REMISSION OF SINS

This is a subject which should be of importance to everyone. All ought to be concerned about the remission of their sins. It is a subject that can not be considered in the light of human reasoning. Some try to make "light" of the scriptural teaching on the remission of sins by human

John 3:5 "Jesus answered, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." Some will try to explain away the water that Christ mentions here by trying to apply it to the physical birth. Dear friends this cannot be done. In verse three, Jesus said, "Except a man be born AGAIN . . . " Verse five tells how we are born again. Also, wouldn't it be foolish to tell a man that he had to be born (physically) before he could be born (spiritually). Now, can you have the remission of your sins except you be in the Kingdom.

Acts 2:38 "Then Peter said unto them. Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins . . . " Some try to explain this passage away by saying that the for here is "because of." Let us notice. The Greek word here translated "for" (eis) means unto, into, in order to. To further prove the point. In Matt. 26:28 we have exactly the same phrase used. "For this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many FOR THE REMISSION OF SINS." Now for those that would try to make for (eis) in Acts 2:38 mean "because of." does the for (eis) in Matt. 26:28 mean "because of."

Again, in Acts 22:16. "And now why tarriest thou? arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord." Friends, how can we misunderstand such language?

Eph. 5:25-26 "Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it: That he might sanctify and cleanse it with the WASHING OF WATER by the WORD . . . " What is this by being born of water and the Spirit. Did not the Spirit give the Word?

Rom. 6-7 "For he that is dead is FREED from sin." How do'we become dead that we might be FREE from sin. Read the third and fourth verses of the same chapter. "Know ye not that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were BAPTIZED INTO his death? Therefore we are buried with him by BAPTISM into death . . . " Now who is DEAD that there might be a "freeing" from sin. How do we become dead in the sense that Paul used it on this occasion?

Now. A scriptural baptism is not just a DIPPING in water. There are things which must preceed immersion in water before it is baptism according to the scriptures. It must be preceeded by faith. Acts 16:31. It must be preceeded by repentance. Acts 2:38: 17:30. So Paul in the Colossian letter Chapter 2 verse 12 describes it thus: Buried with him in baptism, wherein also ye are RISEN WITH him through the FAITH of the operation of God . . . " CAN YOU SAY IN VIEW OF COL. 2:12 THAT BAPTISM EX-CLUDES SALVATION BY FAITH. IT IS IN FAITH THAT WE ARE BAPTIZED AND RISEN WITH HIM." Do you have faith in the Word of God, in view of all of the foregoing scriptures, if you say that scriptural Baptism is not essential to the remission of sins.
