Two Elections Are Coming Up

Two elections will be held within the next week, with school trustees being elected by all the school districts on Saturday of this week and city officials being voted on Tuesday of next week.

The school trustee election in the Lockney district finds the three incumbents whose terms expire on the ballot for re-election without opposition. They are "Whitey" Baccus, Leslie Ferguson and Frank Brown.

Local people will also vote on the county trustee from Precinct 2 with Robert Smith, the present trustee on the ballot also unopposed.

The trustee election will be held at the high school building with T. B. Mitchell as election judge and Mrs. Lula Woodburn and Mrs. Frank Jameson as clerks.

On next Tuesday city voters will ballot on three city officials with Mayor J. E. Cox on the ballot for re-election unopposed and Lloyd Wofford and Joe Holt running for the two places as alternates also unopposed. F. L. Brown and Leslie Floyd are the retiring aldermen but refused to offer again for the places.

Kelton Shaw will be election judge of the city election with Mrs. Woodburn and Mrs. Austin Meriwether as clerks. Voting will be at the city office.

Polls in both elections will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

Rotarians Net Over \$500 For Building

The Lockney Rotarians netted \$533.50 last week from a page advertisement in The Beacon and the operation of the Albert Willis Gulf Service on Friday to be added to the Boy Scout building fund, it was revealed Tuesday by F. L. Brown, treasurer of the building fund. Although this will not completely pay for the Scout building, it will pay the larger part of the costs, Mr. Brown said.

The new Boy Scout building has recently been constructed on the City Park grounds. The new building is 24x40 in size, stuccoed and dashed. The interior is solid sheeted and covered with sheet rock. Final work on the building is being completed this week. Clarence McCoy and Kirby Ford are doing the work.

R. D. Reese, local electrician, is wiring the building furnishing the material and his own labor without cost.

The Lockney Rotarians assumed the task last fall of getting the building constructed and raising the money to pay for it. Scoutmaster Leonard Finley and Explorer Advisor Udell Cunningham have been needing the building some time, since the Scout and Explorer troops have outgrown the log hut they have been using for several years. They both expressed their appreciation for the new building this week.

Hung Jury In Dossey Case

The jury failed to agree last week in the case of J. C. Dossey, charged with murder without malice in the death of Mrs. T. V. McClure in a highway accident west of Lockney last Thanksgiving.

The case went to the jury at 11 a. m. Friday and was discharged at 10 a. m. Saturday by District Judge Alton B. Chapman when they reported that they could not agree.

The prosecution sought to prove that Dossey was driving while intoxicated but witnesses had trouble agreeing on the type of car he was driving.

Red Cross Fund Totals \$4,274.45

The Red Cross fund drive in Floyd County now totals \$4,274.45 according to a report Wednesday from Mrs. Virgil Shaw of Floydada, treasurer. This is nearly \$1,000 more than the goal which was \$3,282.00.

The Floyd County Library Board met with the county judge and commissioners on Saturday morning at the court house in Floydada. The object of the meeting was the confirmation of the appointment of a librarian for the Floyd County Library. Also discussed were preparations to be made for the tentative opening of July 1. It is the hope of the board and county court that everything will be in readiness for the opening of a functioning library at that time.

The librarian appointed by the court for a two-year term was Mrs. Rosita Hollar, of Dumont, Texas. Since trained, experienced librarians are quite scarce in Texas, the board feels very fortunate in securing the services of such a qualified librarian as Mrs. Hollar. Mrs. Hollar is widely known in Texas library circles for her ingenuity, imagination, and energies devoted to ever broadening the scope of library service.

Mrs. Hollar was born in Plerdas Negras, Coahuila, Mexico, where her father was an engineer. She attended Kerrville high school, graduated from McMurry College at Abilene, and did graduate work in English at the University of Texas. She also graduated from the Louisiana State University Library School with a degree in Library Science. She has been librarian at the Poinsett County library at Harrisburg, Arkansas, Midland County Library, Midland, Texas, and McMurry College at Abilene.

She has been a resident of West Texas since 1919, and now resides at Dumont, Texas where her husband is in the grocery business. The Hollars have one daughter who lives in Fort Worth, where her husband is an air lines pilot. They have one son.

