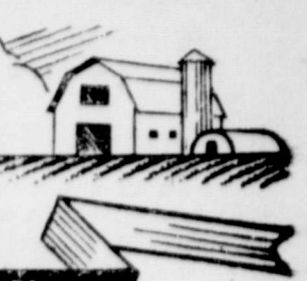

Longhorns And Ralls Play Here Friday Night

The last home game of the season for the Lockney Longhorns will be played here Friday night when the Ralls Jack rabbits come here for a district game. The game will start at 8 p. m. and will climax the homecoming day program.

The Longhorns are in good shape after the hard game with Abernathy last week and will be ready to go. One change in the offensive starting line-up will see Lewis Foster at end replacing Aubrey Cox. Coach Curtis Kelley said Wednesday.

The Longhorns will probably be remembering the last two games they played with the Ralls Rabbits when the local boys were beaten badly even though they reputedly had been the best team. Perhaps they will even the score this year.

Ralls has a good team and is undefeated in district play. A good comparable score is that with Floydada. The Whirlwinds defeated Ralls 32-0 in an early season game, the same score they made against the Longhorns in mid-season.

Alvin Morrison, quarterback and Don Bennett, fullback are the mainstays in the Rabbit offense and will bear watching. Scout reports say the Rabbits also have two big tackles in Tommy Scroggins and A. J. Langdon. They have seven starters from last year's team.

EISENHOWER CARRIES FLOYD COUNTY IN HEAVY VOTING

For the first time since 1928 Floyd County has given a majority vote to a Republican candidate for president. Dwight D. Eisenhower won three out of every five votes to carry the county 2111 to 1463 for Stevenson. Eisenhower carried all boxes in Lockney and Floydada and most smaller boxes in the county. Stevenson carried Lone Star, Starkey, Allman, McCoy and Baker.

The Floyd County vote was somewhat of a record for a general election or a primary either. The vote in this election totaled approximately 3600 and passed the total vote in either Democratic primary this year. As far as The Beacon knows it may be a record vote for the county. The threatened write-in campaign against Governor Allan Shivers and Attorney General Price Daniel in the county failed to materialize to any degree. Surprising, however, was the large number of votes each of these candidates polled in the Republican column. According to The Beacon's figures Shivers polled 2703 votes in the Democratic column and 441 in the Republican column for a total of 3144 votes. Daniel polled 2731 votes in the Democratic column and 411 in the Republican column for a total of 3144 votes in the county. In the write-in column Tom Connally polled 9 votes for United States Senator. Lindley Beckworth polled 13 votes for the same office and Ralph Yarborough polled 37 votes for governor.

Other candidates for president polled negligible votes with MacArthur getting 5 under the Christian Nationalist party and Hamblen getting 1 vote under the Prohibition party column.

The constitutional amendments lost heavily in this county. For the workman's compensation amendment, the vote was 702 for and 1199 against. The medical board amendment polled 639 for and 1261 against. The box-by-box vote on the presidential race was:

Pylant To Open In New Building Friday Morning

After serving the public 17 years in the same location Pylant Grocery & Market will open for business in a large, new building of their own Friday morning at 9 a. m. The new building, just completed, contains 50,000 square feet of floor space and is very nice inside and out.

The store will have probably twice as much floor space as in the old location allowing a much more convenient arrangement and lots more room to display merchandise. New shelves and display counters have been provided in the new building all of like design and finish.

Flourescent lighting will add to the attractiveness and several new pieces of equipment will give the store a new look altogether. A brand new refrigerated vegetable rack is being installed as are some self-serving meat cases.

The new frozen food case will be installed in a convenient place and everything will be arranged for the customers convenience, Mr. Pylant said.

To celebrate the opening the Pylants are giving away \$100 worth of groceries Friday and Saturday. No requirement is made to buy anything. The public is invited to register at the new store Friday or Saturday. On Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock \$35 worth of groceries will be given away and on Saturday afternoon at 4 another bag of groceries worth \$65 will be given away.

Free coffee and doughnuts will be served to the public all day Saturday and local people are invited to come in for a treat. Free balloons will be given to the kiddies and a special gift for the ladies is also on hand, Mr. Pylant said.

The new building is of brick and tile construction with concrete floors throughout. J. H. Cooper of Lockney was the contractor and Lockney Lumber & Supply furnished the material for the building. Wiring was by O. C. Allison and J. P. Thornton did the plumbing. Willard Pierce was the cement contractor.

