work. He was also known for his love of gospel.

BANK DEPOSITS NEAR 3 MILLION

Bank deposits in the First National Bank in Lockney were \$2,908,647.86 at the close of business on December 30, according to the condensed statement published in this issue. This is the highest point deposits have ever reached in the local bank at the time a statement was issued, although it is not as high as they have been a few times. During the month of December the deposits were slightly more than three million, M. W. Wiley, president, said.

The present deposits do reflect a very substantial growth over both the statement a year ago and the last statement issued on October 4 of the past year. Deposits a year ago were \$2,255,613.93, showing an increase at this time of almost \$700,000. On October 4, 1950 the deposits were \$1,607,647.29, which is about \$1,300,000 less than the present level.

Considering the fact that very little wheat was grown here, that farmers were taxed heavily to spray their crops for insects, and that the cotton crop was much shorter than expectations, the deposits reflect a much better condition locally than might be expected, Mr. Wiley pointed out.

Another indication of the growth of the local bank is an increase in the surplus fund to \$50,000. The fund stood at \$40,000 on October 4, \$35,000 a year ago and at \$26,000 when the present management took over the bank.

Loans and discounts showed a whopping drop on the current statement. They stand now at \$396,217.12 compared to \$1,013,833.52 on October 4, approximately \$600,000 difference.

Public Service To Ask Raise In Local Rates

Southwestern Public Service Company will seek a raise in their electric rates in about 95 towns in the Panhandle and eastern New Mexico, it was announced Tuesday of this week. Lockney is served by the company and is included in the list where a raise in rates will be requested.

To raise their rates in a municipality, permission must be secured from the city governing body. The company is now in a large expansion program and the increase in rates is due to an "increase in the cost of everything, including machinery" an official of the company said.

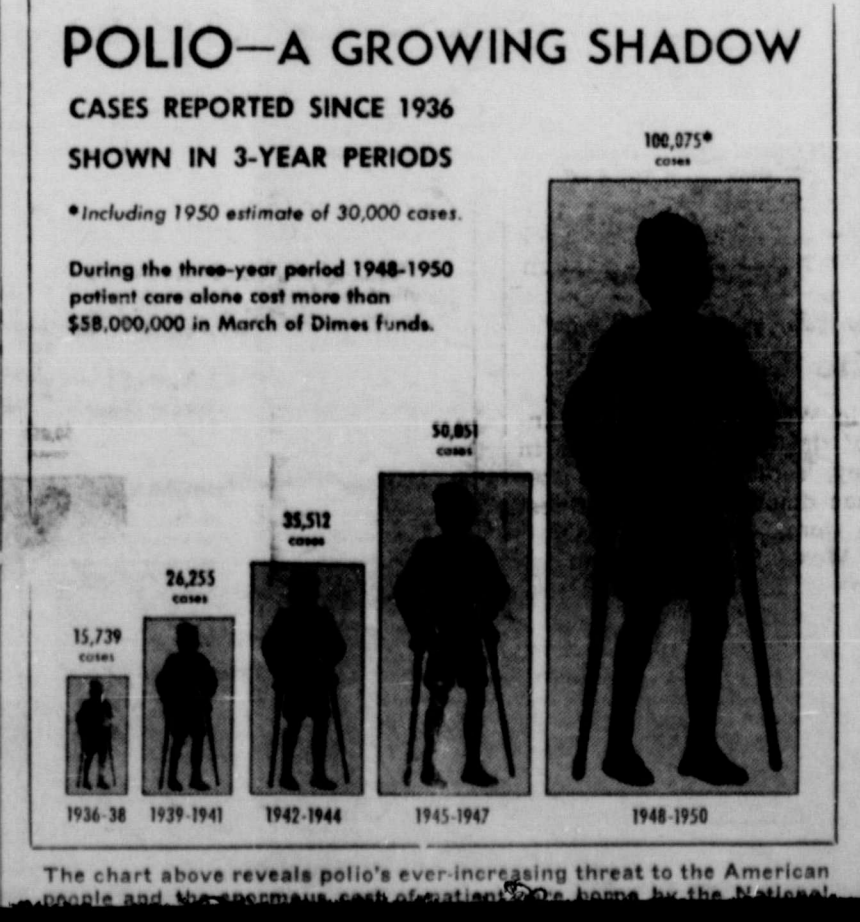
The procedure of securing permission to increase rates will take months to work out, it was pointed out and it will probably be six to eight months at least before the rates could go into effect here.