Start Work On Hot Topping Road

Contractors have begun work on hot topping the Trick farm-to-market road, Commissioner Hugh Counts said this week. Grading and drainage work and laying of the caliche was completed last summer and fall but cold weather caught the contractor before he could run the asphalt top.

Under an agreement with the Floyd County Commissioners Court he waited until this Spring to complete the job. Hot top will also be run on the one mile cut-off in east Lockney and on other road projects in east Floyd County under the same contract.

The roads will all have a double asphalt top, the same treatment given in other farm-to-market roads in the area.

Reach Agreement On Water Bill

Officials of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District and those representing the Canadian River Dam authority ironed out their differences over a water bill now pending before the House of Representatives Tuesday night and High Plains Conservation District authorities agreed to support the bill after all references to underground water were removed from the bill. C. J. Taylor of Lockney, a member of the Conservation district board said that the word "surface" would be inserted in front of every reference to water so that there would be no doubt as to the bill's meaning.

The bill before the legislature is for the purpose of developing a surface water supply on the Canadian River to serve 12 Panhandle counties. However the underground water feature arose when the bill gave the Canadian River group power to take over and operate present municipal water systems which have only underground water supply. High Plains district officials saw in the bill a threat to the underground water control on the plains and opposed it.

Representative Leroy Saul of this district had said that he would fight the Canadian River bill unless it was changed and other representatives also opposed it.

The corrected bill was drawn up at Lubbock and air mailed to Austin Wednesday.

846 Scholastics First Total On Lockney District

A tentative total in the Lockney Rural High School district as reported Wednesday by Supt. W. C. Irons showed 846 scholastics enumerated in the district. The enumerations had not been checked and Mr. Irons said that probably a few more white children would be found when the checking was done. The 846 included 810 white children and 36 colored children. This compares to 801 white children last year and 10 colored children.

Mr. Irons suggested that if any parent in the district knew that his children had not been enumerated in the census just completed he should call the high school building and report the matter and someone would come to enumerate the child or children.

The school district has shown a steady growth in scholastics the past few years with the high point in enrollment usually reached in the fall when transient laborers and their families flock here to help with the cotton harvest.

Bid Date Changed

The date for opening bids on the new school building has been changed to Wednesday, April 8th. Mr. Irons said this week. Reason of the change from Tuesday, April 7th was a mix-up in dates by the architect, who filled all his papers out for April 8th. The school board will meet at 2 p. m. Wednesday of next week and open bids of the proposed new 21,000 square foot building which includes 8 class rooms, a gymnasium, cafeteria and remodeling of the old gymnasium into an auditorium. A \$250,000 bond issue was recently sold which provides funds for the new building.

Soil Conservation News

Mr. J. P. Moss, a Soil Conservation District cooperator, three miles south of Floydada, can show you a patch of wheat which will make your eyes stand out on a stem.

The wheat is on land which was leveled last summer. After the leveling was completed Mr. Moss treated this land with 200 pounds of N. T. O., prepared his seed bed and watered his land.

He then seeded his wheat; when it got up large enough he started grazing it with sheep.

Grazing was continuous and heavy until the middle of March. At that time, Mr. Moss took his sheep off, fertilized the wheat with 50 pounds of 45% nitrogen, and overseeded his wheat with hubam clover. He followed this by what he hopes to be his last watering.

What is the best wheat yield you have seen on the South Plains? It looks like wheat just couldn't be better than this.

There are several things which cause this wheat to be so good. The thing which is most effective is probably the uniformness with which he can apply his water on this leveled land, but also of much importance was the fact that he provided the wheat with the necessary fertility for good plant growth, he grazed his wheat properly and removed them at the time the plant needed to start making growth.

Good Conservation practices in connection with proper management make for greatest production and profit. In farming and ranching, Conservation and good management go hand in hand.

Check your farming operation and see if you have the best coordinated Conservation program for your land. It will pay you in dollars and cents.

