

Use Care In The **Potato Harvest**

tatoes are too scarce and valuable right now not to get the best of care at harvest time. Ir-Texas Agricultural Extension Service, if they are dug and stored properly.

He says let the potatoes mature before digging them. They should be mature if they are to be stored for any length of time. Here is a simple and easy method for checking maturity. Press the thumb against the skin of a few potatoes, if the skin is tough and doesn't break easily, the crop is ready for harvesting.

If excessive rainfall has occurred just prior to harvest, the potatoes are likely to be covered with water blisters-small elevated white spots - on the skin. Hutchison says harvesting should be delayed until the blisters have dried. If the potatoes are harvested when "snappy or "Blistery," heavy losses may occur from rotting.

He says a good digging job can be done by running a middle buster or turning plow eight to ten inches deep under the potato row. The skinned or damaged potatoes should be separated from the good ones when aged potatoes first for they will true right now not keep well in storage. Potatoes should be handled almost as carefully as eggs and as soon as they are picked up, should be placed in the shade to prevent

A cool, well ventilated cellar makes a satisfactory storage place for potatoes provided it has an overhead vent for ventilation. The door and vent should be open at night and closed during the daytime. This practice will help keep the cellar cool.

If the potatoes are stored in buildings or under them, good cross ventilation is a necessity. When potatoes in storage are exposed to light, they turn green and are undesirable for human consumption. Hutchison says it's best not to spread the potatoes on a floor or the ground. They'll keep better if placed on a slabbed false floor that has about four inches of air space under it. Small poles or hay placed under the potatoes will help for the ideal arrangement permits air to completely circle the po-

ip moisture and keep the poatoes dry and this means reduced storage losses. And fin-

NEXT time you go to your corner druggist and ask him to refill that old prescription, chances are you'll get

the surprise of your life. "Sorry," your friend the druggist will have to say, "but I can't refill this prescription any more unless I get specific instructions to do so from your

"And why not?" you may explode. What is this—a racket you druggists and doctors have cooked up to collect more fees and charge more for medicines? Here you've been refilling this same prescription for my family for five years, and now you say you can't do it any more. Why, I've even been giving some of this medicine to my next-door neighbor. The whole

Stormy conversations like this bething is outrageous! tween pharmacists and patients are now being repeated every day in the more than 50,000 drugstores that span the nation. You may argue until you are blue in the face, but it will get you nowhere. The druggist will still refuse. And you can't blame him. A new federal law requires him to do so.

This new law, which became effective a few weeks ago, is designed to guard you and your family against the dangers, not only of indiscriminate refilling of prescriptions, but of using potent drugs, including the new "wonder" drugs, without adequate medical supervision. The statute is an amendment to federal drug regulations and is known as the Durham-Humphrey Act after its sponsors—two Democratic members of Congress who are also druggists. It does not affect medicinal narcotics, which have been

strictly controlled since the Harrison Narcotic Act of 1913. The new ban which it places on unauthorized refilling of restricted drugs undoubtedly will cause many cases of inconvenience. A lot of people, including doctors, will be angry at first. But in the long run the change should prevent unnecessary deaths and serious illnesses, according to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, which strongly supported the law.
Officials of this Administration report that the misuse of prescriptions, including indiscriminate refilling, causes "more deaths, injuries, broken homes, human derelicts, and other tragedies than all other violations of federal drug laws put together.

The FDA has a file of cases where death or serious illness resulted from the misuse of refilled prescriptions. While the largest number of these involved sleeping pills, the records show that a significant number resulted from misuse of other valuable drugs, including some of the amazing new

"miracle" preparations. In general, the need for the new law is a result of the tremendous advances made by American medical and pharmaceutical science. During the last 15 years there has come a steady stream of new and improved "wonder drugs"—sulfas, antibiotics, vitamins, antihistamines, the new hormones such as cortisone and ACTH, and, within the last few weeks, a new drug for tuberculosis. However, the availability of so many new and potent medicines in finished form, ready for use, brought unexpected

perils. While these drugs, when taken under the supervision of a doctor, can contribute greatly to saving lives and to the elimination of pain and suffering, they can be as dangerous as poisons in the hands of a layman who doesn't know how to use them.

If you are inclined to feel abused, remember that the new law in no way interferes with your right to buy the many everyday drugs which are safe for self-medication and which you may want in your medicine cabinet such as aspirin and other pain relievers, laxatives, mouth washes, dietary vitamin supplements, liniments, and salves. The new law places no restrictions on these. All you have to do is go down to the drugstore and ask for them.

Would the Lord give a law so vague that he would have to leave man to interpret it according to his own ideas and opinions? We should clearly see then that what the Lord commands He commands to all, and requires the SAME of all men; that is, abedience to his laws as set forth in the New Testament, and not obedience as to our own private interpretation of the Scriptures. When you read something and then some one else reads the same thing, and one of you "see" it one way and the other "sees" it another then one or both have to be wrong.

One of the grave mistakes that is made today concerning the Word of God is failing to accept ALL that the Word says. You cannot take what pleases you and leave the rest out. James in his epistle teaches that we have to obey all that the Lord commands, and not just portions of what He commands. James 2:10-12. Let us then study and learn what the Lord commands of all men, without respect of persons. Peter said, "Of a truth, I perceive that God is no respector of persons: But in every nation he that feareth him, and WORKETH righteousness, is accepted of him." Acts 10:34-35. (How do we know how to work righteousness?) Rom. 10:2-3 reads: "For I bear them record that they have a zeal of God, but not according to knowledge. For they being ignorant of God's righteousness, and going about to establish their own righteousness, have not submitted themselves unto the righteousness of God." We see then that it is not just zeal that counts, but zeal in the right thing, that is in the righteousness of God. So, let us study to find what the righteousness of God is. Study with us next week.

The cause of this is an over-running spool, which means that line than the flying lure requires, with the result that the loose line will get reversely wound on the spool and cause the backlash. In casting the bait is loosing speed rapidly due to air resistance and the pull of the line, whereas the spool runings, will keep on running at the original speed, which results in loose line on the spool. and the backlash

The only remedy is to reduce the speed of the spool by thumbing and letting the spool pay out only as much line as is required by the bait.