Work was in progress this week on spreading and packing caliche around the building on three sides. An asphalt top will be run making all-weather parking facilities on three sides of the building.

Trailers At Gin To Receive Cotton

Trailers have been placed at every gin in the county to receive donations of cotton for CROP, the Christian Rural Overseas Program for relief of the destitute and needy, according to Leslie Ferguson, county chairman.

Mr. Ferguson suggests that farmers who have remnants of cotton left on their trailers may want to donate that remnant to CROP or that farmers who have ginned remnants may want to donate that cotton to the relief program.

Cotton given by Floyd County farmers will go directly to Korea where natives there will make it into clothing, thereby benefiting both from the cotton and from the labor of making the cloth. Trailers will be kept at gins through the month of November.

Funeral services for Mrs. F. M. Trapp were held at 10 a. m. Monday in the chapel of the First Baptist Church, Plainview. Dr. A. Hope Owen, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Memorial Park cemetery at Plainview.

Mrs. Trapp was the mother of Mrs. Willie Merle Halthcock and the family lived here for a number of years while Mrs. Halthcock taught in the Lockney High School. Mrs. Halthcock is now County Superintendent of Schools in Hale County.

Mrs. Trapp has been hospitalized since June of 1951. Her death occurred at 8 o'clock Saturday morning at Kerrville. She had made her home with Mrs. Halthcock for the past 18 years.

Mrs. Trapp was a native of Tennessee. She and her husband moved from Tennessee to Hall County, Texas, in 1890. He died in 1930. Mrs. Trapp lived at Memphis, Hall County, for many years, she and her husband pioneering in farming and ranching and taking leading roles in church and community activity during their active lifetime. Mrs. Trapp was an active worker in the Baptist Church many years and was a member of the Plainview First Baptist Church.

Besides Mrs. Halthcock survivors are two sons, F. E. Trapp, Taft, Florida, and Duncan Trapp, Dallas.

Lockney In New AA Football Dist.

The Lockney Longhorns will play in a new AA football district next year according to a tentative district line-up released this week by the Texas Interscholastic League.

The Longhorns will be in District 2-AA along with Muleshoe, Littlefield, Olton and Tulla if the present plans are carried out.

Floydada will be in District 6-AA along with Slaton, Post, Tahoka and Spur, it was reported.

School limit on playing Class A football was 225 enrollment in high school and since Lockney has some 240 enrolled this year it will be forced to play AA football next year.

The present Class AA districts are high schools with enrollment from 200 to 499, while Class A schools have enrollments in high school ranging from 100 to 199. The Interscholastic League has changed the enrollment requirements a number of times in the past few years.

North Floyd Has Ginned 30,000

North Floyd County has ginned 30,000 bales of cotton a survey late Wednesday by The Beacon revealed. The survey included gins at Lockney, Lone Star, Sterley and Aiken. Approximately 13,000 of the total was ginned at the four gins in Lockney with the remaining 17,000 at other gins in the area.

Gin men's estimate of the amount of this crop already harvested ranged from 40 to 60 per cent with a majority estimating more than 50 per cent.

Many farmers have already pulled over the first time and are starting back again while some have not completed the first pulling as yet. A few have started mechanical strippers in their fields.

A light mist and sleet Monday afternoon stopped pulling for part of Monday and most of Tuesday but the weather cleared again Wednesday morning and hands went back into the fields.

It is magic in another sense too: I speak in many languages. It is magic again: I am just an ordinary person with only average abilities. My dollar, however, may be translated into the personality of a great missionary. The dollar I give to missions is magic money.

I look very closely at my dollar bill. There is a picture right in the center. It is my own picture. I am written all over that dollar bill. My time, my skill, my education, my hands — it is my dollar. Important as was the making of that dollar, even more important is the spending of it. What kind of person am I? My Dollar tells me: the way I spend my money — that is me in action. Let me examine my Christian stewardship again because my money is me in action.



etion but win, lose or draw, we can always comfort ourselves with the scripture, "All things work together for good to them that love the Lord." Sometimes it is hard for us to see the good in things that happen but the scripture tells us that it is good and we can rest on that assurance.