Nylon bait casting lines are
 braided similar to silk lines.
 Thanks to the introduction of
 spinning tackle in this country,
 manufacturers were faced with
 the problem of making a tough
 small diameter line of nylon and
 consequently many light-lure
 bait casters have found an ex-
 cellent substitute for fine, soft-
 braided silks in the braided nylon
 spinning line. Nylon is made
 of the same elements which ex-
 ist in coal, water and air. It is
 not an animal or vegetable fiber,
 thus does not deteriorate with
 age. Nylon can be left on a reel
 spool wet or dry without fear of
 rotting. The nylon filaments ab-
 sorb a small percentage of
 water, contrary to the common
 belief that it is completely water-
 proof. While nylon lines do not
 require the same degree of
 waterproofing as silk lines, they
 do require a surface treatment
 to fill the openings between the
 braid. This tends to stiffen the
 line slightly which is an advan-
 tage in that it prevents the line
 from clinging to the adjacent
 coils on the reel spool.

The material that goes into a
 braided yarn, each stand about
 .00012 inches in diameter. A new
 type of braid which recently ap-
 peared on the market is made of
 16 strands instead of the custo-
 mary 500 or more, and each
 strand is .005 inches in diameter.
 As a result, it is claimed that
 line does not tangle or backlash
 as easily. Instead of yarn, the
 strands are made of nylon
 monofilament, the same material
 that leaders are made of. Be-
 cause of the strand reduction,
 the line feels much smoother and
 creates less friction against ad-
 jacent coils. I have had little ex-
 perience with this braid and con-
 sequently can only report that
 early tests by others indicate
 that it's a sound idea and will
 find a definite place in casting.

In factories, the pound test of

tion machine. The sample of
 line to be tested is inserted in
 the machine, which pulls it un-
 til it breaks. At the point that
 the sample breaks, the machine
 registers the pressure. For ex-
 ample, if a line withstands pres-
 sure up to 10 pounds before it
 breaks, the result is a 10 pound
 test line. Lines are tested dry,
 because any line will have a
 greater tensile strength, when
 tested wet. The test of your bait
 casting line should be selected
 according to the size of the lure
 you use, and as a secondary
 consideration, the size of fish
 you can normally expect to
 catch. A heavy line will not cast
 a light lure nor will a heavy
 lure cast with a light line. If
 you are going to fish for bass,
 where the average is 2 pounds,
 and the possibility is 10 pounds
 then pick the line to fit your
 lures. In this case, small plugs
 and spoons of 1/4 and 3/8 ounce
 might be desirable and a line
 testing from 5 to 9 pounds is es-
 sential to the method.

The lobby in Austin is indeed a strong one. Take the bill which was passed last season placing a tax on the gathering of natural gas going into pipelines. In our opinion it is a good bill but the lobby fought it to the last ditch and now they are fighting it in the courts. In fact, it will probably go all the way to the United States Supreme Court before the matter is settled.

Meanwhile the revenue from the bill is being held in escrow and the State of Texas is looking for other means of financing its road and school program.

Of course the bill raises the price of natural gas to local users—who ever heard of a utility that didn't pass tax raises on to the consumer—but the beauty part of it is that two-thirds of the natural gas going into pipe lines in Texas is being piped out of the state and people outside of the state will pay for the use of the great natural resource of this state. We cannot see the wisdom of the State of Texas dissipating its natural resources by piping natural gas to other states without some sort of remuneration. This is a good bill. We certainly hope it is approved by the courts.

Consistency is indeed a jewel. The Legislature at Austin throws up its hand in holy terror at a bill that would regulate beer advertising on television yet it passes a bill that would prohibit various professions from advertising their product or services as a matter of "ethics." Many people who own television sets and many who take newspapers would much rather liquor and beer advertising was deleted since they do not wish their children to be influenced by such. But the law-making bodies refuse to take any steps to regulate the advertising of intoxicating liquors either in newspapers, radio or television, for fear of setting a bad "precedent."

The precedent was set several years ago when the power to regulate advertising as well as several other things in the medical and dental professions was given to a board which now has power of "life or death" professionally over members of the group.

If the legislature can pass laws to "protect" the public from a little thing like advertising dental plates, they certainly ought to be able to also protect them from liquor advertising coming into their homes in every conceivable form.

