"Cornucopia's" Collins,, Producer Set To Talk, Sign Books Sat., Aug. 19

Eastland County Native Mike Collins "told all" in his briskly-selling book "Cornucopia of Evi" and he's sold it to a producer who plans a film adaptation.

Both Collins, now of South Texas, and Movie Producer Dwight Adair will be at the Eastland County Museum Saturday, Aug. 19th for brief talks, question and answer session and book signing. They will be given a tour of the town and area before and after the session in order to acquaint Adair of the locale which he will be portraying in the filming.

(The third shipment of the book at \$10 each has arrived for sale at the Eastland Telegram, with all proceeds being donated to Centennial Memorial Library as a gift by Collins. Two previous shipments of the latest edition which is slightly expanded from the first, have sold out.)

Among Adair's many credits is the fact that he was a director for a number of the famous Dallas and Dynasty television series. He was also director/producer for Faded Love, Go For It! and Producer for Dream House, the television series. Adair is presently doing the treatment of the material from Collins' book.

Collins was born and finished public school in Carbon and was an executive with Eastland National Bank (now First Financial Bank) for many years. The book details accounts of his background and the circumstances with which he was confronted.

Mr. Adair began his career as a dialogue eoach on the feature films "Urban Cowboy", "Hard Country", and more recently the Academy Award nominated "A River Runs Through It."

Dwight's expertise was also utilized in several NBC Live Theatre Specials where he coached Henry Fonda, John Lithgow, Tim Hutton, Sally Field, William Hurt, Ned Beatty, Pearl Bailey and others. Mr. Adair became a member of the Directors Guild of America after working on the ODallasO television series for six seasons. Thanks to the county's brand new central phone network, however, there was flexibility to move more phones to the area so that frightened citizens were not put on hold.

County of Callahan Commended by TAC Leadership computer and phone systems. Judge Roger Corn initiated the project because the county had such a patchwork of systems in the various county offices that Corn was concerned about productivity, customer service and costs.

The judge worked with a Plano company and other elected officials to figure out the county's needs and the costs. The group made a list of goals and has met every one of them. Importantly for taxpayers, a thorough review of the countyOs bills for the old patchwork of systems revealed that the \$118,000 needed for new computer and phone networks could be paid for through reduced costs of the old systems plus an estimated \$100,000 in savings over the life of the new systems.

The new phone network has freed up employees to better serve residents in person, as well as allowing citizens to access information lines after hours. The new computer network allows county employees to better share records between offices. The new system has been particularly significant for the sheriffOs office, where reliability and saving time are of the utmost importance.

These programs offer financial and technical help to assist eligible particpants install or implement conservation

practices on eligible agricultural land. This meeting is open to the public and All Agricultural Producers, Landowners and interested citizens of Callahan County are encouraged to attend. 

·Cover a dish of food for the microwave with a lid or plastic wrap; keep the wrap loose to let steam escape. The moist heat will help destroy harmful bacteria.

•To prevent burns, carefully remove food from the microwave oven. Use potholders and uncover foods away from your face so steam can escape.

•Teach your child to use a food thermometer. When reheating leftovers, be sure the



KAY BAILEY H Medicare Brings

Benefits It is crucial that every Texan understands how best to take advantage of Medicare and, in particular, the new pre-scription drug coverage known as Medicare Part D. I have long fought for more comprehensive coverage for seniors in Texas, and Medicare now provides more benefits that allow people to lead healthier, longer lives without having to make difficult financial choices for health

Since January 1, 2006, Medicare beneficiaries have enjoyed access to prescription drug coverage. Before this change, Medicare paid for costly operations and potential complications but did not pay for preventive medi-

cine. Increasingly, illness can be treated with medication instead of invasive surgeries, and the Medicare Prescription Drug benefit provides seniors affordable access to those drugs.

Over 38 million people are already using the new prescription drug plan, including 2.5 million Texans. More than 90 percent of Texas Medicare beneficiaries now have prescription drug coverage. According to a recent survey by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, people who have looked into the available plans are generally satisfied with their plans by a seven-to-one margin and want to stay with them.

Actual costs for Medicare Part D have been well below the estimates. Competition from private plans has reduced the projected cost to taxpayers by \$11 bil-lion over the next five years, while the average premium for beneficiaries in 2006 is less than \$24 a month. These unexpected savings are the result of price negotiation, low-cost coverage for ge-neric drugs and discounted brand-name drugs.

Medicare Part D has another window for signing up or changing plans this year. From November 15 to December 31, Medicare beneficiaries can sign up for the prescription drug benefit or change their plan according to their cur-rent needs. Everyone with Medicare is eligible for this coverage, regardless of income and resources, health status, or current prescription expenses. These plans cover both brand-name and generic

As with other insurance, seniors pay a yearly de-

mium, which varies by plan. Seniors also pay a portion of the cost of prescriptions. The amount varies depending on which drug plan they choose.

Some plans may offer gap coverage and additional drugs for a higher monthly premium. Currently, there are 47 different prescription drug plans available for Texans. If a senior has limited income and resources, he or she may qualify for extra



STATISTICS

In 2000, more 19-year-olds died in alcohol-related traffic crashes than any other age (1,368). The next most fatal ages were 18, 21, 20, 17 and 22, respectively. No other single ages but these six recorded more than 1,000 fatalities.

By a wide margin, 21-year-olds recorded the most alcohol-related fatalities (680) in 2000. The ages with the next highest numbers of fatalities in alcohol-related crashes were 19, 22, 20 and 23, respectively. By comparison, no other single age besides these five accounted for more than 500 alcohol-related fatalities.

In 2000, more 19-year-olds died in lower BAC (between .01 and .09) alcohol-related crashes than any other age. In fact, 19-, 21-, 18-, 20-, 22- and 17-year-olds made up the top six ages (in order) of people who died in these crashes.

In 2000, 18-year-olds accounted for the most alcohol-related fatalities and the most fatalities where no restraint system (seat belts or motorcycle helmets) was used.
