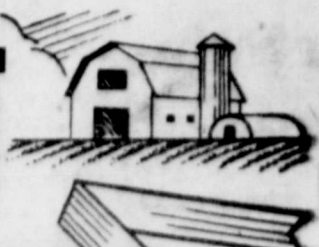

## Lockney School Bus To Cedar Hill Stopped

The Lockney school bus which has been running to Cedar Hill to pick up students from that district has been ordered to stop "crossing the Floydada District" according to a letter written to County Superintendent Clarence Guffee, a copy of which was sent to Supt. Sidney Reeves of Lockney.

The order means that the bus cannot go into the Cedar district and is now running only to the intersection of the farm highway 135 east of Lockney and the Silvertown-Floydada highway where the Cedar students are meeting it. The part of the "Floydada district" which the bus has been crossing is the portion of the former Liberty district residents of which wanted to be attached to the Lockney district but the county school board made them a part of the Floydada district in the consolidation order following the passage of the Gilmer-Aiken bill.

The Cedar Hill trustees have been contracting with the Lockney school to send their high school students here for the past several years, and reports here are to the effect that the majority of the residents wish to send their children here. In spite of these facts, apparently a move is on foot to force the district to attend the Floydada schools.

C. E. Boyd, transportation officer for the State Department of Education, was in Lockney last week investigating the route. He went to Cedar Hill with Supt. Sidney Reeves and made an inspection tour of the entire route. After talking with Cedar Hill trustees he told Supt. Reeves that he found the agreement between the two schools satisfactory and would recommend that it be continued as it had been, subject to review by higher officials. In spite of this, it was only a few days until the letter came ordering the bus to stop. Supt. Reeves is in Austin this week discussing the matter with school officials.

## PRE-SCHOOL CLINIC WILL BE SPONSORED BY TOWNSEND P-TA

A pre-school clinic for boys and girls who will enter school for the first time next fall will be held from 8:30 a. m. until noon and from 1 p. m. until 3 p. m. on next Tuesday, May 22, in the Methodist Church basement. It was announced this week by Mrs. Joe Foster, president of the C. N. Townsend school Parent-Teacher Association, which organization is sponsoring the clinic.

Co-operating in the clinic will be local doctors, dentists, school authorities, a Floydada school nurse, and the local Methodist Church. Supt. I. T. Graves of Floydada is allowing the school nurse and equipment to be used for the clinic. Mrs. Foster said.

The clinic is for the benefit of all children in the district who will be six years old on or before August 31 of this year. No parent or child is obligated in any way to attend the clinic, however, and no charge will be made for services rendered at the clinic. All doctors, dentists and nurses assisting in the pre-school clinic are to give of their time in the interest of healthy children.

## Heavy Rains Hit Here Wednesday

Heavy rains, apparently covering all of Floyd County, fell Wednesday afternoon with the government gauge kept by Joe Holt at the Lockney General Hospital showing 2.86 inches at 5 p. m. The rain continued to fall steadily and was still falling at 6:30 p. m. with probably an inch or an inch and a half added to the measurement.

The heavy rains probably mean that a great deal of the cotton planted in this area the past two weeks will have to be planted over. Some that was up to a stand and possibly some that was just under the ground may be saved but the majority opinion here was that most cotton would have to be replanted.

The rain was accompanied by a small amount of hail which fell for just a few minutes and apparently did very little if any damage. A rain totaling 34 inches by Mr. Holt's gauge fell here Tuesday and on last Friday night 12 of an inch fell making the total for the past week here around five inches.

The Wednesday afternoon rain was fairly heavy in all parts of the area. The Beacon was able to contact Harmon Handley and Chester Mitchell in the Pleasant Valley community reported a round 2 1/2 inches with a sprinkle of hail about 6:30 p. m.

W. A. Gilbreath, living about six miles east of town had 1.25 inches about 6:30 with a sprinkle of hail.

Lloyd Reidhimer of the Lone Star community had 1.85 inches and also a sprinkle of hail with rain still falling at 6:30.

John Lee Carthel in the Prairie Chapel community reported 1.80 Wednesday afternoon and 1 inch Tuesday afternoon. He also had a small amount of hail Wednesday.

George Turner, who lives just north of Aiken, said that he believed he had 4 or 5 inches of rain Wednesday and 2 inches Tuesday. He reported that some roads in that vicinity were under water and that fields were standing in water.

The Tuesday rain varied considerably with Vernon Daniel and Verner Hodel reporting between 4 and a half inch while the Aiken area had around 2 inches. The Sterley area also had around a half inch or a little less Hilburn Casey said, while Tom Moore reported .80 at his place north of town and Henry Schacht reported .75 of an inch at his home west of town.

