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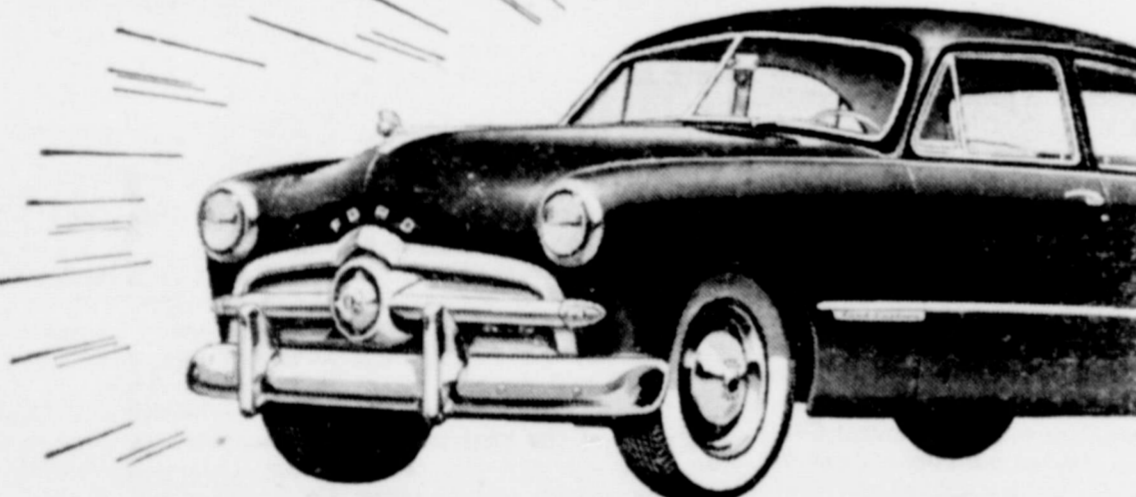

Military To Get Reduced Rates On Railroad Fares

Washington. — Reduced furlough fares on all railroads for military personnel traveling in uniform at their own expense have been extended to January 31, 1952, it was announced today by Earl B. Padrick, Chairman of a group of passenger traffic officers of the nation's railroads who met yesterday in Chicago. The reduction in furlough fare for members of the armed forces would have expired on March 31, Mr. Padrick said.

Mr. Padrick also stated that the return limit for using the round-trip tickets, good in coaches only, had been extended from 30 days to three months.

This action provides fares for

military personnel at the rate of 2,025 cents per mile or less which means a saving of up to one cent per mile. Mr. Padrick declared, and includes regular stop-over and baggage privileges.