Good Shelter Will Protect Hogs

College Station. — Swine influenza and human influenza are closely related. In fact, the virus of human influenza have been known to produce flu in swine. Therefore, the same basic principles apply for the control of flu in swine as in human beings.
 If good shelters are not provided, hogs are in great danger of contracting flu when cold damp nights follow warm days, says Dr. W. C. Banks, veterinarian for the Texas A. & M. Extension Service. He says that hogs, like human beings, need a warm, dry place in which to sleep.
 At this time of the year, he recommends that all hogs be inspected daily for symptoms of flu. Once swine influenza appears, it spreads rapidly through the entire herd.
 Infected pigs become listless and go off feed. Their breathing is labored and jerky and they cough and usually have a high temperature. They appear to be very sick. The animals usually recover rapidly after five or six days of sickness.
 Although swine flu is seldom fatal, it causes a big loss in flesh and slows down the rate of gain says Dr. Banks. He advises putting infected hogs on a laxative

diet—one that contains some bran or some oil meal.
 Some of the new drugs are effective in helping to control flu in swine. However, Dr. Banks warns that they should not be expected to take the place of a warm, dry hog house.

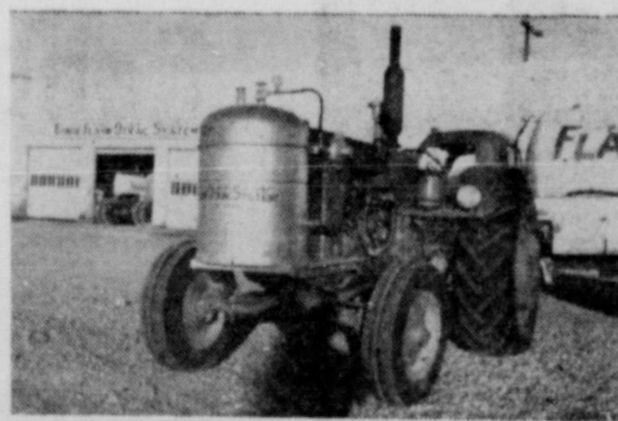

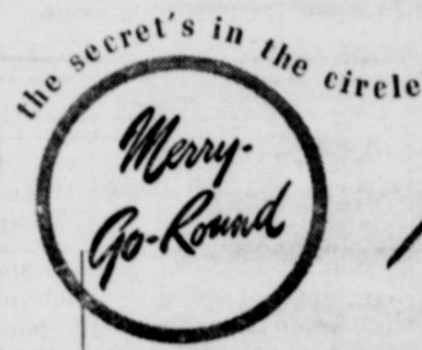

New S. S. Law Includes Domestic Help In Home

"Do You Have a Maid?" Not so very many households these days can answer yes, but those who do have a maid or any other household worker will need a copy of a brief booklet bearing that question as a title. John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office, began distributing this booklet today. This colorful leaflet sets out, in a few sentences, just how the lady of the house, or any employer of domestic help in or around the home, may tell whether or not the worker is brought under the new social security law which becomes effective on January 1.

The work of those regularly employed in private homes will be credited to social security and the employer will be responsible for reporting wages, along with social security taxes, to the collector of internal revenue. The title of the pamphlet does not stop with "Do You Have a Maid?" but continues "—or a laundress? — a cook? — chauffeur? — gardener?" Any of these, or any other persons employed regularly for work in or around a private household may come under the new law, and Hutton urges their employers to request a free copy of the booklet. A simple test in the booklet, in terms of amount of wages paid and regularity of employment, will tell whether a maid or cook or laundress will get the protection of social security — and whether the housewife should start making reports next year. If so, there's a postage-paid postal card in the government-issued booklet which the housewife should mail in for instructions.

Copies of the booklet are available at all post offices, or may be secured at offices of the collector of internal revenue. If you'll just call the social security office, telephone 4942, or drop us a post card, asking for the booklet, "Do You Have a Maid?" we'll send it to you by return mail. Address of the office is Social Security Administration, 1311 Texas Avenue, Lubbock, Texas.

The social security manager said he is arranging with women's groups to furnish supplies of the booklet for their members. For the domestic worker's own information about her new social security protection, a special leaflet is available at the social security office. Hutton pointed out that regularly employed domestic workers will need a social security account number card after January 1, 1951. The "Do You Have a Maid?"

THREE Texas youth won 1950 national honors in the 4-H Tractor Maintenance, Dairy Achievement and Farm and Home Electric programs. Each received a trip to the 29th annual 4-H Club Congress held recently in Chicago, and a \$300 college scholarship.