Mr. Holt reports that the weather bureau estimates that one inch of water on an acre of ground equals to 113 tons in weight, so a man that has 160 acres of land with a four inch rainfall has around 75,000 tons of water to worry about.

**Unusual Winds**  
An unusual feature of the weather the past week has been a steady gale from the south and southeast most of the time for six days and nights. It is unusual here for winds to come from the south or southeast but the strong winds to continue for such a long period is especially unusual, old timers say.

The winds ranged from around 25 miles per hour up to as high as 55 miles per hour in gusts and has blown almost steady since Friday of last week.

## Keep Chickens Up Is Mayor's Plea

Mayor D. E. Cox this week urged residents of the city to use every means possible to keep their chickens on their own property. His statement follows: "Now that planting time is here our neighbors would appreciate it if we would all watch our chickens and not allow them to scratch out gardens or fields adjoining us. Especially those on the outskirts of town, adjacent to fields should be on the alert to keep their chickens within their own boundaries."

## Wildcat Test Down Near 9,000 Feet

The Houston Oil Co. No. 1 John S. Lackey wildcat near Cedar Hill was nearing 9,000 feet Wednesday still in shale and lime.

The drilling crew struck the Pennsylvania lime at 8,466 feet this week. Hopes were that the lime would be found at around 7,000 feet. A drillstem test was taken Saturday, the second one for this test, but it did not log any appreciable amount of oil or gas, reports here said. The test was run at 8,468-8,526 feet. Some observers think the current lime is the lower Strawn.

The wildcat is slated to continue digging until it finds and tests the Mississippian lime and it may be carried on down to explore the Eibenburger. That zone is now expected around 10,000 feet.

### EDITORIAL

We add our congratulations, along with other merchants of Lockney, to the Seniors of Lock-

ney High School. Amid all the fun, cramming, special occasions and honors of the last few days of school, the Seniors have not yet realized the importance of the milestone they are approaching. But it is a milestone, a very important one and one that will mark a turning point in the lives of most of these Seniors.

After graduation the Seniors will no longer be looked upon as "School kids," a label they have worn for many years. They will be young men and women who will be expected to assume their share of responsibility for running this old world. We feel sure that the Seniors of 1951 of Lockney High School will measure up to that responsibility.

Despite the fact that apparently most of the people of Texas favor prohibition of the selling of intoxicants, the Texas Legislature is certainly controlled by men of "wet" sentiment if the voting of the past week is any indication. At any rate the author of the "dry" bill did make the members of the legislature go on record as either for or against the bill which will give the folks back home some information on how they stand.

There are two schools of thought on what is going to happen to the country once the defense program really gets to rolling. One group says that, short of an all-out war, industrial plants will be able to meet normal civilian requirements along with defense needs, while another says that when the defense program gets under way good industrial capacity will be channeled away from civilian production and create many shortages in consumer goods. #### WHO'S KIDDING?

One proposal of the Kefauver committee ought to puzzle a fellow who might drop in on us from another planet. In its report, the Senate group

recommended that criminals and racketeers be taxed on their gross incomes, allowing no deductions for operating expenses and wagering losses.

What this seems to say is this: You're engaged in illegal activities, and you shouldn't be. But as long as you insist on going ahead against the law anyway, the least you can do is not pretend you're running legitimate enterprises in which expenses and losses may be fairly calculated.

#### ANOTHER "GIVE AWAY" PROGRAM

The day the Marshall Plan went into effect this newspaper pegged it as a gigantic scheme to purchase surplus American goods rather than a genuine attempt to reconstruct the economy of Europe.

Subsequent events have proved us correct. The Marshall Plan has failed, just as Russia's Five Year Plans have failed. Big Business has profited, however, by the sale of more than 12 billion dollars of goods, paid for by tax money. The Marshall Plan is now spending \$670,000 of tax money for post-agricultural salaries. The duty of these agents is to bury the truth about Marshall Plan spending.

Big Business does not want to lose profits it racked up under the Marshall Plan. So it is now plugging for an Eisenhower Plan to replace the worn out Marshall deal. The idea is to give more and more goods away at our expense, hoping the public will censure because of the added prestige of the Eisenhower name.

Although the Marshall Plan ended December 31, gifts continue to pour out. Britain has received \$5 millions in scarce copper, \$2½ millions in petroleum; a half-million dollars worth of coffee has gone to Greece; and \$1,000,000 worth of tinplate has gone to Norway and French North Africa—all under a defunct Marshall Plan.

Americans don't know the truth about the failure of the Marshall Plan. Before embarking on another scheme to enrich American business, this truth should be known by every citizen. —Ralls Banner.