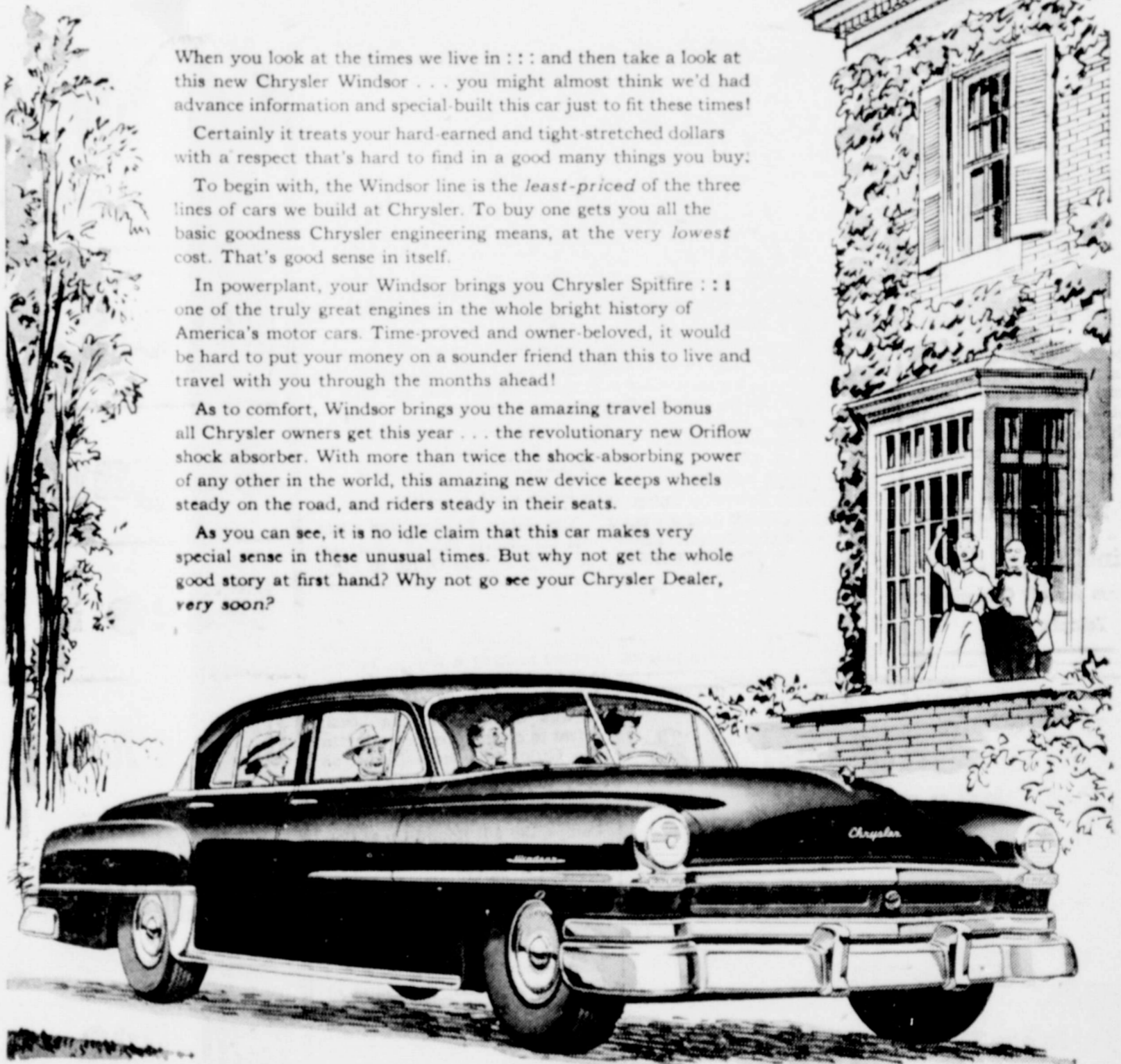

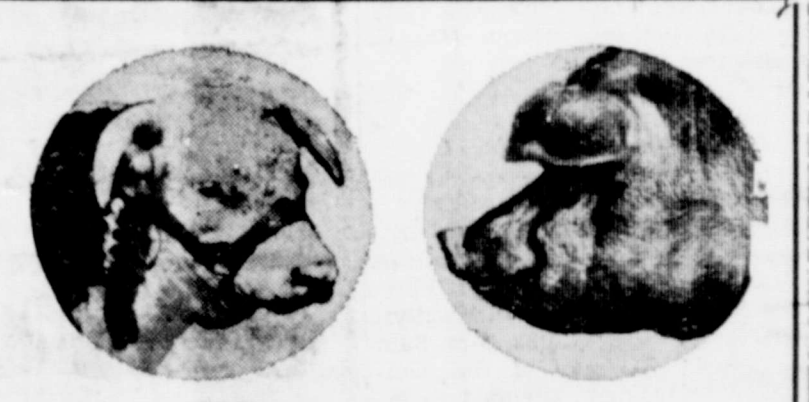

EDITORIAL

In my distress I called upon the Lord, and cried unto my God; he heard my voice out of his temple, and my cry came before him, even into his ears.—Psalms 3:6.

The Beacon receives many other weekly newspapers in exchange. A large percent of those in the plains have in recent weeks carried stories of plans in their community for growing castor beans. Deaf Smith county farmers will grow around 1500 acres. Farmers around Wellington are growing them. Floyd county has at least one demonstration of castor beans. Harry Artman, who lives near South Plains, had a crop of these beans last year and reported on his field at a farmers meeting here the fall.

Quoting the Hereford Brand, it can be said for castor beans: "The program for the domestic production and procurement of 51 castor beans is being under-

taken at the request of the Mutilations Board. Castor oil is a strategic oil which is in demand for military purposes, primarily for use in lubricating oil and special plastics. Representatives of the Baker Company said that castor oil is now being used in the manufacture of 185 items, including hydraulic brake fluid and rubber."

"Yields in California irrigated areas were said to range upward from 1500 pounds per acre to 2000, which was not considered a bumper crop. The CCC support price on castor beans is 10 cents per pound while the February market price was 12 1/2 cents per pound."

Another thing in favor of the castor bean for this area is that it is harvested and shelled by machinery. Floyd county irrigates into the swim.

The Truman-MacArthur rumpus still rages to some degree and will probably continue to be talked for weeks to come. Of course the administration is seeking every means of overcoming the tremendous impact of MacArthur's Washington speech. Few people will deny that it was a great speech. We also believe that few people will fall for a 'Smear MacArthur' campaign if and when the Trumanites put it on.