Marcus Hoelscher, 20, of Rowena, won the tractor maintenance award which was provided by Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. One of his main accomplishments was to save some 150 gallons of gasoline per year in operation of the family tractor on the 160-acre farm. Marcus attributes this savings to proper carburetor adjustment which he learned through his tractor project. A 4-H'er for eight years, he has won several awards, and was president of the county 4-H group. He also is junior leader of his local club. An outstanding record in the dairy achievement program brought high honors to T. G. Herring, Jr., 19, of Crosbyton. Also an eight-year club member, young Herring has made 174 dairy exhibits, and was high point man in dairy judging at Round-Up this year. He has won seven grand, eight junior and five senior champion awards at major shows. Earning a substantial income from his dairy project, T. G. has purchased a half interest in his father's herd, and farms more than 200 acres of cotton, grain and milo. He serves as junior leader of his local club and is president of the county group. Lederle Laboratories provided his award. Charles Hoelscher, 19, of Rowena, was named national winner in the 4-H Farm and Home Electric program. His award was provided by Westinghouse Educational Foundation. Charles has applied knowledge gained in the project to adjustments, repairs, and installation work around his home and farm. Among his many innovations are an electric cream separator, an improved electric motor for the washing machine, and a thermostatically controlled electric brooder. These activities are directed by the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College with USDA cooperating.

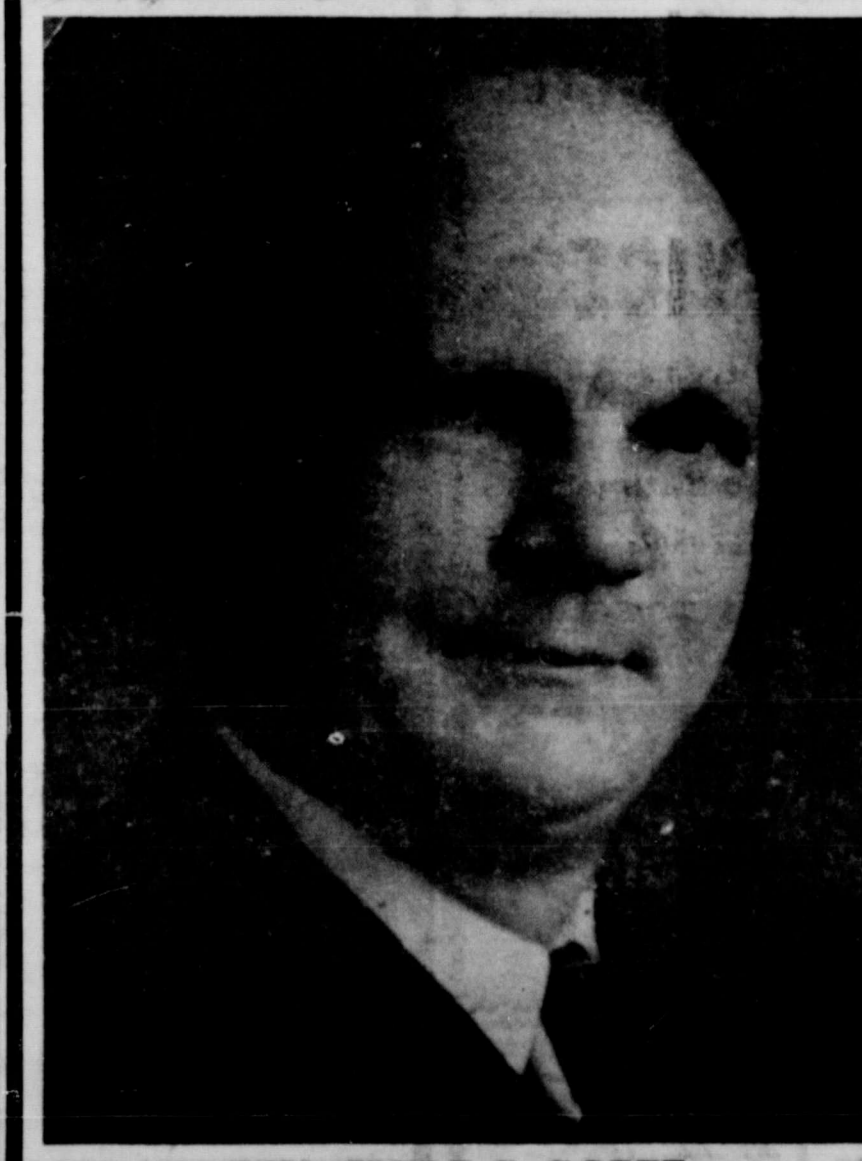

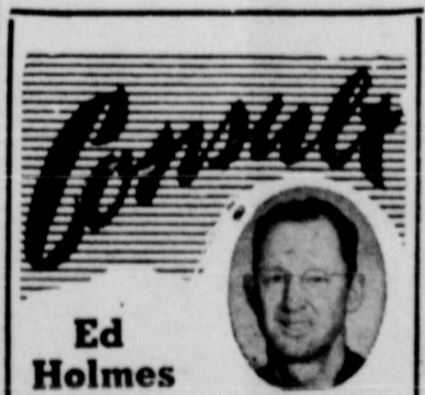

14 Counties In Organization To Protect Water

Littlefield. — Reactivation of one county organization and formation of another brings to 15 the number of units participating in the program of the High Plains Water Conservation and Users association, the group's office here reports.