The meddling of the Department of Labor in the pulling price paid to Mexican Nationals in West Texas is just another example of a bureaucracy that is not content to accept a contract at its face value but wants to exert its authority and show the farmer that he doesn't have enough sense to run his own business. The \$1.55 price paid to Nationals is fair to both the Mexican and the farmer. It gives the farmer a fair return for his money and at the same time the National never made so much money in his life. Both are happy. But not the Department of Labor. The gentlemen who operate this bureau must get out and look after the welfare of the poor Mexican National. They must work to the betterment of the foreign worker even at the expense of their own countrymen. They are so concerned with the condition of the poor Mexican peon that they want him to get rich in two months time. How long, O Lord, must we put up with this kind of government meddling and bureaucracy?

Mr. K. N. Klapp of Lubbock has modified his freeze damage to some extent by saying that it ranges from 5 to 20 per cent with the worst damage in four counties in this area including Floyd. If Mr. Klapp is interested we may be able to show him some freeze damage that exceeds 20 or even 25 per cent in this area. In fact we are predicting that the cotton crop in Floyd County will be some smaller this year than last in spite of Mr. Klapp's estimate on November 1st of 130,000 bales of cotton. In fact we will even stick our neck out and estimate that Floyd County won't make more than 95,000 bales of cotton this year. And we will probably have an accurate county of ginnings since we have heard of no cotton being ginned out of the county in this area.