Here it is April 1st and West Texas still lacks a good rain. We heard a preacher preach Sunday about Isaiah and the three year period when no rain fell on the earth and it made us kinda uneasy. Maybe its conscience, realizing that we out in this section probably don't really deserve any rain but anyway we're worried about the situation. However we have placed an order for a slow soaker the latter part of April. Whether our order bears any weight or not remains to be seen but we urge the farmers to get everything in readiness.

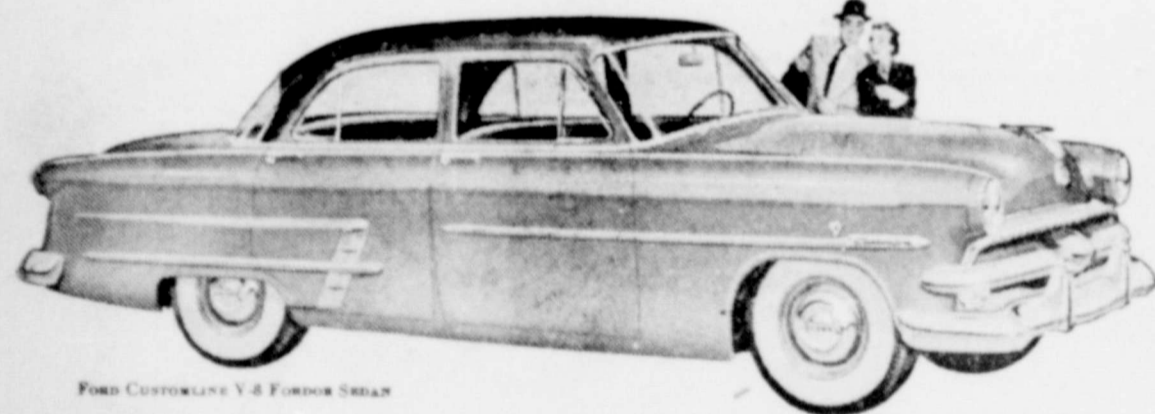

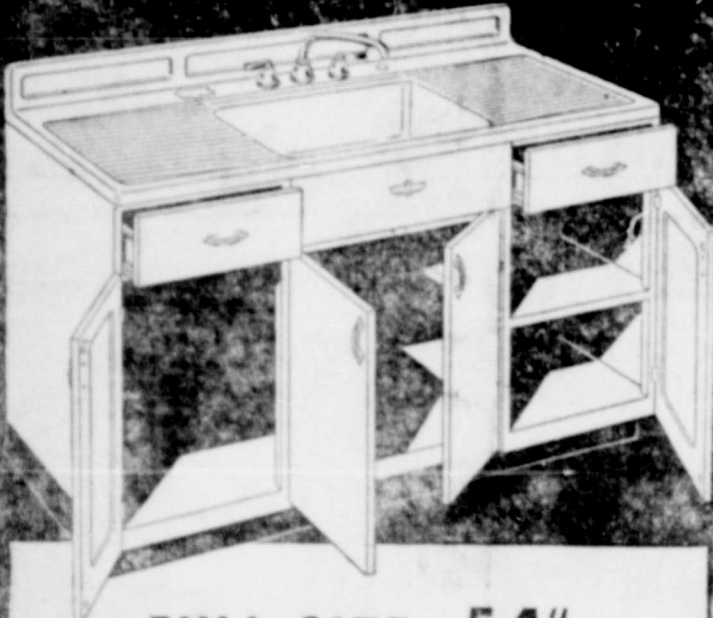

Applewhites Tell Of Cruise In Mediterranean

(Note: Following are excerpts from letters written by Mrs. Clyde Applewhite to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Honea of Lockney. Mr. and Mrs. Applewhite are on a cruise in the Mediterranean area and in these letters she tells of the many interesting things seen by the couple. More letters will follow in later editions of The Beacon.)

Casablanca, Morocco.
Feb. 18, 1953.

