

MAKE DRIVERS RESPONSIBLE

Regulation of any phase of conduct of the automobile driver in Texas is decidedly unpopular and invariably meets with stiff opposition when lawmakers tackle the job. It would be wishful thinking to believe the proposed driver responsibility law introduced at Austin last week will have easy sledding.

The proposed law carries a compulsory motor inspection, with cars carrying windshied stickers signifying their passing the test.

A driver responsibility clause would require driver's involved in accidents to show proof of financial responsibility up to \$10,-000. This measure failed in the last legislature because it meant "the little man would have to

pay that much more insurance." We favor both the vehicle inspection clause and the driver responsibility clause. Even conscientious motorists drive their cars on the highway knowing mechanical aefects exist. There is no need to speculate upon the driving habits of the non-conscientious. As for driver responsibility up to \$10,000, the measure is unpopular because a majority of driver have found that the accidents they have can be "settled off" by fixing up the other drivers car. Cumbersome and expensive court procedure rules out too many civil suits to collect damages from offending drivers. In such cases where a suit is won, the plaintiff usually finds the defendant has trans-

STUDENTS CAN'T SPELL AS WELL, PROF. SAYS

Austin. - Decreased emphasis on spelling in elementary grades is causing a decline in high school students' spelling ability, Dr. Fred C. Ayer, University of Texas distinguished professor of educational administration, says.

Dr. Aver discovered the decline in his 1950 national survey similar to 1915 and 1925 investigations, In 1915, for example, 100 per cent of the ninth grade pupils tested spelled "trouble" right In 1925, 95 per cent spelled it correctly, and in 1950 only 91 per cent could spell the word.



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

"THE OLD-AGE AND SUR-VIVORS INSURANCE SYSTEM under the Social Security law has been extended beyond commerce employees. As in the case of commerce and industry, the system will be financed by taxes on the worker and the employer under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act. January 1, 1951, the farm employer will be liable, under the general conditions outlined below, for the deduction of the employee tax from the cash wages of his farm employees. The employer will be required to pay such employee tax, together with his tax as an employer, to the U.S. Collector of Internal Revenue for his district. For those hired farm workers who meet the requirements of the new law, this Gov. ernment insurance provides:

"Monthly payments when they retire after reaching 65. "Payments to their families

when they die. These taxes do not apply to all farm employees. They do apply if a worker on a farm or in a farm home meets both of the fol-

lowing conditions: (1) He must have been employed by the farmer continuously (whether or not doing farm work) for a full calendar quarter. No tax is due for agricultural labor performed in this qualifying quarter, which may

be the last quarter of 1950. (2) In the next quarter he is employed by the same farmer in agricultural labor on a full-time basis for at least 60 days, and his cash wages for these services are \$50 or more.

Generally speaking, after he has served the qualifying quarter, the employee will be covered in each succeeding quarter with the same employer as long as he continues to work at least 60 days on a full-time basis and earns cash wages of \$50 or more. ONLY THE CASH WAGES PAID to your employees will be considered for benefit and tax