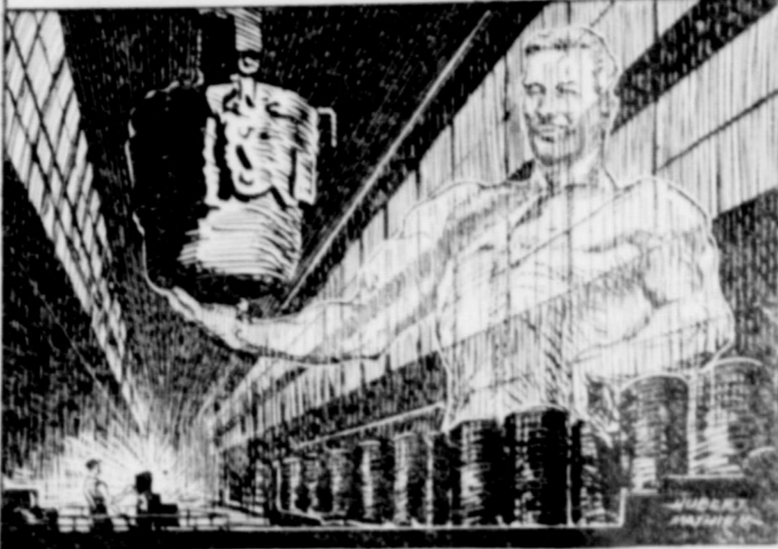

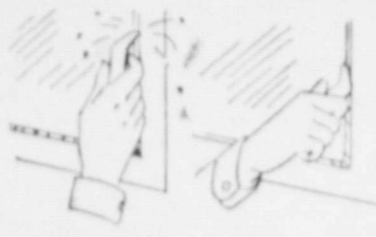
MRS. HILL MOVING BACK TO WICHITA

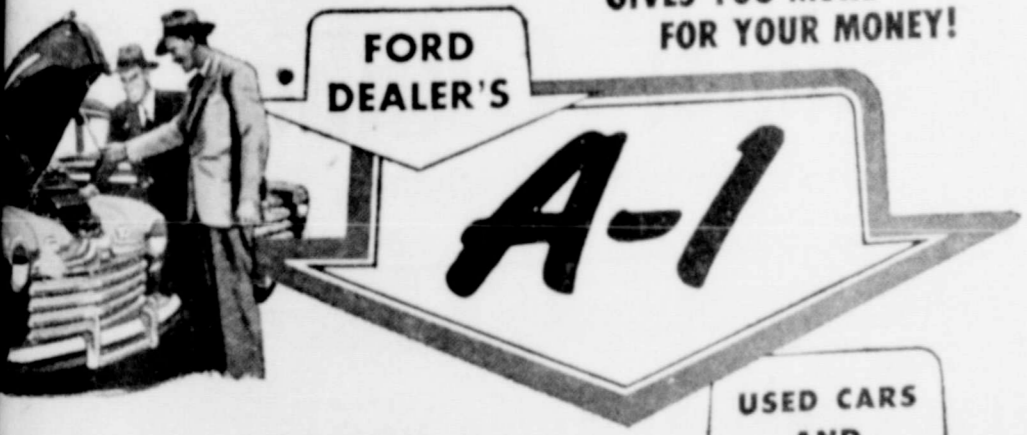

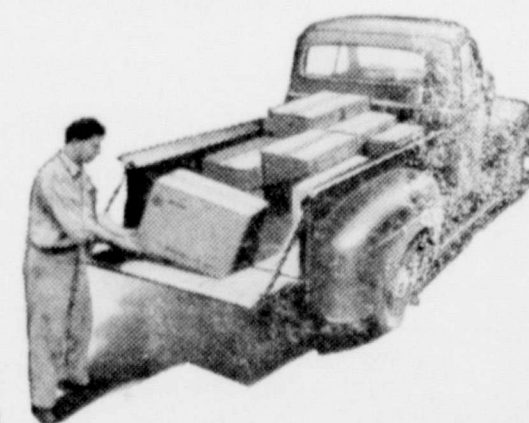

Urge Fall Meals With Appeal

College Station. — With autumn leaves of yellow, orange, rust, gold and brown, come autumn fruits and vegetables. Pumpkins, egg plant, pop corn, persimmons, apples, pears, red peppers, winter squash and sweet potatoes are just as colorful as other signs of the season.

Meaona Cox, foods and nutrition specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says these foods not only bring color to the family table, but a fresh appeal to appetites.

Take for instance, the sweet potato. The bright orange color is in season. The flavor and food value make it a good provider of energy.

Miss Cox says the sweet potato is a rich source of vitamin A, a worthwhile source of vitamin C and contains small amounts of the B vitamin and minerals. Since the Texas Food

Standard suggests at least one serving of potato each day, the specialist recommends sweet potatoes alternately with Irish potato for balance and variety.

These are two kinds of sweet potatoes. One kind is dry, mealy and rather light yellow in color. The other is a deep yellow variety which is grown in Texas. This is moist and juicy in texture, and because of its rich color, is especially good for vitamin A.

Baking the sweet potato to retain this food value and color is the method of cooking recommended by the specialist. Select smooth, uniform size potatoes, wash and dry, brush with butter or bacon drippings and bake in a hot oven (425 degrees Fahrenheit) until tender. This requires 35 to 60 minutes, depending on the size of the potato. Roll gently in a cup towel until soft, split and add a square of butter or enriched margarine.

For other sweet potato recipes, see your county home demonstration agent.

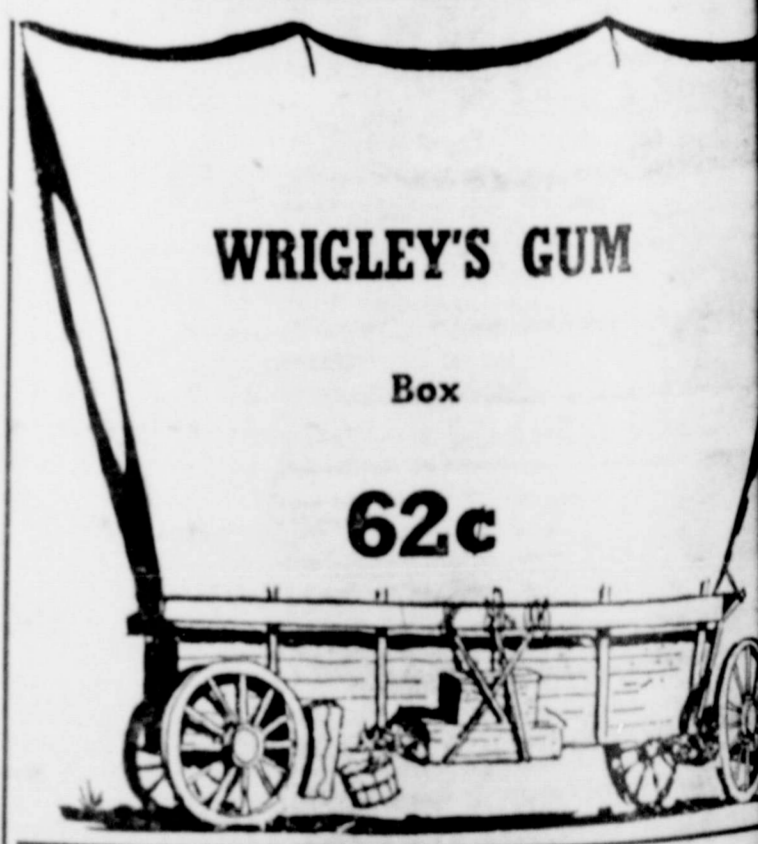