The island of Madiera, our first stop is a beautiful mountainous island in the Atlantic Ocean. It has a population of 253,000. Funchal, the capital city of the island where we stopped has a population of 70,000. They speak Portuguese—many speak English. We had a ride up the mountains 2,000 feet above Funchal, to the observation spot, where we had lunch at a restaurant. Then we rode down the mountain in a "toboggan sledge" guided by two men dressed in white over cobble stone roads. From here we rode in a carriage pulled by bullocks to the park. They have a tropical climate, and the flowers were beautiful.

We arrived here yesterday at 4 p. m. They speak French and Arabic. We took a drive this morning through the French and Arab quarters of the city and to the modern hotel on Aufa Hill, where the historic Casablanca Conference took place in Jan. of 1943. Roosevelt met with them.

The old art section of the city was full of dirty looking people. Some dressed in robes with their faces covered. Their robes are different colors, some white, others grey, brown and blue. The religious Arabs wear the robes and their faces covered. Most of them in this section wore robes.

There are so many beggars that we were afraid to go to town by ourselves here.

We leave tonight at 11 p. m. and arrive at Cadz at 9:00 in the morning. They give us schedules for each day and so far this ship has arrived on time at each port.

We noticed in the paper the ship issues that Texas had one of the worst dust storms since 1930.

There are about 1,000 people on this ship. I see people I have never seen before every day.

March 8, 1953.

We are just back from a plane trip to Old Jerusalem. Had to stay an extra day as all plane flights were cancelled yesterday due to the weather—it rained and snowed—Snow is unusual for Jerusalem they said. We were really happy to see the sun this morning, so we could fly back. The Mountains we flew over had so much snow on them.

The houses in Old Jerusalem are built of stone and are all flat top. In New Jerusalem the houses have red roofs. The people there make you think of Bible stories. They are so backward, Arabs herding sheep on the hills.

Then we drove to Bethlehem—saw the spot where Christ was born—in that time it was a rocky cave—now a church is built over it—but they have a marble slab marked as the spot where he was born. Then we saw where Christ was buried. Had to go down steps carrying lighted candles to see these—My head is still in a whirl from the plane trip and so much going—This may not make sense—Sent you a card from Jerusalem—Hope you get it.

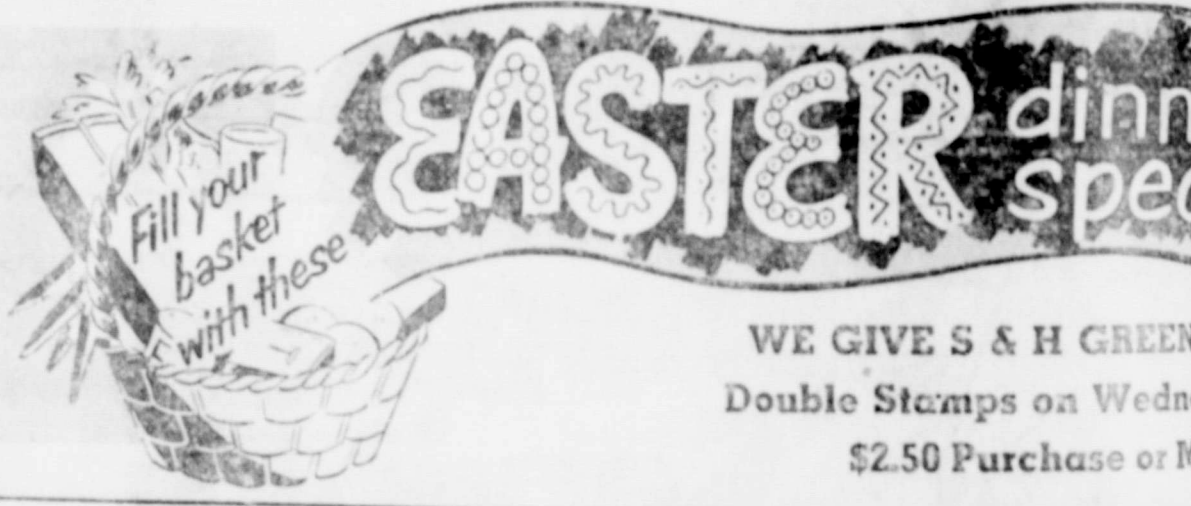