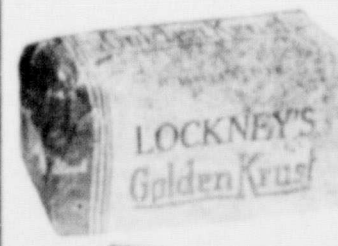

continued drouth the young can  
not survive, and if you kill one  
of the pair while speeding down  
the highway it will mean fewer  
birds, and the man or boy who  
deliberately kills a nesting bird  
now is cheating not only him-  
self but all good sportsmen of  
their rightful heritage.

The season is just as emport-  
ant to fish. Spawning is very  
late this year because of the cool  
weather. The spawning season  
is regulated to a very strong de-  
gree by the water temperature.  
It is just now getting right south  
of us here but we think it will  
be 15 days here before spawning  
season.

If floods come the spawn may  
be destroyed. In this case it will  
be left entirely to the fish hatch-  
eries to supply the young fish  
for stocking purposes so another  
year there may be others to  
catch. So watch the weather man  
for the next few weeks. Blame  
him if there is a shortage of  
game and fish.

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### Wells Are Being Lowered, Ass'n Says

With the start of another heavy irrigating season, many farmers in the South Plains area are having to lower the pumps on their water wells, according to reports received by the High Plains Water Conservation and Users association.

Illustrating the fact that the problem is widespread, one farmer reported that a Plainview pump company put him on a waiting list and said it would be at least two months before they could get to the job of lowering his pumps.

Other reports indicate that a lot of windmill wells, used mostly for domestic purposes, have failed in the 60-70 foot upper straits and have had to be

deepened to the irrigation well level. This indicates that the higher water sands are being depleted.

"Now is the time to do something about the lowering of water levels while the problem is small enough for us to tackle," a spokesman said.

An underground water conservation district, if created, will have conservation powers which should stop the gradual decline of the water level, or at least retard the decline, the association pointed out. Proper spacing of wells, prevention of waste, better pumping practices and a recharging program would help keep the water levels up, it was said.

The straight and narrow path would be much wider if more people traveled it.

## 18 Bombers To Fly Over Lockney Saturday

Eighteen TB-25 Billy Mitchell training bombers will fly in mass formation over Lockney at 1:11 p. m. on Armed Forces Day, Saturday, May 19.

The fly-over is being staged as part of an Open House celebration to be held at Reese Air Force Base, twelve miles west of Lubbock. The Reese-based planes are to be augmented in the afternoon showing by displays and exhibits from active and reserve components of the Army, Navy, and Marine Corps in this area. The main gate opens at 11:00 a. m.; the Open House program is slated for one to 5:00 p. m.

General Robert J. Smith, Dallas, president of Pioneer Air Lines, will be the principal speaker for the Open House ceremonies. He recently returned to his civilian post after serving in a defense capacity in Washington.

Best U. S. aircraft, seldom seen in this area, will be brought to Reese and displayed to the public. A Navy PB4Y, from Memphis, Tenn.; jet fighter F-80's and F-84's, furnished by Nellis AFB, Nev.; a helicopter from San Marcos AFB, and a Kelly AFB C-97 will be part of the aircraft exhibit on the ground and in the air. Parts and equipment displays will be set up by Reese officials and shown in the hangars.

Aerial rockets and a 250-pound bomb will be shown by representatives of the Texas Tech ROTC unit. Artillery troops from Fort Sill, Okla., will demonstrate the radio-controlled firing of artillery by two liaison planes. Four artillery pieces, including 155 mm. and 105 mm. cannons, are to be among the Army displays.

The 514th Air Force Band, from Reese, will furnish martial music for the program, and will perform in an afternoon concert.

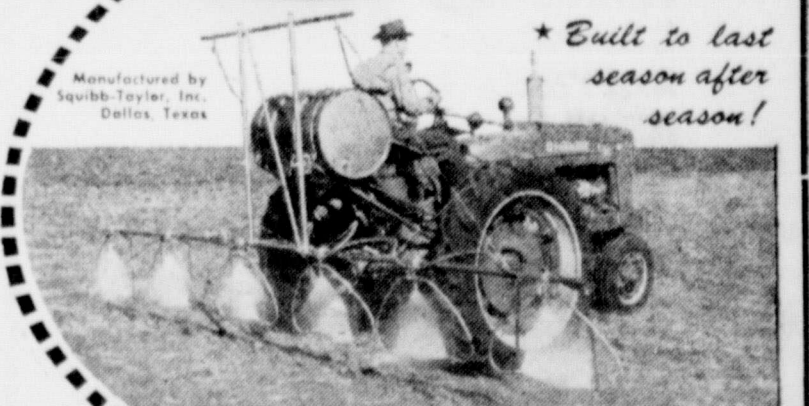

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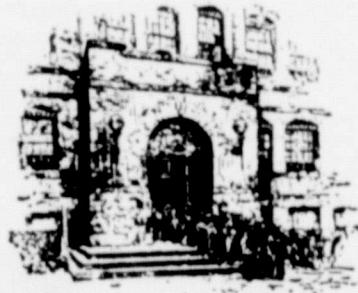

The program calls for prevention of hail by sowing cloud formations with chemicals. The operators of the program are wanting to sign up 100,000 acres in Western Floyd and Hale counties, Ben Quebe said. The charge is 40 cents per acre or less in cases where one operator has a large acreage.

