

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

Miller Develops Self-Propelled Cotton Harvester

A self propelled cotton harvesas revolutionary in its use as was the self propelled grain harvester, is the brain child of a Plains

Arlon E. Miller, born and reared in the Sand Hill community of Floyd County ten miles south of Lockney, is the inventor. Miller's contribution to the mechanical age is of such practical simplicity that even the least mechanically minded might ask, 'Why hadn't somebody thought if that a long time ago?"

Ever since mechanical cotton harvesters went into fields farmers have looked for improvements that would reduce waste of the staple. The Miller unit reduces waste to an absolute minimum, the inventor claims. He says there is less waste with the harvester than there is in

The Miller Cotton Master converts the Oliver Cotton Harves. ter from a drag type to a selfpropelled tricycle tractor type harvester. That, in a nutshell, is the description of Miller's invention. The self-propelled arrangement places the cotton gathering mechanism in front of the machine. The fingers that strip the stalks are the first part of the machine that touch the cotton, leading the wheels on which the unit rolls, and no cotton is knocked out on the ground.

The fingers are so constructed that they will move an inch under the surface of the ground, picking up everything. The beaters remove a big per cent of the leaves, dirt and burrs, cleaning through the elevator into the trailer that follows the unit.