The Deaf Smith County Water Conservation association, at an enthusiastic meeting attended by 200 underground water users, was recently reorganized in Hereford. Tom McFarland, manager of the Hereford Chamber of Commerce, is president. Other officers are John D. Aiken, vice president; Claude Ricketts, treasurer; and Bruce Miller, secretary.

The new unit is the Hockley County Water Conservation association which is headed by Burnett Roberts and Bert Eads, both active in the Hockley County Farm Bureau.

Inactive for more than a year, the Deaf Smith group said it was reorganizing to be ready to meet any future challenges against local control of underground water. Officers warned of "the constant threat of forces in Austin and elsewhere seeking to gain control of our underground water."

The Hockley group, Roberts said, "wants to carry its share of the burden in this constant fight to safeguard our water rights. The law says the water belongs to the man who owns the land; we want to keep it that way."

Associate members of the High Plains association are in 14 counties, Hockley, Lamb, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Swisher, Bailey, Dallam, Floyd, Castro, Hale, Parmer, Lubbock, Briscoe and Randall, plus the Petersburg association, which takes in a small area bordering on three counties.

Chrysler Hits All-Time High

Chrysler Division, Chrysler Corporation, set an all-time high for domestic shipments in the calendar year of 1950 with 164,730 cars bearing that name leaving the factory. This exceeds by 26,440, or 19.19 per cent, the previous peak of 138,290 achieved in 1941. It is 27,815 units, or 20.3 per cent higher than the mark for 1949, the best previous post-war year.

In addition to the growing popularity of the complete line, production was stimulated in June by the introduction of the Imperial model, a car that offers all the luxury of the Crown Imperial on a shorter wheel-base. This newcomer to the line met with enthusiastic acceptance from the public and Chrysler Division dealers and although it was in production only six months, its sales were close to the 11,000 mark.

While the heaviest volume of production remained in the Royal and Windsor lines, which are the two lowest priced lines that Chrysler offers, the increased number of New Yorkers, Imperials and Crown Imperials ordered by dealers showed a definite trend toward the larger and more luxurious models, with 24.9 per cent of total production in these classes.

Prestomatic Fluid Drive, which was standard on the entire line except the Royal, in which it was listed as special equipment at extra cost, was installed in 98.1 per cent of production as against 1.9 per cent with the conventional gear shift transmission.

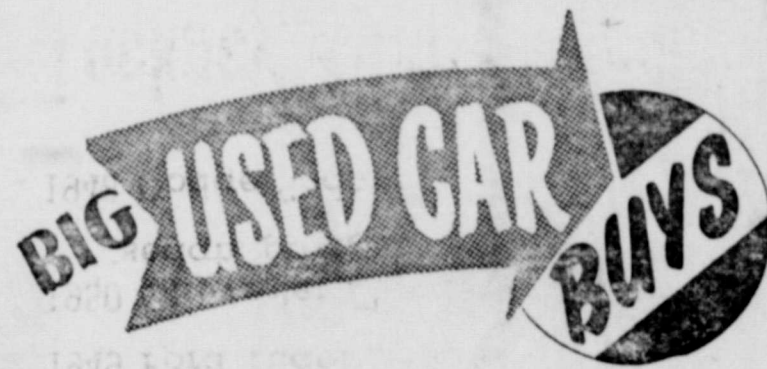

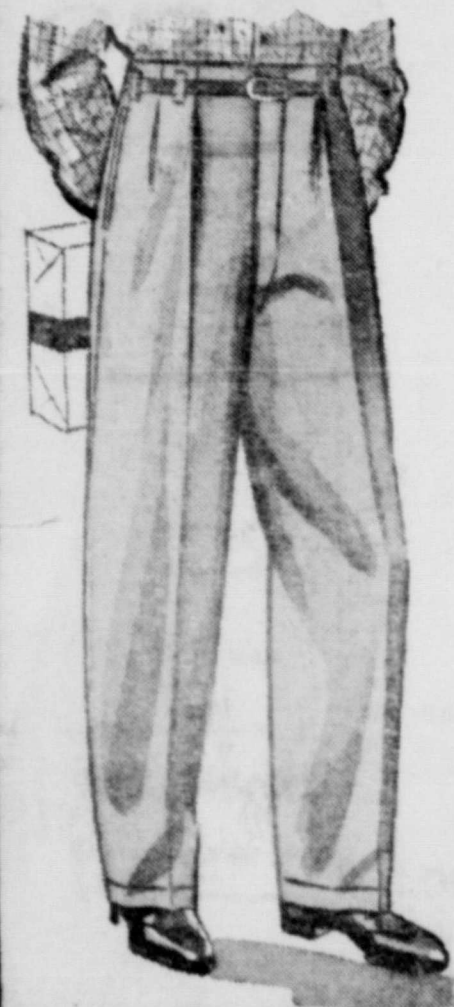