Quite a number of farmers were present and most of them were interested in the new hail prevention plan, Mr. Quebe said.

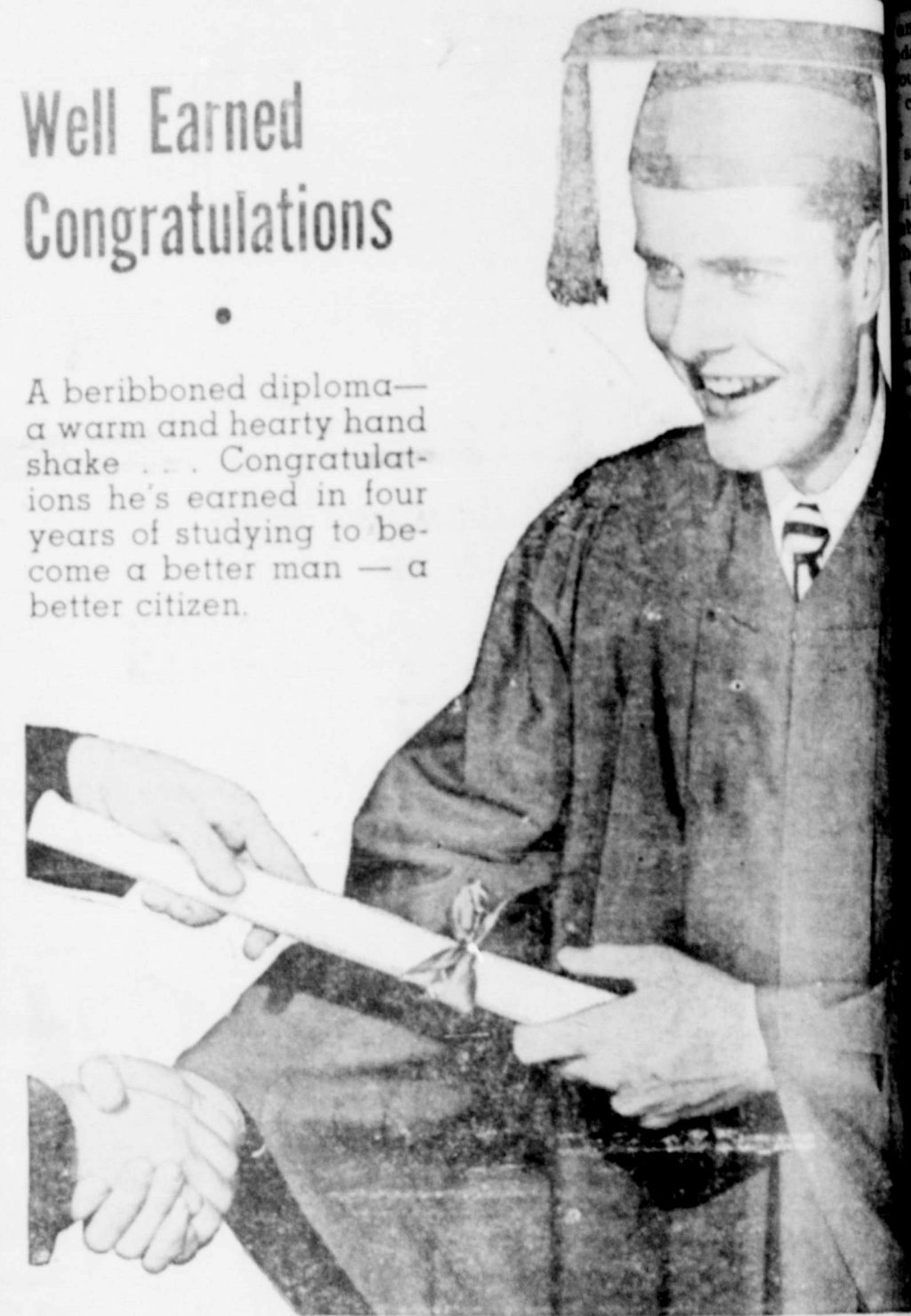
Ralls Wins District Baseball Title
