adds weight to the line, furnprotection, facilitates floating and increases or decreases its ability to shoot through the guides. Most manufacturers designate their own finish in three grades, hard, medium and soft. The hard finish is ideal on small diameter lines (size C or smaller), while the medium finish is a good compromise for sizes B and A. Diameters larger than A should be in a soft finish to prevent kinking in the guides. Use a standard line dressing rather than a home-made preparation. Ordinary paraffin can be used in an emergency but avoid all animal fats or greases. These are extremely injurious to fly lines. The dressing should increase the line's floating power, but be careful not to use too much, as the dressing scrapes off in the rod guides, and decreases the cast considerable.

ENEMIES OF CHRISTIANITY No. 1

It is indeed a serious charge to be charged of being an enemy of this great land in which we live. We give much time, thought and effort to weeding out those who would betray America into the hands of those who would take away the freedom that we possess. I believe that there is a more serious charge; that of being charged with being an enemy to Christianity. There are literally millions on the face of the earth today who are enemies of Christianity.

Let us stop here and notice the way in which we use the word Christianity. We do not use it in the broad, misused, abused sense of the word. Often the word Christianity is used to refer to that great realm of people who in any way profess to believe that there is a God, and that Jesus is the Christ the Son of the living God. Some seem to think that the word Christianity has such elasticity until it can be stretched to include almost all of the religious world in the USA.

In Acts 11:26 we have this reading. "And when he had found him, he brought him unto Antioch. And it came to pass, that a whole year they assembled themselves with the church, and taught much people. And the disciples were called Christians first in Antioch." We then would reach the conclusion from this that only the disciples were called Christians. But who were the disciples. They assembled themselves with the church. Now, following this statement it tells who were called Christians. Let us notice another place where disciples and church are connected. in Acts 8:1 "And Saul was consenting unto his death. And at that time there was a great persecution against the church which was at Jerusalem." Notice, this verse makes mention of Saul and his persecutions against the church. Now in the 9th chapter of Acts verse 1. "And Saul. yet breathing out threatenings and slaughter against the disciples of the Lord . . ." Now notice the contents of the 8th and 9th chapters. The first 4 verses of the 8th chapter tell about Saul and his persecutions against the church at Jerusalem. In the 5th verse we go with Philip down into the city of Samaria. We remain with Philip the remainder of the 8th Chapter. Then, in the 9th Chapter, verse one, the writer brings us back to Saul and states he is "yet breathing out threatenings and slaughter against the disciples of the Lord." Now, if the writer does not suse interchangably the words church and disciples of the Lord, I just don't understand the meaning of these verses.

By this investigation I think that we can clearly see that disciples made up the church and that the disciples were called Christians. We come then to this conclusion: that Christians were members of the Lord's church. Therefore. Christianity would encompass only the church of the Lord. Now let us notice the writings of Par. in Philippians 3:15-18. "Let us therefore, as many as be perfect, be thus minded: and if in any thing ye be otherwise minded. God shall reveal even this unto you. Nevertheless, whereto we have already attained, let us WALK BY THE SAME RULE, LET US MIND THE SAME THING. Brethren, be followers together of me, and mark them which walk so as ye have us for an example. (For many walk, of whom I have told you often, and now tell you even weeping, that they are the enemies of the cross of Christ." Note that Paul here tells them to walk by the same rule, to mind the same things and then he tells about some who walk so that they are the enemies of the cross of Christ. No doubt, then, these to whom he refers, were not walking by the SAME rule. Because of this they were the enemies of the Cross of Christ. (Enemies of Christianity.)

Next week we hope to continue our lesson about the Enemies of Christianity.