In the final analysis the matter seems to us to be a matter of appeasement—the man with the umbrella type. We are sure that no one wants war on any scale—large or small, but appeasement of the Commies won't prevent it. Surely we found in the late 30's that appeasement wasn't a cure for war.

Although we have as yet had no official report from Public Health Committee Chairman Joe Holt, we know that a lot of people cooperated in the clean-up campaign. All this week is still clean-up week and if you haven't gotten around to cleaning up your premises yet, try to do it this week. Let's make Lockney the cleanest town around.

Some of the local cotton farmers are getting the fever this week. Some may have already planted those expensive seed. Personally we've about decided that the cotton farmer who survives May rains, June droughts, July hails, August insects and September pulling price fights just about earns his money.

SOLON'S ALIBI POOR
The pretext given in the House of Representatives for refusing to allow Texans an opportunity to vote on a constitutional amendment which would forbid the levying of state income and sales taxes was not convincing.

The excuse for tabling the proposed amendment was that members of the present Legislature did not want to restrict the powers of future sessions over the taxes they might impose—including income and sales levies.

Members of the House who joined in offering their lame alibi seem to have lost sight of the fact that their first duty is to the people of Texas and not to future legislative sessions. If the majority of the people of the State favor an amendment of the type proposed, then it should be made a part of the Constitution, regardless of what the ideas of this or any other Legislature may be.

Yet the members of this session have refused to give the rank and file of Texans the opportunity to vote their preferences in a matter of great and costly concern to them and their State. The fact that such an amendment might be submitted to an election does not mean it would be approved. Voters of the State might reject it. Most proposed constitutional amendments are defeated. But the chances are that this proposal would be approved overwhelmingly if submitted to popular vote.

The submission and approval of such an amendment would not close the door to the possibility of levying State taxes of the type proposed. The amendment could be repealed if the majority of voting Texans should be convinced of its advisability. But the change which the present House

refused to submit would insure that income and/or sales taxes could not be imposed without the approval of people of the State. We submit that taxes like these never should be levied without giving the rank and file of Texans the opportunity to vote upon them.

The action of the House, however, leaves this taxing authority exactly where it was. Any Legislature that may choose to do so can impose these levies without considering the wishes of the people in the matter. No Legislature may ever attempt to use that power. But it is authority which could be entrusted more safely to those who would have to pay such taxes than to any occupants of political office.—Lubbock Avalanche.

MISNOMER
So far there's been no report on the efforts of Sen. Paul Douglas to investigate "morals and ethics" in Washington officialdom. It may be that there are

"no such animals." It might be better to give the group a new name and a new job, such as setting up some standards under which our present, and future, public servants must work.—Amarillo News.

WHOSE PRIVILEGED?
President Truman frequently attacks "the privileged few" and "special interests." So did the late Mr. Roosevelt. They mean, of course, business, industry and management. But who are the real "privileged?"

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation is only the latest indication. The real privileged, the real special interests, are those who vote right, give \$100 to party dinners and much larger sums to the campaign chest.

The new privileged do not strut on Wall Street, but have connections with the White House and the Democratic National Committee.

They get contracts, or they know somebody who can get them. They are 5, 10- and 15-percenters, with deep freezes thrown in and it is charged they sell patronage jobs in Mississippi.

They can get convicts paroled just in time to do leg work for elections. They escape punishment for blowing a safe and stealing ballot evidence in Kansas City just before the Federal Bureau of Investigation moves in.

They are grain speculators on government payrolls, or with nearby offices and connecting phones. They use tax-supported transportation for pleasure and commercial jaunts.

They refuse to surrender government files to investigators. Well—don't look for any punishment or reform. Senator Fulbright holds his nose and says he, personally, has had enough. The taxpayer is "privileged" to cough up some more. March 15, and wait for the next serial.

Meanwhile, thank heaven for a few investigators with courage and for the constitutional prerogative of a free press to print the comic operas as they unfold. It's all a good show.—Dallas Morning News.

Irrigation Area Nearly Triples In 9-Year Period

Irrigated farming now occupies an important place in Texas agriculture. During the nine-year period, 1940-1948, the area under irrigation increased from 1,045,000 to 2,885,000 acres, according to figures cited in a new publication recently released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Most of the expansion in irrigated land resulted from the development of wells by individuals and partnerships. Wells accounted for 1,369,000 acres, while an increase of 463,000 acres resulted from utilizing surface-water supplies.

Nearly 1,000,000 acres were developed between 1946 and 1948, almost three-fourths of which came from wells developed in the High Plains area.

In 1948, 30,000 Texas farms were partly or wholly dependent upon irrigation for their production. Approximately 10 per cent of the total acreage harvested in 1948 was from irrigated land. And crops from irrigated
